MORE LENT - HANG OUT WITH JESUS!!

How's Lent for You? We are about a third of the way along to Easter. Has it been a special time, getting closer to Jesus and having more "family time" with Him? Or is it the same oh, same oh with busy things to do and no time to do them. Lent is a time to let go in order to move to new future. St. Ann's is doing that in the rector's search process. Some questions you might ask yourself in the remainder of Lent:



Do I feel like I am in a wilderness? Am I facing temptation and need help to resist? Do I see weakness in myself and the need to change? What do I need to allow to die in me in order to be closer to God? What do I need to confess in order to be rid of quilt? With what am I struggling and in pain? Do setbacks and losses eat away at me? How far have I strayed from God's purpose for my life? Do I doubt God, myself, others? From what or whom do I run away and hide? Does saying goodbye to people and places leave me feeling sad?

Fr. Farrell and I can be available for you on these questions or another concern you may have. Have you taken advantage of our Tuesday and Wednesday courses, attended church every Sunday, engaged in Lenten devotions such as the Stations of the Cross, to fast and to pray? Our Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori asks us, "Are we traveling light on this earth? Consider as you live through each day, how you use water, how you use fuel, how you use electricity, and how you use the food that is a gift."

I want to make a suggestion to each of you about your own Lenten discipline. Consider the use of silence in your Lenten observance. Make it a point to come to the Sunday service five minutes before it begins. And, instead of rushing around saying hello to others, sit for a moment in silence, Close your eyes. Become aware of your breathing. Tell God what, in particular, you are bringing to the altar that day. Maybe take a walk around to a couple of the stained glass windows or look at the icon near the pulpit. Say your prayers and consider what God is revealing to you. Keep moments before church in silence. It will pay rich dividends, trust me. I have done it for years.

THE CURATE'S COLUMN



God Makes Heretics of Us All



There are many ways of envisioning God, some more helpful than others, but none that exhaust the nature of God. Many have nevertheless tried to tie God down, as it were. There are, for example, two major competing explanations of the Trinity (western and Cappadocian), neither of which I find particularly helpful. One can be a Trinitarian without needing to understand the exact nature of the relationships between the members of the Trinity. In fact, the more we think we have limited God to our concepts, the more we impoverish our relationship with God. The same is true of people. If we allow ourselves to see only particular aspects of people (as often happens when we meet a person who is different from us in a manner we consider to be a salient),

then we limit our relationships with them. We have to let go of our restrictive categories if we are to allow the relationship to flourish. If people are too subtle for our concepts, how much moreso is God?

Even concepts like "powerful" can limit God. I am reminded of the humorous prayer in Monty Python's *The Meaning of Life*:

"Oh Lord, ooh you are so big, so absolutely huge. Gosh, we're all really impressed down here, I can tell you. Forgive us, oh Lord, for this our dreadful toadying and barefaced flattering. But you are so strong and, well, just so super fantastic."

Unlike the God of this prayer, God is not big in a human way. God is not human writ large, but we keep re-humanizing God, and God keeps escaping our categories. God eventually makes heretics of us all, and each time God escapes, we have an opportunity to grow in our relationship with God, just as we may grow in relationship with people when they reveal to us new facets of their beings. We take up a new, fuller understanding and leave the old behind.

Still, we need *some* way of talking about God, and certain ways are better than others. I would propose that the image of God as controlling everything that happens, for example, is not as broadly useful as the image of God as one who seeks to guide us and who rejoices with us when we are joyful and who weeps with us when we are sorrowful. With this understanding of God, our response to suffering is not, "Why do You do this to me, God," but "Guide me, as a loving shepherd, through the thicket, God." There are, of course, even more useful metaphors for God to be found, perhaps in the thicket itself. We trust, moreover, that the thicket is sometimes the fastest way to get to where we need to be. As Lent comes to an end, I hope that your travels have brought you closer to where you need to be.

A NEW BEGINNING March 5, 2011

An enthusiastic group of about 80 people assembled in the Parish Hall on Saturday morning, March 5, to take part in the process of finding our vision for St. Ann's. Fr. Bruce Griffith was our moderator, and Fr. Gary will be glad to know that we had fun!

The Vestry and Search Committee, which had been through the appreciative inquiry process at January's kickoff meeting, were prepared to train a new larger group of people. For the first exercise, we broke into ten groups, each with our own set of two facilitators. Interviewing each other, we extracted information as to what brought each person to church and the indelible memories that were left with them. Each person focused on the best St. Ann's has had to offer and how we could improve even further. A side note to this process is that we got to know other people in our groups a little better. The Mrs. Jones we used to nod good morning to became the Sarah Jones who had a wonderful experience when someone welcomed her into the church as a stranger, and she stayed to become involved because people had taken an interest in her. People from 8:00 spoke with people from 10:00; people from 11:30 spoke with the 5:00 attendees. Faces were put together with names. The ten groups then reconvened, and the leaders of each group reported a summarized version of the points that were brought up within their group.

The afternoon brought another exercise. We were asked to close our eyes and imagine a metaphor in our minds of what the future church might look like in our mind's eye. Being directly after lunch, this was a somewhat dangerous exercise, and I believe a couple of people did doze off! After about ten minutes of visualizing, which Bruce talked us through, we broke up into five groups to discuss our images and to put them together into a presentation. Each group had a poster on which to draw our representative images, and presented it to the other groups. Some of the images were a rose blooming with spirit and life, a church as beacon on a hill, a haven of peace, a welcoming building filled with the warmth of friendship, a wheel of fellowship, faith, and communication that passes among us all... In spite of the seriousness of our quest, there was great creativity, good humor, laughter and an easy camaraderie among us.

At the end of the day, we felt we had all contributed to finding the Core Values of St. Ann's. The words *welcoming*, *acceptance*, *hope*, *joy*, *healing*, *outreach*, *fellowship*, *inspiration*, *support*, *sharing* of talents and abilities, stability, *tradition*, and other uplifting words reflected the experience of the group. One of the things I found interesting is that chores that may seem like a burden in one person's mind (organizing a potluck supper, cooking for 200 people, polishing the church's collection of silver, teaching a weekly Sunday School class, repairing the property,...) are opportunities in other's minds for giving back to the church and occasions to increase their joy of sharing. BARNABAS BUDDIES

Small deeds done are better than great deeds planned.

Simply stated...Barnabas Buddies is an INREACH program to assist parish families who could use help on a short term basis. We can provide help and comfort just by offering our time and a listening ear. Four ministries we would like to suggest as INREACH to those in our parish who call for help are:

- (1) Prepare a meal for someone recovering from a recent illness or fall.
- (2) Drive someone to a doctor's appointment and bring them home.
- (3) Bring someone to church (perhaps once a month) if they are unable to drive.
- (4) Make a phone call to someone homebound just to let them know they are not forgotten.

NOTIFICATION OF PASTORAL NEEDS

The clergy will gladly visit parishioners and bring Communion if requested, but need to know whether the patient is at home or in which hospital they have been admitted. To protect confidentiality, the HIPPA laws also prohibit church staff from sharing any information unless the parishioner/patient gives his/her permission for disclosure.
