We are also growing in so many ways which cannot be seen, but can be felt by many.

We already have many successful outreach programs in place, including the Thrift Shop and the food pantry, just to name a few, and we have many more ideas in mind for future outreach projects and programs. Finally, we have many educational opportunities for both young and "seasoned" Christians to get involved in, with a new and more updated program in our Christian Education program for our younger members, as well as several opportunities for those who have, let us say, outgrown Sunday school to learn more about our church and our faith, so that we will have a better understanding of why we say what we say each and every Sunday in our services.

We are also beginning our Stewardship Program here as well. Our theme seems so appropriately called, "Will you grow with us this year?" Please, please, please consider helping us to grow in our united vision of a better season to come, and help to strengthen our church with your time, treasure and talents. Please come grow with us in whatever form or forms speak to you...come plant a seed right here at Saint Ann's, and watch it blossom and grow!

Dear Parish Family,

This month you will receive your pledge card for 2016. The theme is Will You Grow With Us This Year because it exemplifies how if everyone would increase their pledge we could greatly reduce our deficit and continue the work that Saint Ann's stands for in our outreach efforts and our call to make Christ known in thought, word and deed to our community and the world. The back of your pledge card provides a chart to help you in determining how much you can afford to increase your pledge.

We do this through the open doors of Saint Ann's. Through these open doors, we have welcomed the homeless and the helpless, the spiritually hungry and those who are left feeling, for whatever reason, no one cares about them. We also walk out of our open doors into our community to be a missionary, a beacon of God's light and to serve those who need our help.

And yes, it takes money to keep the doors of the church open and the lights on in order to provide the ministries we offer. But, the lights are kept on so that we can make a difference in the lives of those who enter our doors, or are *helped* by the ministries we offer to our community. And that is why we need your pledge.

Saint Ann's has been blessed with several endowments. But, the vast majority of them (actually 85% of our investments) are restricted funds, meaning they may only be used for the specific purpose given (Christian Education, Cemetery, Flower Fund, etc.). They may not be used to pay for the general operating expenses of Saint Ann's such as the electric bill, staff and clergy salaries, heating oil, etc.

We also have unrestricted funds which are our savings and checking account, and they comprise 15% of our investments. These are the funds which may be used for any purpose and are used to pay the electric bill, staff and clergy salaries, heating oil, etc. Your pledges go into the unrestricted funds of the church so that we may pay for the general expenses to keep the church running on a daily basis.

For several years, we have been running a deficit budget; which means we are spending more than we receive in pledges. The difference, for several years, has been made up by taking money from our savings account (unrestricted funds) to balance the budget. We cannot continue to do that or we will deplete our savings account within a few short years.

So, if you are not yet pledging, we need your pledge. If you are currently pledging, please prayerfully consider increasing your pledge. If you are currently giving, but not pledging, please convert your giving to a pledge so a clearer financial picture may be developed for Saint Ann's.

When you receive your pledge card, please prayerfully discern your commitment to the life and ministry of Saint Ann's, growing with us by filling out your pledge card and increasing your pledge so we may continue to do the work of Christ and the Church.

ASSOCIATE'S COLUMN

"God said to them... Have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." (NRSV, Genesis 1:28b)

This scripture had been misinterpreted for many centuries. People believed that they could treat animals and all other creatures as they needed or wanted. In 1840, The Rev. Thomas Fuller regretted that humans had exterminated some species and enslaved animals, saying, "We have treated our distant cousins in fur and feathers so badly that beyond doubt, if they were able to formulate a religion, they would depict the devil in human form." The wrong perspective for "dominion" can be observed even now as we recently heard about a doctor accused of killing a famous lion in an illegal hunt in Zimbabwe.

However, "dominion" means that human beings should keep all creations as "God saw that it was

owners of all creations, but stewards over them. St. Francis may be the first and the most famous saint who became an icon of the stewardship for all creations in God's perspective. According to the stories of St. Francis, he preached to attentive flocks of birds, dissuaded mosquitoes from biting him (I need this gift!!!), and even convinced a wolf to stop harming people and livestock. The main concept of his attitudes is to "communicate" and "co-exist" with animals while respecting the value of God's creation. Compared to others in his age and before, this new approach itself was the blessing of the animals.

The Episcopal Church inherits his pro-animal stance as the 76th General Convention, in 2009, reaffirmed that animals are part of creation and that humans must be "responsible stewards" over them.

At the Blessing of the Animals, people remember and emulate the example of St. Francis of Assisi and his love for animals in appreciation for God's creations.

Saint Ann's Episcopal Church will present the Blessing of Animals at 2:00 PM on Sunday, October 4th in front of the church building. It is the feast day of St. Francis as well. All kinds of pets and animals in fur, feathers, or even scales are welcome to celebrate God's grace and love in all creations.



Bishop Provenzano Appoints Bishop Geralyn Wolf Assisting Bishop of Long Island

Bishop Provenzano has announced the appointment of the Right Reverend Geralyn Wolf as Assisting Bishop of Long Island, starting September 27, primarily to assist with parish visitations and confirmations.

Bishop Provenzano said, "I look forward to welcoming Bishop Wolf this coming academic year. She will add tremendous experience and wisdom to our diocesan life and ministry."

Bishop Wolf was ordained priest in 1977 in the Diocese of Pennsylvania, where she served two curacies before becoming the vicar of an inner-city parish in Philadelphia.

In 1987, she became the Dean of Christ Church Cathedral in Louisville, Kentucky, and oversaw the planning of an extensive renovation of the Cathedral. In 1995, she was elected the twelfth Bishop of the Diocese of Rhode Island where she served for 17 years.

During the Rt. Rev. Frank Griswold's term as presiding bishop, Bishop Wolf was the liturgist for the House of Bishops. Her work in this field had a strong impact on all her ministries.

Bishop Wolf has done extensive work in urban ministry, especially with soup kitchens, thrift shops, and the homeless. Her book, *Down and Out in Providence*, was a result of spending thirty days as a homeless person.

As a young adult she was a locally-ranked tennis player and member of the United States Field Hockey team that represented the United States on tour in Argentina.

Bishop Wolf and her husband, Tom Bair, retired in 2012, and moved to Manhattan in 2015. Bishop Wolf also shares a small art studio in Brooklyn where she makes whimsical characters and animals out of wood and found objects.


Both she and Tom were born in New York; he in Utica, and she in Brooklyn.

Our Church History

❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten ❖

ROBERT G. GROH ANNA M. GROH Section 42 - Lot 1

Robert G. Groh died at the age of 70 of a massive heart attack at his home at 103 Manton Street in early June of 1961. He and Mrs. Groh were preparing to leave for a trip to the west coast to visit their son when Mr. Groh was struck down.

Born in Sayville, the son of the late Paul and Hermina Jimlett Groh, he lived his entire life here. For many years, he worked with his father in Groh's hotel, a Sayville landmark and during WWII he worked as a mechanic for Grumman Aircraft Corporation, retiring in 1944. He was a veteran of WWI, having served in the US Army. He was life-long member of Connectquot Lodge F & M and of Smith Weaver Post, American Legion.

He was survived by his wife, the former Miss Anna Wetzler, one son, Robert P. Groh of Bellingham, Washington, two brothers, Leonard of Sayville and Paul Groh of Bellport and one sister, Mrs. Amelia Rhodes of East Islip, and three grandchildren.


