You don't get to be a saint by ticking off a checklist of qualifications. In fact, saints are not usually even trying to reach sainthood! They are just toiling away in the place that they landed on this earth, and doing the best they can to be good and loving people in whatever situation they find themselves. So, this month, let us honor the saints of the past and work at being your best self. And on All Saints' Day, we'll be singing about you!

Thoughts from the Front Porch Father Brian Barry




October is my favorite time of year. It's been a little warmer than usual, but I enjoy sitting outside on my front porch in sweat pants and a sweat shirt, with a cup of tea and a book. I am a voracious reader by nature, and frequently run into the problem of more books than shelf-space. I've switched to Kindle for my sci-fi and fantasy books, but I prefer an actual book where it concerns my spiritual reading. My study Bible is filled in the margins with my own notes, and almost every other phrase is underlined. I've been doing a lot of spiritual reading lately, and I've been spending a lot of time with my Bible. So naturally, my front porch thoughts have turned to scripture and, in particular, how we study it.

We are blessed as Christians in the 21st century to have Bibles upon Bibles at our fingertips. We can look up passages online at Biblegateway.com. We have Daily Prayer apps for our phones, like Mission St. Clare (Holly and I both highly recommend this free app, by the way), that provide us with the Daily Office service from our *Book of Common Prayer*, and include all of the scriptural readings from our Daily Office Lectionary. We have study Bibles in every conceivable translation (I recommend the Harper Collins NRSV Study Bible, though some prefer the Oxford). That is the tip of the iceberg. With all of that in mind, it has always puzzled me that out of the thousands of disparate denominations and churches within the United States, Episcopalians (despite being the best-educated American Christians) fall almost *dead last* in terms of biblical literacy. That is astounding to me, as Jesus commands us to love the Lord our God with "all your mind." (Matt. 22:37) When we love someone, do we not do all we can to learn more about them?

It is important in an age of misinformation to be Christians who study our Bibles. There are too many Biblical literalists who use the Bible as a weapon. There are too many conspiracy theorists who attack our faith with misinformation (no, the Council of Nicaea was *not* the Church Council that threw out books from the Bible). There are too many people who have never studied the Bible, coming up with crack-pot theories about the stories contained within (no, Mary Magdalene was not the "Beloved Disciple" in John, though she is a Saint worthy of emulation). And there are too many propagandists out there willing to use the Bible to justify whatever agenda they have in mind. And this is nothing new: "But false prophets also arose among the people, just as there will be false teachers among you, who will secretly bring in destructive opinions... In their greed they will exploit you with deceptive words." (2 Peter 2:1, 3)

Where are we, at St. Ann's, in terms of Biblical literacy? It is my prayer that God would kindle a flame in our hearts, to want to learn more, so that we can truly be said to love the Lord with our entire heart, our entire soul, and our entire mind.

PEANUT BUTTER AND JELLY MINISTRY

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

I am very happy to report to you that our local mission work continues to grow, and this would not be possible without your support in prayers and donations. We have been able to give out over \$1,200 in personal hygiene products, food and clothing. All of the homemade scarves, hats and gloves are especially appreciated. Your generosity has been spread to Brentwood, Wantagh, Central Islip, Riverhead, Ronkonkoma, Mastic, Shirley, Quogue, and more.

SNAP (Food Stamps) recipients have recently had their benefits cut, so more of their income has had to go to feed their families, leaving less money for hygiene and other supplies. Many of these families must work and spend a minimum of 20 hours serving in an approved social services function (such as the Salvation Army Stores and other agencies), to be eligible for any benefits. This is besides whatever work they haveplus taking care of their children. When I--and any of my volunteers--hand out your generous donations, without any requirements, the recipients are so overcome with gratitude and joy! It is undeniable, the presence of Jesus Christ. You can feel it, almost touch it.



Recently, I had the honor of serving God's people, with my church Brother, Rick Magnani. We worked together at the Patchogue site, located behind Burlington Coat Factory. Rick was truly amazing, and relayed to me how touched he was with this joyous work. Rick was truly needed that day, and an answer to prayer. A couple of days earlier, I was notified by phone that Social Services, had recently placed a lot of new people in that area, and that I should expect over 80 people. Well, Rick and I saw over 150 souls that day! All of you were with us, through your generous donations and prayers.

This winter, we will need as many coats, boots, scarves, mittens, gloves, sweatshirts, jeans, blankets, and hand warmers as possible. I am seeing an

increase in Veterans being homeless. If any of you can volunteer in that area, please let me know. Specifically, I need help in making phone calls, relaying info to Operation Homefront and wounded warriors.

If you feel God calling you to help our immigrant population, I need help in writing index cards, to help people learn English. You would simply write a word in Spanish on one side of the card, while writing same word in English on the other. I usually stick to colors, days of the week, numbers, road signs, salutations, holidays, etc. If you would like to be a prayer warrior, I can provide you with a list of specific requests. One of the things that I have noticed, as all of the evil and negativity prevail in the news, more and more good and loving



people are making themselves known, volunteering to help, donating cash and goods, and praying. In the midst of all the harsh realities of poverty, love prevails. Poor people are honest and only take from me what they need, not one of my recipients care what color I am or what I have on, and each and every one says thank you! Many hug and kiss me, and all walk away with a smile. If you would like to look into the face of Christ, come with me, and share this awesome, shining love. Thank you all for keeping me strong!



MRS. ERASTUS ROOT ST. JOHN (ELENA) **ERASTUS ROOT ST. JOHN** Section 10 / Lot 8S 1/2

Elena St. John, age 73, wife of Erastus Root St. John f 272 Foster avenue, Sayville, died on July 15, 1961, at the South Shore Convalescent Home, Patchogue, after a long illness. The St. Johns had lived in Sayville for many years. Burial in St. Ann's Cemetery followed private services.



Erastus St. John, age 82, died December 26, 1961, in the terminal building at MacArthur Airport where he was employed as an executive with Central Aviation. Mr. St. John was a resident of the Delevan on Foster Avenue. He was survived by two brothers—John T. of Rochester, Harry W. of San Mateo, California, and a sister, Miss Maria St. John of Rochester.

Private services were conducted by The Rev. Mr. Joseph Bond, Rector Emeritus of St. Ann's Episcopal Church in Sayville. He was laid to rest next to his wife Elena in St. Ann's Cemetery.


Thank You, Veterans!


