A Word from the Rector Father Jeffrey Stevenson, HoSM

And God Provides!

"And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus."
(Phil 4:19)

Dear People of St. Ann's,

As I reflect on the past year and look to the year ahead, I am filled with gratitude for the unwavering support and commitment I have seen to our church community. Contributions from each of you, including your time, talent, and treasure, have played a vital role in sustaining this church. The reality is, however, that we have been running in the red for some years. We have been blessed with an endowment made up of gifts from members of the church who remembered St. Ann's in their last requests; however, this endowment(s) addresses large projects but not the day-to-day operations of our church. For the operation of our church, we rely on income, which primarily comes in the form of your giving... this is where we struggle. This year, we have witnessed remarkable growth in our parish, but this is not enough to sustain the church's operational expenses. As a vestry, we discussed the budget last year, and we needed to find a way to "get back to black."

Like so many other things in life, this is not a problem that can be addressed with a single solution but needs to be addressed from multiple directions. We need to find ways to reduce spending, increase pledge/giving, and find other sources of income. There are some places where we can cut the operating budget. Generally, the major projects that we do are covered by our endowment. When we replaced the roof a few years ago (and our plans to address the issues in the north parking lot) we were (and are) blessed to have those major expenses covered by the endowment. We continue to look at ways to reduce spending in our utilities, bills, and other operating expenses, but the reality is that we have cut most of those down to the bone. There is not a lot more that can be cut. You will hear more about our stewardship in the weeks to come from your stewardship committee, headed by Randy Schultz. But to be frank, we are not where we should be with the giving in the church.

That brings us to the final point: finding other sources of income. For a church our size, we have an abundance of property, some of which is underutilized. About 3 years ago, we started talking in earnest about leasing out some of our space. Because we are a church, we do not pay property tax. This has implications about who we can rent to and still maintain that tax-exempt status. We must rent to a non-profit organization. Because this is a narrower market, we contacted a real estate broker that works with the Diocese and focuses on the non-profit market. This broker has brought to us AHRC as a potential renter. AHRC would like to rent out the entire Littlejohn building (where our food pantry and church offices are currently located). AHRC Suffolk is a not-for-profit organization that provides programs and services to children and adults with intellectual and other developmental disabilities on Long Island. Currently, more than 2,500 people receive educational, vocational, residential and employment services through AHRC's forty-two facilities. They would like to use the Littlejohn building as one of those locations.

To put this in context, if we had had this lease in place in 2023, it would have brought in 110% of our stubborn financial shortfall, putting us comfortably in the black. Equally important is that this opportunity could be more than a way to get us out of the “red,” this has the potential to become a mission partnership with an organization doing good in the community. With that in mind, the CEO of AHRC has offered to come and do a town hall meeting with the people of St. Ann’s to tell us who they are and how they hope to utilize the church’s property to fulfill their mission. The Town Hall will be after the 9 am service on September 22nd in the Parish Hall.

As we prepare to move forward with AHRC, we are working on overcoming some core obstacles, such as zoning, relocating the food pantry, and moving the church offices. These are steps that we can address and have begun to tackle. If you would like to help make this a success, please let me know. First, please show up to the Town Hall on the 22nd of September. Second, let me know how and where you might be interested in helping. This is very exciting, and I hope we can come together as a church to make this a joyful partnership. If you have concerns, email me, call me, or stop by the office. And as always, I look forward to seeing you this weekend at Church.

CONFIRMATION CLASS



"If you would like to be confirmed or know someone who would, **it is time to let us know.**

If your kids are ready for confirmation, **it is time to get started.** We will be starting our confirmation classes again in **October** and I would love to include you in the class.

"This confirmation class is to prepare individuals for the sacrament of confirmation. Confirmation is usually late spring or early summer at the *Cathedral of the Incarnation* in Garden City, NY; we will get a date once we get closer. Like last year, we will be running two classes simultaneously, depending on the confirmand's age or readiness to be confirmed; therefore, at the in-person classes & social gatherings, there will be a mixture of ages & confirmation dates. In the case of confirmands under 18, the parent/guardian will be asked to participate from time to time to ensure we are meeting SafeChurch guidelines." —Father Jeff

“Putting One’s Affairs in Order” is Good Stewardship!

A friend of mine shared her experience in caring for a close family member in decline. My friend described how her loved one was determined to retain control of healthcare decisions, finances, and physical assets even though he/she was no longer capable of managing most of the affairs.

I was horrified. Having recently managed the comparatively orderly affairs of my recently deceased mother, I offer my personal suggestions for your urgent consideration regardless of your stage of life.

1. **If you don’t have a will, get one.** If you do, when was the last time you looked at it? Life’s circumstances may have changed in ways you may not have anticipated since the will was prepared. For example, you may have additional family members (children, grandchildren) that you may want to provide for since the earlier will was prepared. The will as a legal document stipulates specifically how you wish your assets to be distributed. In the absence of a will, the State has default guidelines which may not be in accordance with your wishes.
2. At least annually, check with your financial institutions, mutual fund companies, brokerage houses, etc. to check and double-check the **beneficiaries** and **distribution percentages** for each, listed for your financial accounts. Should you get hit by a truck tomorrow, funds can be distributed relatively quickly to your beneficiaries without waiting to go through the probate process. (New York State has a convoluted estate tax calculation on estates worth approximately \$6 million or more which may subject eligible estates to taxation on those funds, although most estates fortunately fall below this ceiling...).
3. While we are of sound mind, it is considered excellent stewardship to **have that family meeting** and discuss how we wish to distribute those items we consider sentimental or of value to our loved ones. Such meetings are thought to be uncomfortable, awkward, or sad, but they need not be with proper leadership and communication. Thought should be given to preparing a written list for distribution and copies retained with valuable papers...
4. Every household becomes cluttered with stuff over time. I cannot emphasize this enough-Spare your loved ones time, grief, and broken backs by **arranging the orderly distribution** of old books, clothing, Grandma’s furniture out in the garage, old small and large appliances that don’t work, and “stuff” you don’t need-while you are able. St. Ann’s Thrift Shop can recycle many clothes and small items and give them new life.
5. **Execute those powers of attorney, health care proxies, and other legal papers** and get them in the hands of those you trust with your affairs should you become incapacitated. Designate someone you trust to access and manage your financial affairs, deal with the bank, and pay the bills. (Banks need a power of attorney so someone can act on your behalf...) Decide who will prepare and pay your income taxes should you be unable.
6. Those of us of a certain age are required to take **RMD’s** from IRA accounts annually. You might want to discuss how to execute a **Qualified Charitable Distribution** payable to St. Ann’s or other qualifying charities directly from your IRA. These QCD’s are one of the few opportunities available to eliminate taxes on the amount of the charitable contribution. (RMD-QCD= balance subject to Federal/state taxation)
7. Although “end of life care” is understandably unpleasant to think about, consider **placing your name on waiting lists** for “preferred” nursing homes months or years in advance of need. Take time to tour facilities, explore alternative care options including assisted living which offer a social component and care levels that accord with specific needs.

We are all so engaged in the activities of life that we tend to put matters such as these off, often until something happens that compromises our ability to change. Don't delay! Personal planning for the "unknown" is excellent stewardship. The "unknown" happens with certainty for all of us; the only uncertainty is when...

Consider consulting with close family members, trusted financial advisors, tax accountants, attorneys specializing in estate law, and St. Ann's Clergy to make informed decisions regarding your affairs.

Please contact me if you desire a good reference for estate/probate legal services.

Communion where you live

If you are unable to attend church, regardless of the duration, and would like a Lay Eucharistic visitor to bring communion to you at home or in a facility, please call the church office and we will get back to you to schedule a time.

In 2006 my youngest brother John and his family moved to Wheaton, Ill. When I was visiting a short time later, I watched my brother dig through the kitchen garbage to grab a couple of items and move them to the recycling can right next to the garbage. I was curious, of course, to his motivation. He explained that he had to purchase a sticker for each trash container before the sanitation people would haul away their garbage. The recycling pickup was free at that time. Fast forward to 2024. The town of Wheaton now gives each home owner a container for trash and a separate container for recycling. Each bin has an identification code on it connecting the home owner to their trash and/or recycling. The recycling bin is about double the size of the trash bin. The cost for each trash bin is about four dollars per occurrence and the recycling bin is about two dollars. It has a separate charge for bulk pickup items. For instance a recliner is \$20.** The payment is done online. Every time you place a bin out on the street, your identification code is scanned and you get a charge on your account.

For the last two months I've been writing about the need to reduce the amount of trash we place at the curb here on Long Island. It is predicted that the cost to dispose of our garbage will increase in the foreseeable future. The exact cost increase has not been determined. The exact date this increase will take effect is an estimate at this time. The only thing that is known is that to transport our trash off the island will cost more than driving it to the Brookhaven Landfill. Newsday had an article on July 2nd of this year detailing this situation; “Brookhaven landfill closure likely to drive up costs, congestion on Long Island, experts say”***.

My brother, John and the people in the town of Wheaton are already very conscience of the cost of their trash disposal. Our sanitation costs here on Long Island are imbedded in our taxes or HOA fees or both. These costs are not something we think about when we place our bin at the curb.

Whether we think about the cost or not, reducing the volume of our trash will shrink our future trash disposal problem (where to take our garbage once the landfill closes and how to transport it there) and its inherent, ever-growing price tag.

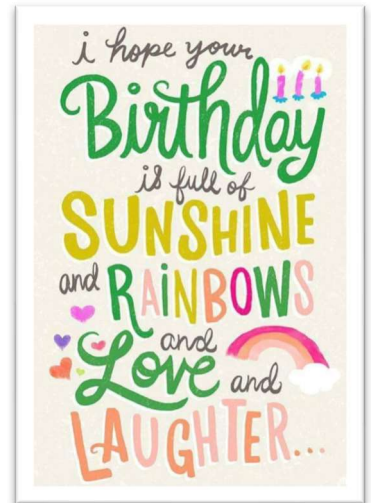

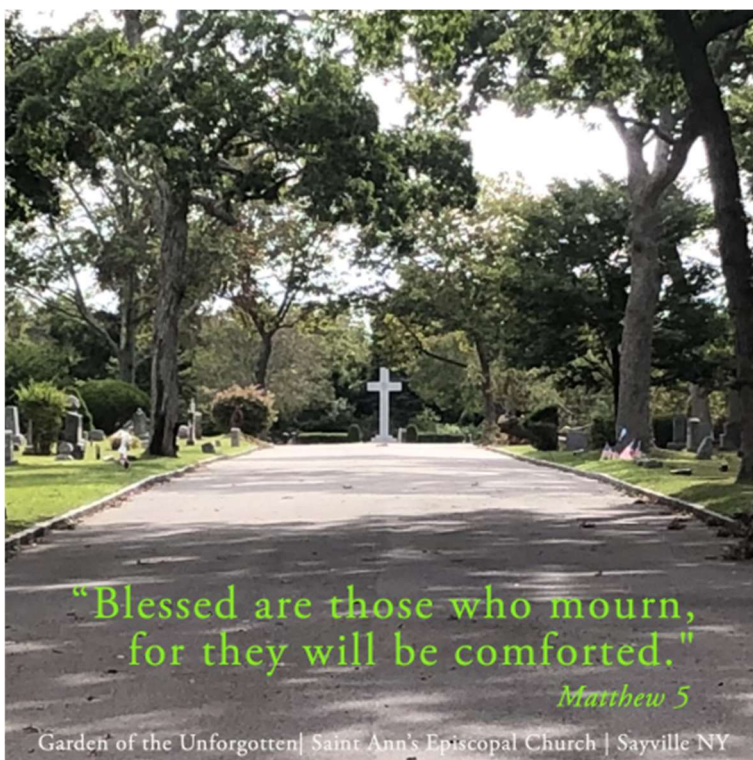

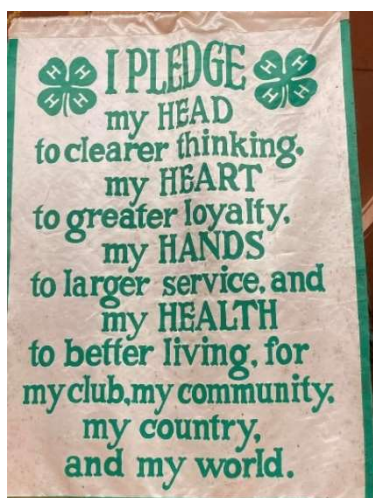
