THE CURATE'S COLUMN

THREE VIEWS OF SALVATION



After hearing a sermon on Matthew 25:31-46, one of our eight-year-old communicants asked me, "How do we know if we are a sheep or a goat?" He was concerned about his salvation, a concern he shared with Martin Luther. Luther suffered from what theologians have called a *terrified conscience*—he was profoundly distressed about the possibility of losing salvation. He would flail about and cry out in anguish over this and other matters that assailed him. Today, we might call this anxiety, but there was no treatment for anxiety in the 1500s. As a result of reflection on God's love and grace, Luther eventually determined that, once saved, we were always saved.

There are many Christians who agree with Luther that, once we accept Jesus into our hearts, our salvation is permanent and even inescapable. I would argue, however, that this robs us of our relationship with God and with the human community. How is it that we cannot reject our own salvation? How is it that, no matter what we do, no matter how heinous, we are still saved? If, moreover, we can sit at home with a Bible and profess our faith and be saved, then how are we to grow in community through giving to others? We are at our best in community, and love of God and neighbor is only an abstraction unless it is lived out among others. Such an understanding of salvation leaves us isolated, without encouragement to grow spiritually, to deepen our understanding, to change ourselves. Our relationship to God and to others can remain stagnant. At the other extreme, if we fear that our salvation can be removed at any moment, we fail to grasp our eternal and trusting relationship with God. We tend to fear that any mistake might result in our being eternally rejected by God. How can we grow spiritually when we dwell in fear? Surely there is an understanding of salvation that neither takes our relationship with God for granted, nor fears that it can be removed.

In Anglican fashion, I propose a *via media*, a middle path between these two extremes. We can see salvation as a path of growth that requires effort and the support of a community. Like a child learning to walk, we may stumble, get up, brush ourselves off, ask for forgiveness from God and our neighbor, and keep walking along the path facing God. Our salvation is intact, and we continue growing. We can, however, leave the path, turn away from God, renounce our salvation or lose sight of God through apathy. We then leave the path and walk in a different direction that no longer faces God. Though we can resume the path, should we choose, at a later time, God knows our hearts, and any cynical return ("I will do what I want now and return to the path near death") will be known to God as insincere. Such a return is no return at all, but an attempt to manipulate God. God knows and we know in our hearts whether we are sincere, and that sincerity is all we need to be saved.








Lenten Ideas

Fasting

- 1. Fast from watching TV one night a week so that you can spend time on a Lenten practice, such as praying, reading the Bible, and serving others. Fast from watching one movie during Lent and give the money and the time on service to others.
- 2. Fast from using bad language and put-downs and begin affirming others with positive speech; use your speech to encourage, rather than discourage others.
- 3. Fast from purchasing new things like clothing, music, and magazines; instead make a donation to a charitable cause.
- 4. Fast from holding resentments and being angry or upset with people who have hurt or offended you; learn to practice forgiveness.
- 5. Fast from gossiping and dishonesty and begin the practice of honesty and truthfulness.
- 6. Fast from a favorite snack food or drink and set aside the money you would have to spend on them to a favorite charity.

Praying

- 1. List three blessings you have been given. Say a prayer of thanks for each of these blessings.
- 2. Participate in Wednesday Lenten study groups and Soup Suppers.
- 3. Pray for a forgiving heart and ask the people you have hurt to forgive you.

Almsgiving

- 1. Donate personal possessions such as clothing, books, shoes, to people in need.
- 2. Dedicate time for service during Lent. Volunteer at church, a soup kitchen, or a hospital.
- 3. Donate money saved by fasting to the parish, the food pantry, or other charitable cause.



Our Church History

❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten ❖

ROBERT HOLMES
January 1919
Section 16 Lots 7-8

When the poem, *The Village Blacksmith*, was written, the poet had to be thinking of Robert Holmes. Robert was solidly built with large hands, and he worked as a blacksmith and wheelwright for many years in Sayville. He was, in fact, one of the best known and best loved citizens of Sayville.

ROBERT HOLMES was born at Grantham Lincolnshire, England and was brought to this country by his parents at the age of eleven. He grew up in Brooklyn, where he learned the trade of locksmith. Later he found employment with a blacksmith and wheelwright at Smithtown and worked there for several years.

Holmes came to Sayville in 1871 and established himself as a blacksmith and shoer of horses in a shop that stood on North Main street just west of the Sayville Congregational Church. Later he bought a lot on South Main Street and built a much larger building.

His first wife was Sarah Thomson of Smithtown, who bore him two daughters, Mrs. Lewis Wiletts of Sayville and Mrs. Jacob Morris of Tottenville, Staten Island, and a son Robert R. Holmes, who also resided in Sayville. She died not long after they came to Sayville His second wife was Niss Glarvinn Spence of Brooklyn, who had one daughter, Hannah L. Holmes and who, for some years, was principal of the Oakdale School. She also devoted her life to caring for her parents. Her mother died in February of 1914, and after that time she kept house for her aged father.

Mr. Holmes was a member of the I.O.O.F. and was one of the oldest members of the Sayville Hook and Ladder Company in which he took immense pride. He was a prominent figure in all Fire Department functions, usually grand marshal at the firemen's parades and he headed the local department at a score of tournaments. Politically he was an ardent Republican, and after serving for years as Roadmaster, he was elected for two terms as Highway Commissioner of the Town of Islip. As such, he played a major part in the establishment of many of the streets we go up and down today.

The Reverend John H. Prescott officiated at his good friend Robert Holmes' funeral and burial in St. Ann's Cemetery.






