A Word from the Rector Father Jeffrey Stevenson, HoSM

Pentecost signals the completion of our Easter Season and the beginning of what is sometimes called Ordinary Time. The term Ordinary comes from "ordinal number" which we use to mark a thing's position in a series, such as "first," "second," or "third". And so on June 1 we have entered the "first" week after Pentecost, and we will continue to mark the liturgical year by where we are in relation to Pentecost. But of course, we know the word "ordinary" also can signify "no special or distinctive feature" or maybe "just normal". Which this season is also: it is not the anticipation and joy of Advent/Christmas nor the penitential and exuberance of Lent/Easter.

I like to think of this time as one in which we go about the work of being Disciples of Christ out in the world. Pentecost marks the blessing of the Holy Spirit upon all of us with everything we need to spread the good news of Jesus: his life, his teachings, his death, and his resurrection. That might sound like a tall order. Who among us considers themselves a latter-day Apostle: planting churches, healing the sick, casting out demons, and introducing

Jesus to an unknowing world?

Our world knows the name of Jesus. And I think many have some idea of what his teachings ask of us. But what this world needs—and what I believe we are called to do as disciples today—are examples of living out the Great Commandments to love God with our whole heart, minds, and soul and to love our neighbor as ourselves.

Not only Sundays, but every day. Not only the neighbor we know, but the strangers all around us. In our cars, on the internet, where we work, where we run errands, and certainly in our families: we are called again and again to show mercy, compassion, and Love.

Saint Ann's Junior

Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (Matthew)



Do you know what a SAINT is? A saint is a holy person. A saint is a hero of the church. But did you know that we are also saints? Jesus makes it possible for us to be saints because we share his life through being Baptized.

Do you know why we celebrate Saint Barnabas Day (June 11) every year? Our church of Saint Ann's was first built a long time ago—over hundred years! At that time, it was just a small church called a *chapel* and it had a different name, *Saint Barnabas*. So, in the beginning, Saint Ann's was first built with the name Saint Barnabas, and we keep that name near and dear in our hearts because that's part of where we are all from as a church.

The story of Saint Barnabas is in the bible, mostly in the Acts of the Apostles. He was an early follower of Jesus that helped to spread the word about Jesus's life and message of love. Saint Barnabas helped to start little churches that were for followers of the teachings of Jesus. So, when they first built our church, they named it after Saint Barnabas.

When the time came to build a new and bigger church here in Sayville, the church folks back then renamed the church *Saint Ann's*. Ann is the mother of Mary and the grandmother of Jesus. The chapel next to the Parish Hall was built from what was left of that first little church building long ago and so we call that the *Barnabas Chapel*. We still hold a special connection with Saint Barnabas because that was our name at the beginning.

Mother Lilo's Sermon

"Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good, yours are the hands, with which He blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are His body."



TODAY IS MOTHER'S DAY.

And I wish a very happy Mother's Day to those who are mother's or have mothers. And I also want to acknowledge that this day is not always joyful for many people for many reasons. This was case for me for many years until I became a mother myself. As many of you know, my own mother died of leukemia when I was fourteen, But I am tremendously grateful to many women who have mothered me over the years.

I am especially grateful to Nancy Penland, who lived up the street from us, who took very seriously Jesus' commandment to love thy neighbor by taking my sisters and I into her home, by loving and caring for us after the death of my mother.

I'm also grateful to my stepmother, Ginny Kilpack, who has also been an extraordinarily loving presence in my life. Ginny has been my stepmom for over 20 years and I'd like to share a specific story about her today on Mother's Day because I think it embodies what Jesus is talking about in our Scripture today: About his love for us, And his promise to leave us with an Advocate: the Holy Spirit which guides us, and loves us, and walks besides us always.

When my father was planning his wedding to Ginny many years ago he asked me to sing at the wedding. I love to sing. My father asked to me sing two songs; one was "I Know that my redeemer liveth" from Handel's Messiah and the other was Shubert's "Ave Maria."

Though these are both beautiful songs, I was feeling a bit torn about them. Now, these songs were like – my mom's songs. My mother had a beautiful voice, and these are songs she was famous for singing in my family.

As I prepared the songs and the wedding drew closer, I started to feel really uncomfortable about singing these songs... that my dead mother used to sing. I felt like a stand-in for her which made me feel sad because it made me remember her death, and this was for an event that was supposed to be joyful.

So, about a week before the wedding, I called my father to talk it over with him. Basically, to complain: Why was he asking me to sing these very emotionally loaded songs?



My father listened patiently. And like a good father, he tried to solve the problem. He said, "Ok. Why don't you sing something else." But I was upset with this very practical solution! Because it did really address the feelings I had. Also, the wedding was a week away! What was I going sing? I had no time to learn anything else. Then my dad did what he still does with some frequency, usually when he doesn't know what to say. He said, "Here, why don't you talk to Ginny" …and hands her the phone.

Ginny gets on the phone. And says something to me that is to this day perhaps the single most loving thing anyone has said to me. With great gentleness and kindness... she said:

"Hi Lilo. I overhead what your conversation with your father... You know, I've been a stepparent before," (this was true, her late husband had been married twice before he married her, and she already had four adult stepchildren). She said: "I've been a stepparent before and sometimes when your parent gets remarried you can have all sorts of feelings about it. I just want you to know that whatever you feel; there is room for it." This sort of love is what Jesus means when he tells us to keep his commandments. This is love of others that flows from the love of God.

Ginny could have reacted in all sorts of ways about my feeling upset about these songs. She could have judged me. She could have gotten defensive. She could have been annoyed because I wasn't expressing enthusiasm about her upcoming wedding. She could have changed the subject and ignored me altogether. But what she offered was love and acceptance; an assurance that I was seen and accepted by her no matter what. And I know for certain that her love was rooted in her deep faith in Jesus Christ.

This passage in John is when Jesus is saying a long goodbye to the disciples. He is saying that Holy Spirit – the Advocate will come to us, to comfort us, guide us, to be the presence of Jesus and God here on earth when he is gone physically.

The Holy Spirit is not some sort of floaty ghost drifting around. The Holy Spirit works through US — if we let it. The Gospel says: *The Holy Spirit abides with you, and he will be in you.*



I believe the Holy Spirit worked through Ginny that day because what she said healed me. Just being given the permission to feel whatever it was I was feeling about my father being remarried (because that really was the root of it all), just being given the space to feel whatever I felt and be loved no matter what. Well, that was like 10 years of therapy right there.

And I did go on to sing those songs at the wedding – happily.

This love lived out is what Jesus means when he says *because I live, you also will live.* He's talking about the fullness of life that we have when we allow him – through the Holy Spirit – into

our hearts, and into our actions. He's talking about the generosity and expansiveness that happens with presence of God's love.

The Holy Spirit is in each and every one of us. We actually can't escape it. We can't escape God, who Paul describes in our reading from Acts as: the God in whom we live and move and have our being.

We can't escape God. But we can choose to turn toward God. Or turn away from God.

Imagine what this divided world would be like if we could say to people with whom we disagree, to people who were coming at us with things we didn't want to hear, and say: Hey, whatever you are feeling, there is room for that.

That is radical peacemaking.

This is not to say that we should tolerate all actions, things like violence and discrimination and bigotry and abuse. But how many of these destructive actions could be healed and avoided if we could just give others the room to feel what they feel, to be seen and understood with love and compassion. Maybe then those feelings could be acted out constructively.

Today I ask you: Where in your life can let the Holy Spirit open your heart to create room for someone else to have feelings that you find inconvenient? Where can you and I let go of judgement and control toward someone else? Maybe it's someone with different politics than yours? Maybe it's a relative you have a lot of opinions about? Where in your life can you let the God of love give you the grace to be more loving and less reactive?

I leave you today with words that are attributed to the great saint, Teresa of Avila:

Christ has no body but yours,

No hands, no feet on earth but yours,

Yours are the eyes with which He looks with

Compassion on this world,

Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good,

Yours are the hands, with which He blesses all the world.

Yours are the hands, yours are the feet,

Yours are the eyes, you are His body.

Christ has no body now but yours,

Amen.

Calls to Service

Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth. (1 John)



The laity (group of people who are regular members of the parish and not clergy) of the Saint Ann's parish are woven into the life, worship, and leadership of our church. In fact, without the laity our church would have no life at all. Therefore, the laity are essential to the overall health of Saint Ann's.

Lay persons participate in worship as musicians, choir members, Lay Eucharistic Ministers, readers, acolytes, chalice bearers, alter guild members, ushers, vergers, and greeters. Others do simple tasks—that often go unnoticed—that enhance our worship.

Each worship service is an enactment of the kind of community Jesus calls us to create here on earth: spreading God's Word, sharing the Peace, breaking Bread together, and recommitting ourselves to what we believe. You are invited to step further into Sunday worship in deep & meaningful ways:

Usher: serve at church services throughout the year, assisting and monitoring the safety and needs of all attendees: handing out bulletins, collecting offerings, directing communion, assisting elderly & infirm, etc.

Lector: read the Old Testament, Psalm, & New Testament scriptures during the service.

Acolyte/Crucifer: bear the Cross into and out of the church for the liturgy, assist in the setting of the altar for the Eucharist and carry torches in the gospel procession; hold the gospel book during the gospel reading.

Eucharistic Minister: serve as chalice bearers at Eucharist; distribute the bread & wine to the congregation during communion.

Coffee Hour: set up & take down coffee hour (providing snacks is optional).

Altar Guild*: prepare the altar at St. Ann's for Saturday evening & Sunday services as well as baptisms, weddings, funerals, Holy Days & special services.
