ST. BARNABAS DAY



Pentecost Sunday, which marks the end of the Easter season in the Christian calendar, celebrates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles. Pentecost falls 50 days after Easter, and this year is celebrated on June 12th—also St. Barnabas Day.

Pentecost is recognized as the birth of the Christian Church. The Apostle Peter preached a sermon which resulted in 3,000 people becoming believers.

The sanctuary color for Pentecost Sunday is red. The red symbolizes both

the fire of Pentecost and the apostles and early followers of Jesus who were gathered in the Upper Room for the empower-ment from God to proclaim the Gospel throughout the world.

For Christians, Pentecost Sunday is a day to celebrate hope, a hope evoked by the knowledge that God through His Holy Spirit is at work among His people. It is a celebration of newness, of re-creation, of renewal of purpose, mission, and calling as God's people. It is a celebration of God's ongoing work in the world. Yet, it is also a recognition that His work is done through His people as He pours out His presence upon them.

Change

Change is constant and inevitable. Tradition is valued and valuable. How do we balance both?

June is a month of changes: the lengthening days as summer approaches, graduations and weddings, the summer routines of beaches and barbecues. These are anticipated and positive changes. Of course, change occurs throughout the year and throughout our lives. Usually we welcome change. It's part of progress or growth. It is expected.

It is the unexpected, negative changes that upset us most. There can be natural disasters, diseases of loved ones, sudden deaths, job losses. How do we cope? How do we discern God's will when faced with that kind of change in our life? Yet we do go on; we pray; we adapt.

Change can also affect us negatively when it comes on too fast and doesn't seem necessary. This is probably more of a concern as we grow older, but I am sure that younger people also balk at changes that seem to be thrust on them.

At our Parish meeting in March, there was a splendid consistency in what we all felt were the special values and gifts of St. Ann's. It was a constant, probably an historical constant of warmth, caring for those in our parish family, and a welcoming attitude. Yet another point most parishioners agreed upon was the necessity of welcoming more young families and of providing more programs for our youth. That, we know, will necessitate change.

The Vestry is well aware of the delicate balance we must maintain between change and tradition. We want to make things work more smoothly, to improve communications, to grow as a vibrant church community, and so on. Certainly, the calling of a new rector will again bring change to St. Ann's.

However, your Vestry doesn't intend to change anything just for the sake of change. For example, we will not be deciding on a new logo for our parish; that's been tabled indefinitely.

We value the traditions that have made St. Ann's so special while we welcome changes that will help our parish to stay special.

TRY IT, YOU'LL LIKE IT--SIGN UP FOR FACEBOOK



Signing up for Facebook is a relatively easy process. If you have email and Internet access, it will only take you a few minutes to get started. A simple Google or Yahoo search for the word "Facebook" will bring you to the Facebook home page. On the right side there is a place to sign up that will ask you for your first and last name, your e-mail address, a password, gender

and date of birth. Your email address is needed so that Facebook can notify you if you get a message from someone who knows you. There is a host of menu-driven options that enable you to create a Facebook profile of yourself. The more information you add to your profile, the easier it is to be "found" by a former classmate, work acquaintance etc. as most of this information is added to a searchable database.

You can enter as much information as you like and you can also include a photo of yourself as well. Only a small portion of that profile can be seen by strangers unless you accept a "friend" request from someone that you know and you would like to contact. You can also search for friends as well by using known past or current educational institutions, places of employment, churches, etc.

As of this writing, there are over 500 million active users! If you do join Facebook, please search for "St. Ann's Episcopal Church, Sayville NY" in the search box at the top of the page. When you go to the St. Ann's page please be sure to click the "Like" button on the top of the page so that you can be better informed of all that is going on at St. Ann's. —John Smith

SEARCH COMMITTEE PROGRESS

Representatives of the Search Committee and the Wardens met with Canon Betit on April 18th, at his request. The Canon is very enthusiastic about our search and proceeded to advise us in more detail about the process. From the pool of applicants, the Search

Committee is to send "essay questions" to about 24 of those we feel might fit our profile. From those responses, the Search Committee will interview about 12 by telephone. We must then narrow the field to about six whom we will interview more directly. From that result, a list of three names will be submitted to the Vestry for consideration for the position of Rector of St. Ann's.

As you can see, we have a lot of work to do! The Search Committee is currently in the first phase of the process. We will accept applications until June 15th. We are meeting weekly to keep up with

the many applications we are receiving. Obviously, many qualified candidates are impressed with our profile, for which we thank those of the congregation who attended the parish meeting on March 5th as well as the writing committee that honed the input of the parish to a produce our beautiful tri-fold brochure which you can access on our website. Please take a look at it and be proud!

I would like to take a moment to thank the Search Committee for their faithfulness, perseverance, and good humor. You may rest assured that we take our job seriously. We have had 100% attendance at every meeting!

Most of all, we ask your regular prayers as we take the journey set before us. Please take a minute and invoke the Holy Spirit to guide those of us with the responsibility of presenting the "short list" to the Vestry. **–Linda Munkelwitz**

THE CURATE'S COLUMN



Prayer



Christians often think of prayer as talking to God, usually in the form of petitions and thanksgivings. This is certainly one aspect of praying, but we need to expand our understanding of prayer beyond merely talking to a fuller *relating* to God.

It is helpful to consider that, in our relations with other people, we cannot not communicate. Our facial expressions, body language, and decision to speak or not to speak all communicate a message to others that they may grasp, consciously or unconsciously. Indeed, sometimes, the best way a friend can relate is to sit with us in silence. In those moments, there can exist a keen awareness of the connection between our friend and us. Just as we relate to other people in many ways other

than through the use of words, we relate to God in a much broader manner. If we are more aware of how we relate to God, then we can deepen that relationship.

We are all called into different forms of relationship with God, and we can identify to what relationship we are called when we are focused, centered, present in the here and now, where God is, rather than anxious and distracted from the present. Once we have identified what brings that focus to us, we can cultivate it, and as we grow in presence, we can share that presence quietly with those around us. We become living icons, pointing others to God. This focus may come to us during such activities as gardening, jogging, saying the rosary, baking, saying Morning Prayer, or weightlifting. Recognizing that all these and more can be forms of prayer gives us permission to enjoy our activities as such and to develop further our prayerfulness. We must listen where God is calling us and allow ourselves to enjoy that time of heightened awareness of God's presence, that sacred space.

BARNABAS BUDDIES

Small deeds done are better than great deeds planned.

Simply stated...Barnabas Buddies is an INREACH program to assist parish families who could use help on a short term basis. - (3) Bring someone to church (perhaps once a month) if they are unable to drive.
- (4) Make a phone call to someone homebound just to let them know they are not forgotten.

EDWARD PHIEFFER

1895-1905 Section 11 Lot 4 (Hayes Plot)

Edward Phieffer, the ten year old son of Mrs. Elizabeth Phieffer died tragically in the home of his grandmother, Mrs. Edward Berger, on McConnell Avenue, Bayport on July 30, 1905. In the morning, Mrs. Phieffer, accompanied by her son, went over to her mother's house where she took in laundry work for a livelihood.

In the early evening the boy was sent down in the cellar on an errand. It was dark at the time, and he struck a match to find his way around. Nothing more was heard and after a few minutes, when he did not return the mother went to look for him. Meanwhile the neighbors had seen flames leaping out of the cellar and had spread an alarm.

The flames were extinguished, and the body of the boy was taken out, but not until he had been fatally burned. He lived and suffered all that night and died the next morning. The firemen were called out and there was soon a crowd of willing workers on hand to do what they could for the heartbroken mother.

An investigation proved that a leaky gasoline can had been placed in the cellar and a pan had been placed beneath it to catch the drippings. The cellar was practically filled with gas and when the boy struck a match there was an explosion which it is believed stunned him so that he was unconsciously being burned to death. The funeral took place from St. Ann's Church; the burial was in St. Ann's Cemetery

STAY NOURISHED

Our garden was growing well last summer. Everything was green, and the vegetables were developing beautifully. Then we had a drought, and the plants began to wilt. They didn't receive the nourishment they needed to survive. Their roots hadn't grown deep enough to remain healthy.

I thought about that in relation to my life, finding the two to be much alike. 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
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NOTIFICATION OF PASTORAL NEEDS

To protect confidentiality, the HIPPA laws also prohibit church staff from sharing any information unless the parishioner/patient gives his/her permission for disclosure.
