

Neighborly Love

As an ordained minister, Fred Rogers harnessed the power of television to tell children they were loved — and to show them how to love others. In *You Are Special*, he writes, "When we love a person, we accept him or her exactly as is: the lovely with the unlovely, the strong along with the fearful, the true mixed in with the façade, and of course, the only way we can do it is by accepting ourselves that way."

In a review of the touching documentary *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* a writer for *Variety* notes: "Rogers' real secret was ... that the call to love your neighbor as yourself isn't a slogan to hang in your kitchen with flowers around it — it's a decision you make at every moment, to view every man, woman and child on earth as your neighbor. If you don't see and feel that, and act on it, then you're just another narcissist with a kitchen slogan."

Last October, when a synagogue shooting shattered the peace of Rogers' real-life former neighborhood, residents of all religions embraced one another as neighbors. Afterward, the Fred Rogers Center stated, "We long for a day when there is no more tragedy born from hatred." (from the Newsletter Newsletter)

A Word from The Interim Rector **Father Hugh James**





Dear Friends.

John is a friend of mine whose father died a few years ago. He went home for the funeral and stayed with his mother, Jane. One day she told him that she could not picture her husband clearly, and she felt terribly guilty.



A few days earlier she had met a childhood friend, whose father had died. Even though she had not seen him for over 40 years, Jane could picture him clearly. She saw him as she had, throughout her childhood, dressed in a butcher's apron, standing at the counter offering customers cuts of meat. Why, she asked, could she picture that man so clearly, but could not visualize her own husband?

John realized that the only picture she had ever formed of her friend's father was that of the butcher; whereas she knew her husband as her lover, her friend, and the father of her children. She knew him when he was young and when he was old. She knew him when he was happy and when he was angry. She knew him in his Sunday best and in his gardening clothes. In fact, she had hundreds, if not thousands of pictures, and John suggested that they merged together leaving a bit of a blur.

It's like that when we know someone well. It is not easy to form clear-cut images of them. We know they are only caricatures of the real person.

I am convinced that the same is true about God. When I hear people talk about God in simplistic, clear-cut and dogmatic ways, I question how well they really know him. Or is it her?



Thoughts from the Front Porch Father Brian Barry



While winter has been inhibiting time spent on the front porch (particularly with that cold snap last week, which made me wonder if I'd drifted back to South Dakota without knowing it), the newest member of my family, Bear, has also been quite demanding of my time. When you have a new dog, it is tough to just go outside on your own while leaving him inside. And that is not even considering how often he needs a walk. He is certainly giving Holly and me a work out. But in the few moments I have to myself on the front porch, some of my thoughts have been turning to calling. In particular, our individual callings as Christians.

My favorite dismissal on a Sunday is "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord," which, to me, covers all the bases. We depart from the worship service, carrying Christ's peace with us into the community around us. That is actually the origin of the world "Mass." It means "sending" in Latin. So, when we celebrate the Mass on Sunday, it is all about coming together to be in communion with Christ, so we can carry Christ out into the world with us. We are sent, like the Apostles (which, by the way, also means "one sent," in Greek), out of our comfort zone to bear the Good News of the Gospel. That is one reason why the Mass is so important. The Eucharist is our spiritual food and fuel for the mission (again, another word for sending) of the Gospel. It is time for Christians to gather together, to remind ourselves why we are called to spread the Gospel, and to seek comfort from our fellow travelers on the road.

In terms of the Mass, we are looking for people to serve on Sundays, particularly as acolytes. Please take a moment to ask yourself if God is calling you to this ministry. The reason why we as a Church seek out people to serve in this capacity is because we don't believe that serving during worship is something that is specifically reserved for clergy. There have been times and places in Church history, for instance, where the lay people were severely underrepresented at the altar, particularly women. Now, what we hope for on a Sunday is for a cross-section of the parish that is visible to the world, serving at the altar. When we are called to be an acolyte, we are called to represent our community in order to paint a picture at the altar of what the Kingdom of God looks like: people of different ages, sexes, orientations, races, and ethnicities serving and praising our heavenly Father. And, in serving in that capacity, we are working together to make sure that other parishioners who attend Mass on Sunday are able to experience Christ's love and peace, before carrying him out into the world. I hope you will take a moment to consider joining us at the altar, where we can represent our community in serving and praising God together.

STUCK ON REPEAT?

In *Groundhog Day,* Bill Murray is doomed to repeat the same day over and over. For Christians, the "sin cycle" is similar: mess up, repent, resolve to do better — and fail yet again, often in the exact same ways. That movie is really about grace, contends Mark Lockard. "We fail in small ways ... and in tragic ways," he writes on MinistryMatters.com. "Sometimes I think it would be nice to be able to hit repeat and try again the next day, to aim for perfection, to be the saintly Phil Connors we see at movie's end. But that takes away the spontaneity of the new day, the challenge of being more Christ-like despite a brand-new set of circumstances."

On earth, the "chill" of sin keeps biting, but we can "face the stark winter day wrapped warmly in the knowing that it's okay to get it wrong," Lockard writes. "That's part of figuring out who we are as a beloved child of God. That's what grace is all about."

GEORGE ADAM HILLENBRAND KATHERINE HILLENBRAND

Section 19 - Lot 8

George Adam Hillenbrand, for 44 years a resident of Bayport, died in the Veterans' Memorial Hospital in Northport, in mid-June of 1953. He was 76 years old. Mr. Hillenbrand, who was a native of New York, made his home at McConnell Avenue, Bayport.

A veteran of the Spanish-American War, he was a retired carriage painter by trade. He was a member of the Junior Order of Mechanics and of the Spanish American War Veterans Camp of Patchoque.

Surviving him were his widow, Mrs. Katherine Haberman Hillenbrand; a son, Otto Hillenbrand of Bayport; two stepsons, Jacob and Edward Densing of Patchoque; a brother Otto of Jamaica; a sister, Mrs. August Schreiber, Jr. of Tappan, NY; 16 grandchildren and several great grandchildren.


Services for Mr. Hillenbrand were held in the Isaacson Funeral Home, with the Rev. Mr. Joseph H. Bond officiating. Interment was in St. Ann's Cemetery.



Katherine Haberman Hillenbrand, widow of Spanish American War veteran, George A. Hillenbrand, died in the first week of July 1956. She was a member of the Spanish American War Auxiliary of Patchogue. Born in New York, she moved first to Holbrook, then to Bayport, where she lived for 63 years.

She was survived by three sons, Jacob and Edward Densing of Patchogue and Otto Hillenbrand of Bayport; one sister, Mrs. Amanda Roubal of Brentwood; 18 grandchildren and 27 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Isaacson's Funeral Home, with the Rev. Mr. Joseph H. Bond officiating. Burial followed in St. Ann's Cemetery, Sayville.

The Chi Rho

"Chi" and "rho" are the first two letters in the Greek spelling for Christ (*XPICTOC*, pronounced "Christos"). The blending of these two letters into one symbol formed a "sacred monogram." Early Christians created many such symbols as codes to indicate their discipleship while avoiding detection by Roman persecutors. Many variations of the Chi Rho symbol exist, incorporating a cross, a shepherd's crook, the Greek letters alpha and omega, an anchor and other images.' (The word "*Xmas*" is one modern-day word where this symbol survives).




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The Church as Mosaic
