St. Francis Blessing of the Animals

St. Ann's Episcopal Church will host the Blessing of Animals at **2:00 PM on Sunday, October 8th** on the front lawn of the church. All kinds of pets and animals in fur, feathers, or even scales are welcome to celebrate God's grace and love in all creatures. +++



St. Francis

Man will have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth.”(NRSV, Genesis 1:28b)

This means not that we are the owners of all creations, but stewards over them. St. Francis may be the first and the most famous saint who became an icon of the stewardship for all creations in God's perspective. According to the stories of St. Francis, he preached to

attentive flocks of birds, dissuaded mosquitoes from biting him, and even convinced a wolf to stop harming people and livestock. The main concept of his attitudes is to “communicate” and “co-exist” with animals while respecting the value of God's creation

The Episcopal Church inherits his pro-animal stance as the 76th General Convention, in 2009, reaffirmed that animals are part of creation and that humans must be “responsible stewards” over them.

At the Blessing of the Animals, people remember and emulate the example of St. Francis of Assisi and his love for animals in appreciation for God's creations. *[This is excerpted from an article by the Rev. Jae Chung, The Correspondent, Oct. 2015]*

Dealing with Disaster

Lately, we have witnessed a string of disasters – one more terrible than the next. Hurricane Harvey in Texas flooded the fourth largest city in America and devastated the lives of thousands of people. Hurricane Irma destroyed the better part of Florida, wiping out homes and livelihoods, and flooding cities. Mexico City experienced a major earthquake and first responders continue to look through the rubble for survivors. And just this week Puerto Rico and other Caribbean islands experienced the wrath of Hurricane Marie. Some islands were totally destroyed, others say it will take months or years to rebuild, and as of this writing the entire country of Puerto Rico has been ravaged and has no power, being plunged into darkness as a result of Marie's wrath.

It is all too much for us. It is scary and depressing to see these disasters coming at us one right after the other. But as I watched these catastrophic events take place, I also saw grace, and I saw God in action. I saw the best of the human spirit show up in each of these disasters.

I think that we human beings are hardwired to do good. I think that's the way God created us, and when disasters--like the ones we have just been through--happen, the good side of humanity shows up. Time and time again I saw and heard stories of people helping others in desperate situations, first responders--often volunteers-- putting their own lives at risk to save a total stranger in need. People opening their homes to strangers who suddenly found themselves without a place to call home, donations sent to help in whatever way the funds could be used. I even saw a reporter save two dolphins that had been washed ashore.

And all of this makes me wonder, why do we only pull together for each other's care in the midst of a disaster? If we are hardwired to do good why don't we do it all the time? Why don't we seek to help our brother and sister anytime they are in need? Clearly, we are capable of acting the way God wants to act. Clearly, we are capable of selfless acts of helping our brothers and sisters in need.

So, I have a challenge for us. I invite each of us, to begin seeing each day as an opportunity to do a selfless act for someone in need. I invite us to look at each other with compassion and a heart that is open to helping and not judging. As we have witnessed recently, we are capable of living our lives this way. The question is, will we do it every day? I think we can!

As we take on this challenge, may we remember this truth: God is not only in the event..... God is also in our response to the event.

Vestry Visions

The monthly Vestry meeting is a wonderful way to see into the heart and soul of St. Ann's. We get to see the financial underpinnings of the church: This month there was some good news and some bad news. We were pleased to note that the pledge giving this year is up. Bad news: we're still having to spend more than we get, causing us to continue to make withdrawals from our savings. Fortunately this is less than the withdrawal we made for 2016. A big **thank you** to all of those who have kept current with their pledges. It really helps in our financial planning!

We reviewed the ongoing expenses for refurbishing and repairing our facilities. Our physical plant is old, and we have done a lot of "catch up" in maintenance that was deferred. The repair and renovation of the sacristy and foyer located below our tower is getting into the final stage of completion. Our Buildings and Grounds chairman advised that while doing her inspection recently she failed to note the time, [a minute or two before 6 PM]. She went up into the tower to inspect the work being done, when the eight minutes of serenade by the bells began. She advises that they are *really* LOUD, especially when heard from within the confines of the tower!

The Christmas fair and Christmas tree sales were discussed. The Youth Group is now active and the Vestry was pleased to hear that they are committing time to help at the fair and to sell Christmas trees. Don't forget to do your part as well! The Christmas fair will be held on November 4. Christmas tree unloading is the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Mark your calendars!

The Food Pantry needs donations of canned goods etc. Please consider bringing some as extra offering. The wagon will be put out.

The suggestions from the Suggestion Box were reviewed. Don't hesitate to make your own suggestions. Be sure to sign so we can reach out to you if we have any further questions

The Vestry meetings cover the very broad spectrum of activities undertaken by the congregation. It is amazing to see the variety of things our congregation helps within the church family and within the little part of the world we inhabit, but there is always room for more outreach.

Thoughts from the Front Porch

Fall has arrived, school is back in session, and St. Ann's programming year has kicked into full gear. September is an exciting time at St. Ann's. Committees begin meeting regularly again, Sunday School lessons commence, I get to meet the new Confirmation Class, and the Youth Group dives into its own ministry with a passion and an energy that most of us could only envy. As I sit on my front porch in the mornings and in the other quiet times, enjoying the cool autumn air and the sound of leaves falling, my thoughts have paradoxically turned to what is now harder to attain: Stillness. In the whirlwind of activity, it is hard to keep in my heart the words of the Psalmist: "Be still, and know that I am God." But, in the rare still and silent moments, I hear the quiet voice of God saying, "I've been waiting for you."

We all lead very busy lives. The work week tends to dominate our lives, and even at home we are often overwhelmed with activity. Bills, yard work, housework, homework, soccer games, dance recitals, obligations, friends, family, and email are among the many things competing for our attention. While it is hard to stay productive all the time, it seems to me that it is harder still to cease all productivity. We always feel like there is too much to do, too little time, and too high a price to pay to leave work undone. But what are we to make of that when we follow a Savior who says "I will give you rest?" In our Scripture, we are told that God ordained a Sabbath rest- it was so important that God made a commandment out of it. Are we missing something important?

In seeking God in stillness and in silence, I have found that in some ways I become more "productive," rather than less. God the Father whispers to me, and reminds me that he has no expectations. My anxiety starts to go away. Jesus stands with me, and holds my hand, and I find the courage to face my day. The Holy Spirit moves in my heart, and helps me see what is most important to me. Some obligations start to seem less like obligations, and more like "options." When we learn to rest in God, we begin to see that God will do the heavy lifting for us. When we learn to be still with God, we realize sometimes inactivity is more productive than endless toil. When we let God love us in silence, we realize that our own expectations of ourselves outstrip anything God would ever require from us.

As we consider our busy schedules, and a world that demands productivity, we might want to pause for a moment each day. Just a short break. Because if we do, we might be able to finally hear the still, small voice that is always whispering: "Be Still, and Know that I am God."

MAKING CONTACT

WELCOME TO ST. ANN'S FOOD PANTRY

It recently came to my attention that many, if not most, of St. Ann's parishioners have never seen our food pantry! We are located in the Littlejohn building on the first floor near the kitchen. Thanks to our new space we are able to store more items, as well as offer our guests refrigerated staples like milk, bread, eggs, butter and frozen vegetables.



In October, we will have an open house and all are encouraged to come by to see what happens to your food donation after you drop it in the red wagon.

Let me start by thanking all who make this ministry possible: those who donate food weekly, monthly a few times a year, those who contribute funds, those who have had food drives for us, the Senior Luncheon folks who donate to us each month. We even have a food pantry in Connecticut that helps us out when they are able, and, of course, our faithful and dedicated volunteers!

The food pantry is open Monday & Thursday from 10:00-12:00.

We feed 14-16 families--approximately 45 people--per week. In order to meet this need there are many tasks we need to complete each week.

To prepare for open hours:

1. Food must be brought over from the Parish Hall, sorted, and put away.
2. Bread donation is picked up one or two times per month and individually wrapped.
3. Shopping is done weekly.
4. Bulk foods are repackaged into smaller portions.
5. Shelves are stocked, organized, and rotated.

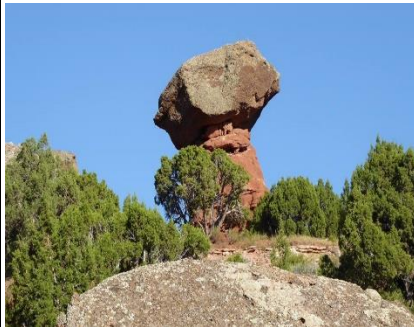

Operation HOPE – Prayer Square Ministry

Through the ages of Christian prayer life, many people have used tangible tools to grow closer to God or seek His love and healing during times of need. Rosary beads, Anglican prayer beads, prayer quilts and shawls, and now prayer squares have been developed. As the prayer quilt ministry is winding down after many years from the Daughters of the King, we are left with a large fabric stash. Some of it is being used for the Operation HOPE – Beacon of Hope twin size

quilts. Some of it will be sent to the Lakota Reservation in South Dakota for their quilting projects. Fr. Brian, Holly and Marge Rogers have done mission work on the Reservation. But we still have more fabric left so it is being turned into Prayer Squares to aid others in their prayer life.

The story of the unclean woman who sought healing after years of suffering is found in Matthew 9, Mark 5, and Luke 8. It must be important to be found in all three Gospels. The woman humbly touched Jesus' garment. This is like the touch of hope one can receive when using the prayer cloth while talking to God in prayer and supplication.

An article in Sharing Magazine for the Order of St. Luke told about a Prayer Cloth Ministry and included a great prayer to attach to the cloth. I have been making prayer squares for DOK and Cursillo Retreats so the ministry will be expanded to use up more fabric.

A basket of Prayer Squares will be available at the entrance of the church. Take them for yourself and other people in need of prayer. Give them to shut-ins or people in the hospital. Carry them in your pocket to give to others you can pray for. You may never know how they will be blessed, and you will be blessed also.

God's will for us is wholeness and health of mind, body and spirit. The prayer square is an outward and visible sign of the inward grace of God's love and healing power. --Marge Rogers – The Order of the Daughters of the King

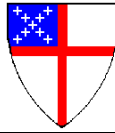
O God, bless me as I hold this prayer square,

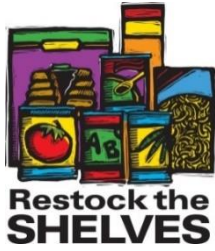

❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten

Mrs. Amelia Frieman died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William Otto, in the first week of February 1899. She died of heart failure at the age of 72 years.

Mrs. Frieman was born in Germany in 1826 and has resided for 42 years in this country. Three children, Mrs. Otto, William Frieman (proprietor of the Frieman House), and Charles Frieman (proprietor of the Bayport Bottling Works), survived her.

The funeral took place from the German Lutheran Church on Green Avenue, Sayville, where she was a member. The Rev. Herman Zoller officiated, and burial was in St. Ann's Cemetery.

Mrs. Wilhelmina Frieman died of a stroke in Southside Hospital during the second week of February, 1937. Born in New York in 1853, she and her husband came to Bayport in 1895, immediately following their marriage. Although a quiet, home loving person, Mrs. Frieman made many friends throughout the years here. Mr. Frieman died in 1929.

Mrs. Frieman was survived by two sons, Edward J. of Bayport and Walter of Bayside, and two daughters, Mrs. John Crawford of Richmond Hill and Mrs. E. Harrier of Harrington Park, NJ. She also left four sisters and eight grandchildren.

After services by the Rev. T. Tedcastle of the Bayport Methodist Church, she was laid to rest in St. Ann's Episcopal Cemetery.

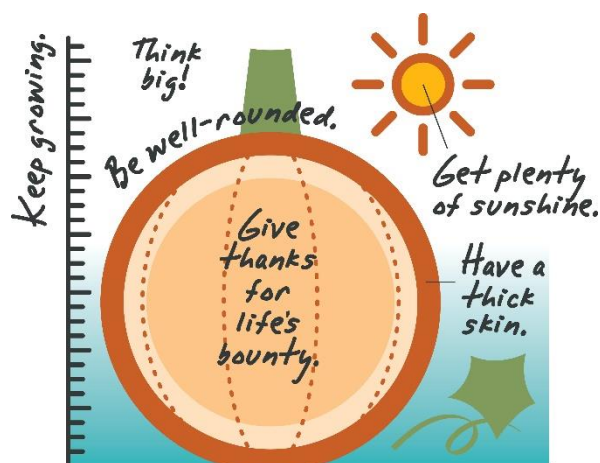

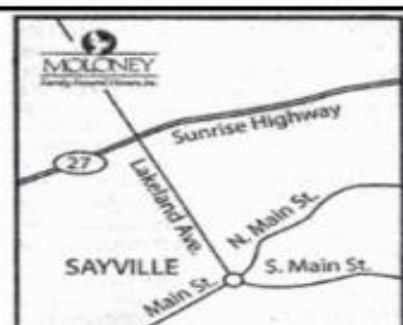
