*** A NEW RECTOR FOR ST. ANN'S ***

It is with great joy that your Vestry announces the election of the Reverend Diane Britt to be the ninth Rector of St. Ann's Episcopal Church. Mother Britt has been the Rector at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Katonah, NY since 2006. She is letting her parishioners know of her move to St. Ann's now as we tell all of you the good news.

The Reverend Ms. Britt will be moving into the Rectory and then officially beginning her work with us in mid-February.

The search and discernment process which we have just completed has been one of amazing cooperation, unity, and hopefulness. Last January, the newly-commissioned Search Committee and the Vestry met with Fr. Bruce Griffith to discern our sense of what St. Ann's *is*, not what St. Ann's *needs*.

This process of Appreciative Inquiry was repeated at the Parish Meeting in March during which our common values and hopes were the focus. The goal was to describe St. Ann's' unique characteristics so that we could find the priest who would be the best match with us in terms of spirit and values. Through that meeting, a Parish Profile was created and the position was publicized.

The Search Committee met numerous times and read over 40 applications. From those, eight applicants were interviewed by phone. The five who seemed to be the best match then came to St. Ann's and met with the Search Committee. They celebrated a mass and were interviewed.

By early November, the Search Committee determined the top candidates and notified the Vestry. These candidates again came to St. Ann's, shared a meal with us, celebrated a mass, and were interviewed. They also met with Bishop Provenzano. The Vestry was able to get a sense of who each one is, who would be the best match. We were blessed by being able to choose between such wonderful priests, and we believe that the Holy Spirit helped us as we came to our unanimous decision. Our choice is Mother Britt.

She is a warm and energetic person. Her pastoral and outreach skills are very strong. She is in tune with children. The list goes on and on. We are eager to have her come to St. Ann's; we are eager to have you get to know her.

The Vestry extends its heartfelt praise and appreciation to the Search Committee, led by Linda Munkelwitz, for their exceptional commitment of time and energy. The support of the Diocese--the Bishop, staff, and particularly the Rev. Canon John Betit, has been invaluable throughout the search process. We thank him and all who have made this such a positive, wonder-full journey. And we thank all who have prayed for St. Ann's during this year. We believe we've found that "faithful pastor, who will care for us and equip us for our ministries."

THE CURATE'S COLUMN

THE HOW'S AND WHY'S OF GOD AND DINOSAURS



animals' extinction. evidence is found.

One of our younger members recently asked me which came first, dinosaurs or the Garden of Eden. What an excellent question, I thought. I gave her a brief explanation and promised her that I would answer it more fully in my next *Correspondent* article. The story of the Garden of Eden in Genesis and the story of the geological history of our planet explain two different things. Geological history explains the events of our planet as they happened in real time. We have found that insects, amphibians, bony fish, and spiders appeared from 438 to 408 million years ago. Dinosaurs did not appear until 208 million years ago and were extinct by 147 million years ago. The first humans appeared much more recently, only 1.8 million years ago, and coexisted with mammoths, mastodons, and saber-toothed cats until those This is a story about earth's history. We continue to improve it as new fossil

The Genesis stories (there are two creation narratives in Genesis), on the other hand, are not about the historical succession of events. They are about our relationship to God. They tell us that God created the world, for example, and that we were created in the likeness of God, which means that we have a special relationship with the Creator. In the first account, human beings were created after all other things were completed, as the crown of creation. Once God finishes creating and pronouncing everything good, God rests. This story suggests that the universe is exactly as God intended.

In the second creation story, a man is created before plants and rain and animals. After the creation of Adam, God then plants a garden, and only then does God create woman because it is not good for people to be alone. Though this story suggests that women were an afterthought*, at least it recognizes that human beings are essentially social creatures. We need relationships with other humans and with God. It is also in this second version of creation that we find the tree of knowledge of good and evil. The story explains how knowledge of good and evil is related to our partial separation from God. If we were one with God, we could not choose. It is our partial separation from God that allows us the freedom to do what we wish. This story explains why there is evil in the world.

Space does not allow me to explore more fully the meanings of these two stories, but the point here is to show how they differ in their intentions from the story of geological history. Geology explains *how* things came to be. Genesis explains *why* they came to be.

Vestry Visions



Archdeacon Alexandre, opening the festivities, remarked that the job of an Interim Priest-in- Charge is to "love 'em and leave 'em." Although we knew in advance that Fr. ADULT CONFIRMATION CLASS COMING SOON

Confirmation is one of the sacraments of initiation, along with Baptism and Eucharist. The Sacrament of Confirmation draws us into a greater awareness of the Holy Spirit, which we received at Baptism. Through this sacrament, we confirm the presence of the baptismal gifts we have



already received; we are sealed with the gift -undeserved and unearned -- of the Holy Spirit.

As this is an ongoing process, all who are interested would be welcome. Some want to refresh their understanding of the Church and some might just wish to find out what the Episcopal Church is all about. For those who wish to be confirmed or received, attendance is mandatory.

Those interested in being confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church should call the church office and speak to Fr. Farrell. Instruction will begin in early February and run through April. The date for Confirmation this year is May 5th.

REBUILD THE CATHEDRAL IN HAITI

January 29th

When the earthquake hit Haiti in January 2010, it effectively leveled the most populous diocese of The Episcopal Church. Seventy percent of church buildings were considered a total loss. Diocesan-run schools, clinics and hospitals that served over 100,000 Episcopalians, as well as countless community members, were wiped out in thirty-five seconds.

Many of the services we expect from the government— healthcare, education, culture—are provided in Haiti by The Episcopal Church. And many governmental agencies and NGOs have rushed to fill these needs in the aftermath. Episcopal Relief & Development is partnering with the Church in Haiti to provide short-term employment, provisional homes, and sanitation systems in addition to other community-focused recovery programs. The Clinton- Bush Haiti Fund sponsored mobile health clinics, and a United Nations fund has underwritten the clean-up of six neighborhoods in Port-au-Prince. But there is one thing no one else can rebuild for The Episcopal Church: Holy Trinity Cathedral. Home of the famous murals that depicted the Biblical narrative, the Cathedral was a beacon in a land where strength of faith is inversely proportional to economic development.

Holy Trinity Professional School and the primary and secondary schools also located on the Cathedral grounds, raised up future leaders in an environment of cultural and spiritual grace. In 35 seconds, it was all reduced to rubble.

Bishop Jean Zaché Duracin and the people of Haiti have asked for our help. The Episcopal Church, acting through the Executive Council, asks every Episcopal diocese and congregation to join in this initial phase of rebuilding the Diocese of Haiti. As the walls of a new Cathedral rise, so too will the hearts and fortunes of those who have depended on Holy Trinity for spiritual succor, for education, and for income. We have the chance to resurrect the spirit of a nation.

As they say in Haiti, *Men anpil chay pa lou*, or many hands make the load lighter. Working together, we can complete this project brick by brick, and **\$10 buys a brick**.

The new Cathedral will serve as an anchor to the expanded Episcopal presence in downtown Port-au-Prince, offering worship space for 1,000, housing diocesan offices and a rectory, and incorporating the former cathedral ruins as an historic memorial garden.

Brick by brick, you can raise up the walls of a new cathedral over the ruins of the past.

The Diocese of Haiti has conducted initial strategic planning, and engineers are already at work in Haiti instructing masons in earthquake-safe methods that are no more costly than the masonry that failed.

To begin, all we need is a brick or two, or ten, or a thousand.

WILHELMINA COLLINS [Groh Plot] Section 44 Lot 6

WILHELMINA COLLINS.

The *Suffolk County News* reported the May 9th death of 24 year old Wilhelmina Collins, a bride of three weeks. Wilhelmina died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Groh. The young woman had long suffered from valvular disease of the heart and long before her death, the family had been warned by their physician that Wilhelmina could be struck down suddenly. In spite of this fact, she was of a bright and happy disposition, and she insisted upon going on with the arrangements for her wedding which took place on April 30th. The young husband, Jarvis Collins worked as a chauffeur for Mrs. T.J. Clark of Brooklyn, a position that required him to make daily trips to Brooklyn, leaving at an early hour.

When at 9:00 AM, Wilhelmina had not come down stairs, Mrs. Groh went up to see how she was. Sadly, she found her daughter dead. It was a terrible shock, for as one who for years had to be cared for and shielded, she was especially beloved by the members of the large family, all the others of whom were sturdy and strong.

The young husband could not be reached, so he did not learn of his loss until he arrived home. The funeral took place at St. Ann's Episcopal Church, The Reverend John H. Prescott, who had performed the marriage ceremony, only three weeks before, officiating. The funeral was largely attended, the flowers, beautiful. She was laid to rest in the Groh plot in St. Ann's Cemetery.

NOTIFICATION OF PASTORAL NEEDS


