Taylor's specialty is Toiletries, which includes toothpaste and toothbrushes, shampoo, hand creams, and, on occasion, makeup for some of the ladies.

Recently, at Sayville High School, where Taylor is a Freshman, they held an Anti-Bias assembly in the auditorium and invited students, on a volunteer basis, to come up on the stage and share some of their thoughts on bias and bigotry in our society.

Taylor went up on stage and talked about her experiences with PBJ and the homeless people she has met and helped in New York. Taylor is probably one of few teens who have had this opportunity to get to know the homeless who—with a run of bad luck—could be any one of us. Thanks, Taylor, for your witness!

Vestry Visions

This month's Vestry Visions is going to highlight a small but mighty group of women whose presence and service is seen and felt in so many aspects of life here at St. Ann's. They are ever present both "behind the scenes" or out on the grounds, helping in whatever ways they can, as well as up at the altar or up and down the aisles, participating in the services, whenever needed. Their commitment to serving in whatever way they can is at the core of the doctrine of the Daughters of the King. In addition, they are a living testament to the power of prayer and how it can transform the lives of those less fortunate than us, as they have already helped so many, with only a small number of hands doing the work. As you read the following, just imagine how much more they would be able to do with your help and prayers...

Daughters of the King – "What inquiring minds want to know"

1. What made this ministry something that you wanted to get involved in?

We have always been firm believers in prayer and service to others, and the MOTTO of the daughters is: "For His Sake..."

I am but one, but I am one. I cannot do everything, but I can do something. What I can do, I ought to do. What I ought to do, by the grace of God I will do. Lord, what will you have me do?

In other words, just get out there and help however you can. You can be young, old, able or disabled in some form, just get out there and do something. It keeps you young in mind and spirit.

2. What are the different aspects of the Daughters of the King, that people might be able to participate in?

We take vows for Prayer and service to show others the loving power of God. We are strong believers in prayer and using the talents that God has given all of us. We all have a talent of some kind and it does no good if we keep it to ourselves. Everyone can pray. There is no right or wrong way of doing it. Prayer is a state of being, not just a physical or verbal thing. It is amazing how it can bring such peace of mind, especially in the hectic world we now live in.

3. What is your favorite part of working with the Daughters of the King?

We enjoy being with like-minded women and working in the community. Our common goal is to bring others into a loving relationship with Jesus, and to strengthen our spiritual life.

4. What is the most difficult part of working with the Daughters of the King?

The most difficult part is that we do not have chapters near St. Ann's, so it is important to attend Diocesan and Provincial meetings and retreats. We also make a commitment to work with Daughters in our chapter, to do projects to help the needy and homeless in our community. We work on projects for The Eastern Farm Workers, the Hope House in Port Jefferson, our own PB &J ministry, and for St. John's Episcopal Nursing Home in Far Rockaway.

5. When and how did this ministry come to be?

The Order was founded on Easter Eve 1885 by Margaret Franklin, at the Church of The Holy Sepulcher in New York City. It grew out of her Adult Women's Bible study. It is an order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church and churches that are in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate but not in communion with it. Today our membership includes women in the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran (ELCA), and Roman Catholic churches. Members undertake a Rule of Life, which incorporates the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service. International chapters are found in many countries around the world.

6. Who benefits from this ministry?

Everyone can benefit from this ministry. You must just follow the promises that we make every time we reaffirm our Baptism and Confirmation.

7. Is there any other information that you would like us to know?

Every Daughter wears the same cross, either on a chain or as a pin. It is a constant reminder of our vows. The horizontal Latin inscription on the cross, "MAGNANIMETER CRUCEM SUSTINE", broadly translated means "with heart, mind, and spirit uphold and bear the cross". The initials FHS at the base of the cross mean "FOR HIS SAKE". Our chapter has been working on "being covered in Prayer". We make the small prayer quilts, the larger quilts, and prayer squares that we hand out at funerals, nursing homes, as well as to the sick and needy, or whoever needs some prayer in their life. We also make hats and scarves for the needy and homeless. We have these items blessed before we give them out, with the hope that the prayers and blessings will bring comfort and hope to those who receive them.

We would like to encourage other women in our parish to join us in this ministry. Doing mission work to help others in need is so rewarding and makes a difference to our community. We can teach you to knit, crochet, quilt or cut bags for sleeping mats. We are also in need of quilting and flannel fabrics. We will be meeting on Wednesday mornings in the Littlejohn building from 9:30 - 11:30 starting April 11th until the middle of June. You can also work on projects at home, if you can't make it to our meetings.

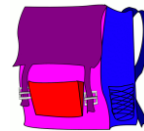

- We need hats, scarves, gloves and mittens—for men, women, children, and babies.



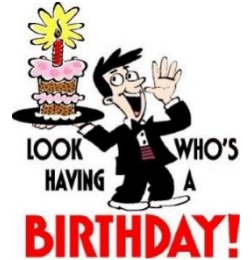

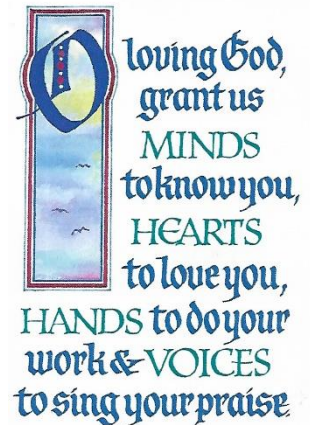

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

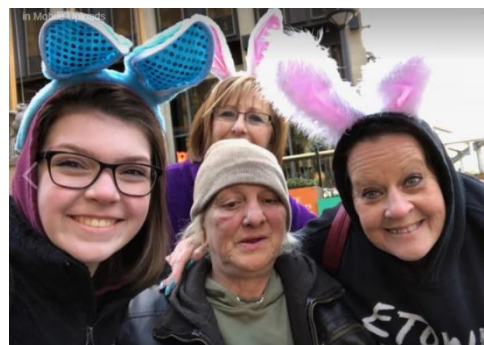
I am elated to report, that this past mission trip to NYC was nothing short of amazing! Between our joyous group from St. Ann's, a couple of new ministry friends from Stop and Shop, and Zion Episcopal Church, we had a total of 15 missionaries to serve God's Saints who call the sidewalks of NYC their home. We boarded the 6:35 AM train out of Ronkonkoma, with five wagons filled with all of your generous donations of clothing, toilet paper, snacks, Easter Eggs, shoes, and hygiene products.



We were blessed with decent weather, and those conditions brought out over 100 souls in need--many regulars, and many new people. As we set up in front of Madison Square Garden, we were joined by our friends from Zion Church, also bringing an amazing amount of supplies, along with much needed peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. We were met with many hungry people, many coming back for more sandwiches. One of the most popular items is the Cup o' Noodle Soups, because they are filling, and hot water to prepare them can be obtained in any public restroom. The joy of the recipients was truly contagious. I was really happy to receive many

requests for prayer, and we were all happy to begin with a prayer circle.

Many of you heard of me speak of Donna, a lady who I have known for more than several years (and our missionaries have come to know her too). Donna lived on the street during the day and slept in a shelter at night. You see, most shelters have a mandatory rule, that people must leave by 6:00 or 7:00 AM. For the past 5 months, Donna had been missing. I was worried, and called around several shelters, and asked several people about her. It was believed that she had gone home to God. As sad as I was, I was relieved that she no longer suffered. Well, I am happy to report, that Donna was actually in the hospital. She had become very ill, and has spent the last several months, being treated for spinal cancer. As we were packing up to walk the streets to minister, Donna came rolling up in her wheelchair!! You see, Donna had been hurriedly rolling her wheelchair towards our spot, remembering that we would be there, the last Saturday of the month!!!! Her face was bright with joy when she spotted us, and we had tears of joy in our eyes, as we all rushed towards her for reunion hugs! Donna looked healthy and happy, and she is working with a new shelter for residency, soon to receive housing!



So, no matter how cold, hot, or whatever uncomfortable weather conditions are happening, keeping our promise of going to help, is a beacon of hope and love. It's really tough getting up early, constantly asking for donations, packing up wagons and dragging them on the train, but I bet my bottom dollar, it's nothing compared to Christ's suffering for us to have eternal life, or for people like Donna. Please consider joining us, in prayer, donations, or coming along! The sunshine of Christ's Face in the homeless, will stay in your heart forever. PS if you would like to donate, please consider sweatpants and sweatshirts, Cup o' Noodle Soup, toilet paper, shoes for men and women, and we desperately need backpacks, for the homeless to carry their items. PS—We talk about how the PBJ mission helps our friends on the street, but it helps the givers as well. One new missionary brought her 9-year old daughter with her, and we were wondering how she'd feel about this experience. When we had been working for about an hour, I heard her whisper to her mother that she wanted to come again because she loved seeing the people so happy when she gave them their bag of sandwiches, soup, snacks, and an Easter egg! What a loving attitude! (And a little child shall lead us!)

Following God's Lead

Jazz musician Thomas Dorsey traveled an unlikely road to become the "father of black gospel music." At age 11, he dropped out of school to be a vaudeville performer and blues pianist. While Dorsey recovered from a nervous breakdown at age 21, his mother urged him to serve the Lord with his talents. It took several years, but the musician committed to composing spiritual songs — rejected by many mainstream churches as "the devil's music."

In 1932, after Dorsey's wife and infant son died during childbirth, he channeled his grief into the piano, writing "Precious Lord, Take My Hand." Known to be a favorite song of Martin Luther King Jr., it ends with these lyrics: "Through the storm, through the night, lead me on to the light. Take my hand, precious Lord, lead me home."

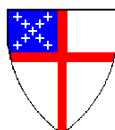

CHANGE AGENTS

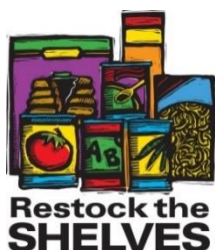

Section 72 – Lot 3

WILLIAM H. JOST of Patchogue, father of Howard T. Jost of Bayport, died on a Tuesday in January 1945 in Meadowbrook Hospital, East Hempstead, where he was taken after becoming ill on the train on his way to work at the Grumman Aircraft Plant in Bethpage.

Mr. Jost was born in Germany, but he had lived in Patchogue for the past 24 years. He was survived by his wife, Mrs. Bertha Jost of Patchogue; two sons, Wesley of Yardley, PA; and Howard of Bayport; a brother Timothy, of Great River; and six grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 8:30 on Friday evening in the R. M. Sharp Funeral Chapel in Patchogue and were conducted by the Rev. Carl G. Garnaunt of Emanuel Lutheran Church. Interment was in St. Ann's Cemetery.

MRS. MARIANNA JORDAN
Section 47 – Lots 1-12

Sayville's oldest native-born resident, **Mrs. Marianna Jordan**, 98 years old, died Saturday at the Ursuline Nursing Home in Oakdale during the last week of March 1961.

Born in 1862, the daughter of Howell D. and Ellen Hampton Smith, she lived here until her marriage to Stephen Jordan, and then resided in Patchogue and Port Jefferson. Seventeen years ago, she came back here to make her home with her niece, Mrs. Helen M. Grayson, at 383 Hillside Avenue, West Sayville.

Mrs. Jordan was born in the family homestead on what is now the Montauk Highway, about where the Sayville Ford agency is located, and took in the property down Foster Avenue to the meadows.

Besides Mrs. Grayson, she was survived by Mrs. Olive Auringer of West Sayville; and a brother, Charles Z. Smith of Sayville. Services were in Raynor's Chapel in Sayville, with The Reverend Philip H. Dodd, Pastor of the Methodist Church, officiating. Interment followed in St. Ann's Cemetery.

Phoenix

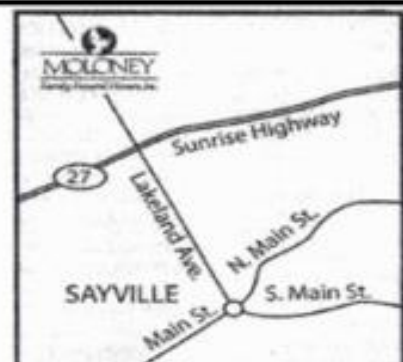
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
