THE MOVE TO LITTLEJOHN

Dear Parish Family,

Well, it finally happened, we moved into the Littlejohn Building on July 30, and the entire staff is ecstatic to be in our beautifully renovated building. The hardwood floors were all restored, new paint on all the walls, a dedicated youth room, a kitchen and dining room, a large conference room, and administrative offices make up the space. Not only has Littlejohn been brought back to its original beauty; we now have the room and opportunity to do more and varied outreach to the Sayville Community. The Outreach Committee is working on ideas that you will be hearing about in the near future.

But, there are three people who are the most responsible for us being in our new space and I want to



thank them for everything thing they did—and are doing—for Saint Ann's in this project. Ernie DeWitt, who was our demolition man, worked tirelessly to get the building ready for the renovation and worked on projects throughout the renovation. Nancy Koinoglou bid out all the jobs and got us the best price for everything we needed for the building. For example we got the new furniture in the clergy offices at cost, a new kitchenette (complete with new floor, sink, cabinets, counter tops and full size refrigerator) was put in for \$825.00, a new boiler for the building had to be purchased and we saved tens

of thousands of dollars! Nancy also served as the project manager making sure the sub-contractors stayed on task and on time! George Koinoglou used his professional architectural skills to communicate with the contractors, to ensure the work was being done to our standards, and in general keep a daily eve on the work and its progress.

These folks didn't charge anything for their time, but if we had hired a project manager we would have spent about \$40,000 - \$50,000! So, when you see these three parishioners please thank them for the work they did for Saint Ann's because they did an excellent job!

At the moment, it looks like we will finish the renovation for approximately \$175,000. Please remember the funds we used for this renovation came from the money given by the Sayville Project which totaled \$218,000. No money from the general funds was used for this renovation.

This is your building, and in the near future, we will be having an open house so everyone can see how beautiful the Littlejohn Building looks now. But in the meantime, know how happy your clergy and staff are in the new space. Please stop in and say hello!

And the nature of life is change. We must embrace this. However, we must also remember that we *need* to be involved in the changes. They are easier to understand and to deal with if we are part of

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a program of theological educationat-a-distance which originated at the University of the South School of Theology, While the program is not exclusive to the Episcopal Church, it is mainly found in parishes of this church. It is a four-year program and participants receive 18 Continuing Education Units from the University of the South for each year's work.

Persons seeking either ordained or lay ministries may enroll. EfM covers the Old and New Testaments, Church History, and Theology.

- EfM will begin on Monday, September 15th.
- Our EfM group will meet in the Littlejohn Building every Monday evening.

Safe Church Training


St. Ann's will host the Safe Church Program in the Parish Hall on Saturday, September 20th, from 9:00 AM -1:00 PM. This training is designed to increase awareness regarding misconduct and abuse of power, to outline steps toward preventing abuse, to offer ways to intervene when misconduct occurs and to equip anyone in a position of parish leadership with ways of healing and rebuilding the body of Christ.

Safe Church certificates must be renewed every 5 years. All volunteers, teachers, staff members who need to get or renew their certificates are highly recommended to join the program. Please email the church office (office@saint-anns.org) for further information regarding registration.

DRUG PREVENTION WORKSHOP

A drug prevention workshop will be presented by Outreach House Recovery Program. It is highly recommended that parents and children attend this workshop.

Reading for Fun

EPISCOPAL MYSTERY SERIES

Every now and then I stumble upon a book, or in this case, a series of books that is interesting, exciting, and, appropriately, connected to the Episcopal Church. Julia Spencer-Fleming is an American novelist of Mystery fiction. She has won the Agatha Award, Anthony Award, Macavity Awards, Dilys Award, and several others as well. Thus far, there are eight books in the Clare Fergusson – Russ VanAlstyne series.

In the first book, *In the Deep Midwinter*, (all her books are named for lines in hymns) The Rev. Clare Fergusson arrives at her new parish in Millers Kill, NY, a small town in the Adirondacks. When a baby is

left on the church steps, she works with Police Chief Russ VanAlstyne through the twists and turns of small town relationships, dead bodies, being stalked by an unknown assailant, and the fact that she's from Virginia and still hasn't bought decent snow boots. All this while she's trying to work with the Vestry of St. Alban's Episcopal Church and making sure she is available for running the parish and pastoral emergencies.

The New York Times Book Review says that the author "brings new airs and graces to the traditional small-town mystery...the rich heritage of this Adirondack Mountain region also gives depth and complexity to the crimes....Yes, this is a very small town, but ...it becomes a world that you want to visit and hate to leave." Other books in the series are: A Fountain Filled With Blood; Out of the Deep I Cry; To Darkness and To Death; All Mortal Flesh; I Shall Not Want; One Was a Soldier; and Through the Evil Days. All I know is they are keeping me on the edge of my seat. —Rodney Dudley

THE SMITH FAMILY - BAILEY SMITH

SECTION 41-LOTS 25 & 26

Bailey Smith died on September 19, 2006 after a long illness. She was a devoted parishioner of St. Ann's, and she spent much of her time assisting in the office. But, she took most joy in serving on the altar as a licensed Eucharistic minister, reader and acolyte.

Bailey grew up in Sayville with her twin brother, Elward, who predeceased her. The twins attended Sayville school. While in the Sayville Elementary School, she was a member of the Garden Club and also a Girl Scout in Troop 1. Bailey later transferred to the Cathedral School of St. Mary's in Garden City. From there she attended Wheelock College in Boston, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Education.

After college she returned to Sayville and volunteered for over 19 years in the business office of Southside Hospital. She was also treasurer of the Fire Island Pines Property Owner's Association.

An avid reader, Bailey was a regular at the Sayville Library. She was a quiet person, but those who knew her loved her. All of her charitable works are still not, and most probably will never be, known. Her love for the church she attended all of her life and particularly her concern for its wellbeing remains. On that day, September 19th, 2006 we all lost a true friend.

At the time of her death Bailey was survived by her cousins, Richard and his wife, Bailey; and Virginia Louise Smith; many friends; and her pets Deirdre, Maude and Polly.

The Reverend Robert Schwarz officiated at her funeral service and burial in the family plot in the parish cemetery. Contributions were asked to be given in her memory to the Guide Dog Foundation in Smithtown.

Censer (Thurible) and Incense

A censer (or thurible) is a vessel commonly used by Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches, as well as in the Episcopal Church, to burn incense during worship, often on special occasions. Censers come in many sizes, shapes and designs. A worship leader may swing a chain censer to waft the fragrant incense smoke over the congregation during a procession or benediction. As incense burns in a censer and smoke wafts upward, it symbolizes prayers of the faithful, floating to God. "May my prayer be set before you like incense; may the lifting up of my hands be like the evening sacrifice" (Psalm 141:2, NIV).

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
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What do we believe? Here are some things...
