The beauty of stewardship

Stewardship has to do with how we manage our time, talent, resources — basically our entire lives. It's a beautiful concept when properly understood. Here are the basics of good stewardship:

God is the source of all creation, including our lives. God is the primary owner of all that exists.

We are blessed by being given the task of managing well all that we have influence over: our lives, our abilities, our minds and bodies, our time, our part of the earth, our finances, our children. our church buildings, our automobiles, etc.

Although we can make decisions regarding each of the above, ultimately we are responsible to God. Sooner or later, we must give an account of our management of God's creation and of God's gifts.

When we properly use the talents, resources and property that God allows us to manage, we find great joy. Think of planting a garden which soon overflows with colorful flowers, wonderful vegetables and flavorful herbs, etc. God gave us the plot of ground, God gave us the seed, God gave us the wisdom and strength to bring forth such beauty, such good things to see or eat, or smell. Yet we did the work, with God's help, to make it a reality. Like Adam we tilled it and kept it. But God gave the increase. God's provisions and our labor brought the garden to its fulfillment.

Good stewardship enables us to do something positive and wonderful with the money God has allowed us to have. What feels better than knowing one has managed money well? Our bank account, our checkbook and our portfolio tell the story. When money is handled well, we have enough for ourselves and are still able to give to God's work. That is the beauty of stewardship.

A woman who had figured out who the murderer was found herself alone in the room with him. We never actually found out who the victor was in that struggle—it was left to the imagination. Any time I was faced with a difficult or challenging situation, I'd just say to myself, "I am strong, and I am not afraid."

Sometimes we sell ourselves short and say, "Oh I couldn't possibly do that!" The weather is too bad. It's too hot. It's too cold. I'm too tired. I'm too old. I'm too afraid. We usually live up to what is expected of us. Let's expect more of ourselves and be strong and not afraid! After all, God is in our corner, and we always can call on him for that extra bit of strength. And even though things may seem uncertain and scary, we should remember that God is always with us -RMD

TRANSITIONS



Dear Parish Family,

I would like to talk with you about transitions and how they affect our lives. St. Ann's has certainly been through some transition in the last few years; especially as it relates to your clergy. You experienced the departure of Father Rick; then you welcomed your interim, Father Gary, and after three years said good-bye to someone who had become a part of the fabric of the life of our church and a friend to many of you. In the midst of that relationship you also said good-bye to your curate, Father Brian, and welcomed your new curate, Father Farrell. And then I came in February to serve as your ninth rector. That is a lot of transition in

a relatively short amount of time.

Transition isn't easy because we develop relationships with people, and there is sadness in saying good-bye to those who have played a role in our journey of faith. It is human nature to feel this way and to be saddened when someone we have grown to love leaves us. As your rector, I am committed to being among you for many years to come, and creating a stable environment in which we can grow together in our love and service to Jesus Christ.

However, that doesn't mean there won't be other transitions in our life together. And one of those transitions is on the horizon. St. Ann's is very fortunate to have a full-time position for a second clergy (one of the few churches in the diocese that does), and traditionally it is filled by someone who has just graduated from seminary. That means St. Ann's is a training ground for this newly ordained person, and it is an honor for us to be able to help them learn how to live into the life of a priest and to give them the space to preach, teach and celebrate the mass. The tenure of this position is to be no more than three years. After that time, the priest is seasoned and ready to take on a new role in the life of the church. And it is time for a new seminary graduate to come and take their place among us.

As you will read in Father Farrell's article, he is beginning his search for a new position as his time with us begins to wind down. We love and respect Father Farrell and while this transition will be sad for all of us, we must also recognize that clergy are ordained to the church corporate, and not to a parish. There is a church out there which God is calling Father Farrell to and they will be very fortunate to receive his gifts for ministry, as we have been fortunate to experience those same gifts for the last few years. Our hope and prayer is we have given Father Farrell a safe place to learn, to grow, and to love others as we have loved him.

So, we are in a transition period, not saying good-bye yet to Father Farrell and not saying hello to a new curate either. As we live in this transition period, may we continue to support and encourage Father Farrell as he too begins his own transition in his journey of service to our Lord.

We are approaching a very important time of year in terms of St. Ann's financial well-being.

During our annual stewardship drive later in October, you'll be asked to prayerfully consider what you can contribute to literally "pay the bills" in 2013. These include very practical and non-spiritual things like utility costs. Hopefully, the pledges will be sufficient to allow us to expand and enrich our ministries which are, after all, are the heart and soul of our parish life.

Two ways we supplement our operating funds are the Parish Fair and our Christmas Tree Sale. We depend on both fund-raisers to supplement our congregation's pledges. This month please step up to help with the Fair. There are sign-up sheets in the Parish Hall, and you'll be receiving mailings. Be sure not only to participate yourselves but also to spread the word. Bring your friends and family on November 2nd and 3rd! We need your enthusiastic support to insure the success of these events.

As you probably know, the renovation of our Parish Hall is now complete, and it looks great. For those who were concerned that there would be a sound problem, we are pleased to report that the upper parish hall is now 10 decibels guieter or less "echo-y!"

This was the third major project undertaken since we began the Capital Campaign a year ago. Our church tower is now repaired and the Rectory has been updated.

But there is more to do.

We've recently discovered that our beautiful Tiffany windows behind the altar and the rose window over the church door are in need of repair or, at least, protection. You will be receiving a letter and brochure explaining this new phase of our capital campaign and why it is necessary now. Our Tiffany windows are much more than valuable or beautiful; they've been such an inspiration to us as we worship. We sincerely hope that you'll contribute to this expensive but extremely important project.

We're calling the campaign "It's STILL Our Turn." Yet it is not just our turn to repair and preserve the church buildings, windows, or grounds. Isn't it always our turn to be sure that every aspect of our life together as a parish will flourish?

THE CURATE'S COLUMN

The Training Church

Getting one's first job out of seminary can be difficult. One cannot get a job without experience and one



cannot get experience without a job. Unfortunately, the number of training positions, or curacies, has declined as fewer and fewer churches can afford to have more than one priest. St. Ann's therefore offers an important benefit to seminarians and to the wider church. Every two or three years, St. Ann's hires someone who has recently graduated from seminary (often still a deacon), and trains that person, especially in the more practical aspects of being a priest not covered during three years of seminary education. After two or three years have passed, that priest is ready to take a job as an associate rector at a large church or as a rector or priest-in-charge at a small church. St. Ann's has the joy of seeing more ordinations than most churches and of knowing that many priests have been trained right here in Sayville.

Because of my extensive life experience, when I was hired, it was decided to give me the title of Mission Associate/Curate instead of simply curate. As time wore on and I was more seasoned, many dropped the word curate, but technically, that is what I am. My two year contract was extended for one more year thanks to the kindness of Mother Diane and the vestry, but three years is the limit. My contract with St. Ann's ends June 30, 2013, so I am now in the process of looking for a new job. If one should come along earlier, then I will have to take it. I hope that it will be in the Diocese of Long Island, where I feel quite at home, but appropriate jobs do not always become available at an appropriate time, so we are forced to apply more widely.

Though it will be sad to leave St. Ann's, where many people who have opened their hearts to me and shared their joys and pains, it is also true that the sooner I find a job, the sooner I can breathe more easily. I try to trust God, but also know that God does not control the economy, and there are far fewer positions these days than prior to 2008. The interview process can be lengthy, and one generally works a four-to-six-week notice before leaving, but it is never clear when the call will come. As soon as it is certain, I will announce it to the church. Until then, I ask your prayers that God will place me where God would have me be. Whenever I leave St. Ann's and wherever I go, you can be assured that I will carry you all in my heart. As with all clergy separations, however, there will be a period when no contact will be permitted. This will allow the people of St. Ann's time to form a close relationship with your next curate, who will surely bring different skills and charisma to his or her work here. Remember, each new person will be as yet inexperienced, so be gentle with them and avoid mentioning former curates so that they will know that they are loved for themselves. You have as much to offer them as they have to offer you.





❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten ❖

STANLEY F. HLAVAC & ELLA LANGE HLAVAC Section 14 - Lot 5 1/2 of 7

Stanley F. Hlavac died at his home at 115 Sunset Drive, Sayville, in mid-May of 1953. He was 59 years of age. He was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia, in 1894. He came to the United States at the age of 16 and began summering in Sayville in 1933, finally making it his home. Mr. Hlavac was a sales representative for a chain drug company until his illness. He was a registered pharmacist and graduate of Colombia University School of Pharmacy.
