FROM THE EDITOR

I was recently reading the latest (October) issue of *Psychology Today*, and I was particularly interested in an article called "10 Signs You Know What Matters." I couldn't possibly condense the whole article to a few lines, but I was particularly struck by #8 You Can, in a Few Minutes, Write About What Matters. Apparently, writing about values boosts peoples' ability to succeed. Perhaps it helps to focus on the positive, but in several cases, when students were asked to write about their educational values (as opposed to their goals), their grades went up. According to the magazine, "The drive for self-integrity—seeing oneself as good, virtuous, and efficaciousis a fundamental motivation."

With school starting, and college students back on campus, this would seem like a good exercise with which to start off the year. We are all taught we have to have goals to get ahead, but we should also have values by which we live our everyday lives. I can't help but think about John McCain, who, by his own admission, liked to have a good time and was not a great student – even graduating near the bottom of his class at Annapolis. But along the way, he was tested and had a lot of time to think about what his life was about. He thought about his values. They were pretty much all he had when he was a POW in Viet Nam. At the end of his life he is now celebrated for his character and living his true self, not bending to anyone. You may or may not have agreed with his political views, but that is irrelevant here. He lived by what he believed was right. He was an honorable man.

Try the exercise yourself. And repeat it later when you may find yourself wondering which direction to take. Just sit down for 10 or 15 minutes and write about what is important to you in your life, in your education, in your job, in your marriage, in your friendship, in your practice of religion, in your service to other people.... We may surprise ourselves! -- Rodney Dudley

As your Wardens, we are writing to inform you that Mother Diane is retiring. Her last Sunday with us will be October 28, 2018. Her announcement letter is enclosed. Although we are sad to think of her leaving St. Ann's, we wish her all the best as she begins this new chapter of her life. There is much love and appreciation for her and all she has accomplished here at St. Ann's. Mother Diane has worked very hard throughout her alost seven years with us, and her acccomplishments are quite substantial. There is an extremely long list of projects that has repaired and restored our buildings and grounds, not to mention organizing many of the ministries, church services, and business office that a very active church like ours has. Our outreach programs have never been stronger and are currently serving more members of our community than we ever have. All of these areas have benefitted from Mother Diane's gifts and have run very smoothly under her direction.

Mother Diane's spiritual leadership and guidance have been a blessing for our parish and is most evident in the growth of our youth through her tenure. Oue Youth Group has become a vibrant, active ministry, and our Christian Education Program has increased in numbers and has flourished. The Vestry will meet with Canon Woodley, and we will discuss the next steps for your Vestry to find a new leader who will continue the excellence in worship and the many other offerings here at St. Ann's Church.

And I will be praying for you and the bright future God has for our beautiful and spiritual parish.

Once retired as your Rector, I am not allowed to return to conduct any services (funerals, weddings, baptisms, etc.), and I cannot serve in any pastoral care capacity to you. That will be the honor and privilege of the Interim and, subsequently, the new Rector. They need the space to get to know you and love you as I have loved you, without interference from a former rector

In the meantime, we will have approximately two months to continue to worship and pray together and to say our proper good-byes. I look forward to sharing some wonderful memories with each of you and looking with great joy to what God's future holds for each of us.




PEANUT BUTTER AND JELLY **MINISTRY**

As always, all are invited to help on mission day! I am grateful for all your prayers and support!



❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten

Fred D. Smith Section 43 - Lot 5

Fred D. Smith died at the Sayville Nursing Home on July 21, 1953. Born in Greenville, NJ, of an old and respected Long Island family, he spent much of his life in Bayport. Recently, he traveled between Florida and the Sayville home of his son, Hervey Garrett Smith and his sister. Miss Grace Smith.

A self-educated man, Mr. Smith was a prominent building contractor in this area. He was an avid yachtsman all his life and designed and built many boats. He was responsible, more than anyone else, for the development of the Great South Bay Scooter and was active in the Wet Pants Association and served on the Race Committee.

He was the oldest director of the Oysterman's Trust Company, in point of service as well as years. He was a member of the Foresters of America and an active fire fighter, having served as Bayport Fire Chief at one time

His remains rest in the family plot in St. Ann's Garden of the Unforgotten.

"SURELY HE HAS BORNE OUR GRIEFS..."

When veteran Joe Serna confessed that he'd been drinking — behavior prohibited in the Veterans Treatment Court program — Judge Lou Olivera sentenced him to one night in jail. That might not seem like much, but while deployed, Serna had been trapped underwater when his truck toppled into a canal. A buddy managed to move him to an air pocket, saving his life, but the buddy and two others died. Years later, even the thought of confinement triggered flashbacks.

As Serna arrived for his jail stay, Olivera, also a vet, saw his anxiety, entered the cell with Serna and spent the night. His kind act nearly brought Serna to tears, but the judge believes any vet would have done the same. "These are our brothers," Olivera says. "We never leave each other behind."

Similarly, Jesus entered our troubled story alongside us, sharing in our suffering, brokenness and even death. As a comrade unlike any other, Jesus calls us his brothers and sisters, refusing to leave us behind with our self-imposed burdens. Above all, Jesus does what only God can: redeems us for the joy of new life.
