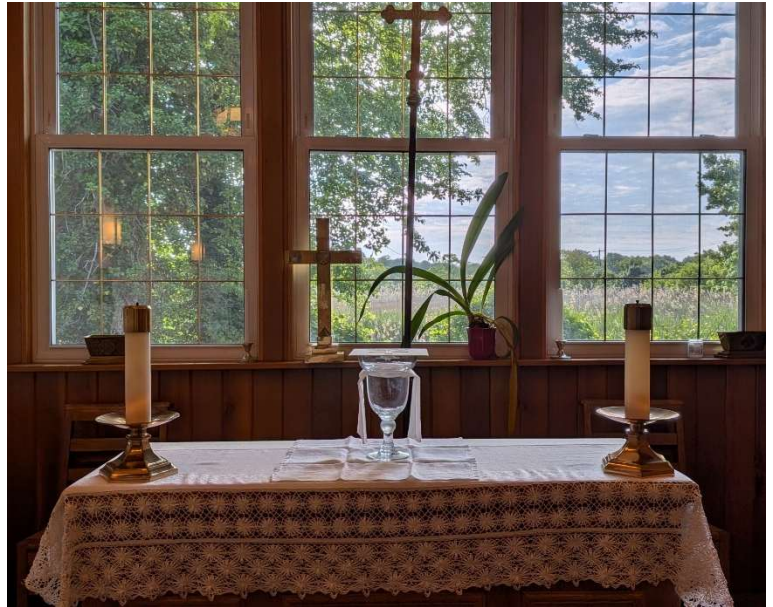

A Word from the Rector: *A Faith that Does Justice*

To

At the June Vestry Meeting, I provided copies of Fr. Kevin O'Brien, SJ's text (2011) *The Ignatian Adventure: Experiencing the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius in Daily Life*. In it, O'Brien uses the theme of adventure to mark new beginnings, in this case, the drawing deeper into one's spiritual life. New beginnings always have content that is unexpected. As we enter into our second month of our Summer Program I invite each of you to consider: What have I done for Jesus Christ? What am I doing for Jesus Christ? and What will I do for Jesus Christ? (Please see me if you would like a copy of the book.)

I invite you to use the *Anima Christi* prayer to close out your time meditating or reflecting on all of God's creation, especially as you seek to find God in all things.

Water from the side of Christ, wash me.

Passion of Christ, strengthen me.

O Good Jesus, hear me.

At the hour of my death, call me
and bid me come to you

That with your saints I may praise you

For ever and ever. Amen.

Will there be room for me?

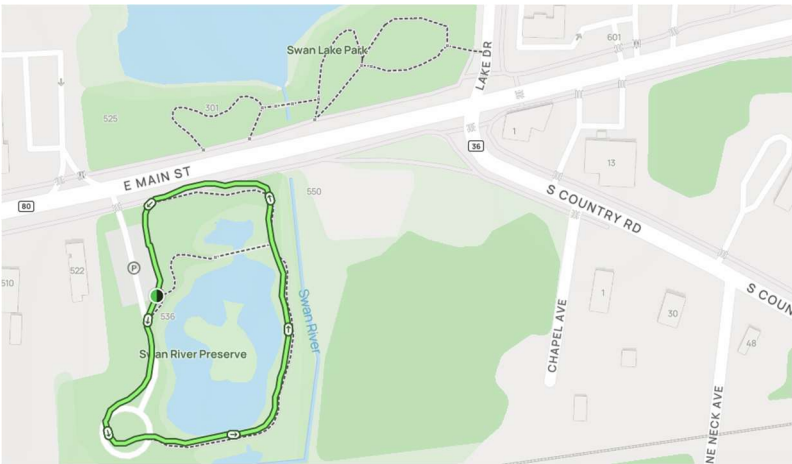
Thinking About: Green Spaces

This past spring my wife Lisa and I visited a small green space in East Patchogue that was not only pleasant to be in but also performs an important function. The green space we visited is called the Swan River Trailhead – East Patchogue Storm Water Treatment Facility (LID). It's located on the South Side of Montauk Highway, a few hundred feet from where Montauk Highway forks, with one road continuing Montauk Highway and the other road beginning South Country Road. From the name of the green space, it's easy to understand its purpose: controlling and treating stormwater runoff from our urban landscape (roads, lawns, driveways, etc.). This water carries pollutants such as chemicals, fertilizers, and solid debris which can find its way into the Swan River, an estuary that feeds The Great South Bay.

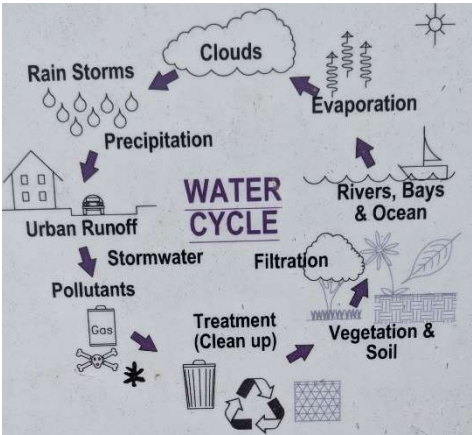
What makes this space a pleasure to be in is that it's a LID (Low Impact Development) facility or green space. What LID green spaces do is use both natural landscapes (such as marsh and meadow wetlands) along with engineered landscapes (such as permeable pavements) to collect and filter stormwater to minimize or eliminate the contaminants entering Swan River. This green space is not large and was built on property that was once was an auto dealership. It consists of four naturally constructed marsh ponds with a variety of native plants, shrubs and trees which populate the space. A short, looped walking path (which takes about 15 minutes to walk and includes benches and picnic tables) winds around the ponds giving views of the natural landscape which provides habitat for a wide variety of wildlife. The path also includes educational signs which explain how this small oasis in a busy area snuggled between Montauk Highway and tracks of the Long Island Railroad uses a combination of nature and technology to help protect our Great South Bay. It's definitely worth a visit!

The May "Doing" was the a Sunday afternoon concert featuring "L'Amour De La Flute". This was held on May 3, 2026, inside Saint Ann's Church. The concert was performed by a local flutist group named "L'Amour De La Flute", which has appeared at other local community events such as garden tours.

The name of this group, L'Amour De La Flute, translates from French to English as "The Love of the Flute". The group, composed of 9 female flutist and 1 conductor, are passionate performers, who just love to play their instruments and to perform the beautifully appealing and challenging music. Their repertoire included music played solely by flute, whether solo or in concert, from classical numbers such as "Hopak" by Modesto Mussorgsky, performed with bass flute, to sound tracks such as "Moon River" (popularized by the voice of Audrey Hepburn for the 1961 film, *Breakfast at Tiffany's*), arranged by Henry Mancini, to "work songs" such as "I've Been Working on the Railroad.

This concert of approximately one and a half hours proved to be a lovely respite from weekend projects/activities as well as using the beautiful setting of Saint Ann's altars, flanked by stained glass Tiffany windows. Over an average of 80 people were in attendance.

Minister of Music, Kathy Senese, has been arranging occasional free performances by such groups or individual performers to use Saint Ann's grounds.

The program of the flute concert included a number of songs, such as "Blue Skies" by Irving Berlin; "Amazing Grace" by Ricky Lomb; the quirky "Puttin On The Ritz" written by Irving Berlin. Incidentally, the "The Ritz" was the first song to be recorded on film as sung by an interracial performing group, back in the 1930's. "Let There Be Peace On Earth" by Sy Miller was the appropriate finale.

SAINT BARNABAS DAY 6/14/26

The June 2026 Doing was the annual Saint Barnabas Day held on June 14, 2026 and incidentally was the 168th Saint Barnabas Day event to be held over 168 years! This year, the weather, which is always iffy on any Sunday in June, actually turned out to be pleasant, not too hot, not too humid, not too chilly, not too windy and not too buggy as well! Over 75 people came to sit on chairs provided for this event as well as some bringing their own preferred equipment (camping chairs, children's wagons, child and dog blankets). In addition to the 75 plus people, there were approximately 2 well behaved dogs to be blessed. The Eucharist took place below the huge American Basswood tree at the north side of the Great Lawn. The tree, incidentally, has been undergoing treatment for tree disease by Jolly Green Giant Tree Care, and is looking very well.

Several people were honored at this Saint Barnabas Day: any and all graduates of school programs, two new Eucharistic Ministers/ Ushers (**Karen McGorty and Chris Gerard**) and two recipients of the Bishop's Medal (Correspondent Editor **Eileen Moran** and Senior Warden **Randy Schultz**).

After the service, the lunch and free festivities immediately commenced, as well as the arrival of the performers providing music. Groups held Tee Shirt Tie Dye and encouraged asphalt chalk painting; food was quickly set up to provide hot dogs, corn, & salads. And then the Pie Eating Contest commenced, with four brave young and older men eating a whole apple pie using only their mouths with their hands clasped behind their backs. This event was closely watched by over 30 people and took about 15 or more minutes. Joe Castelli was the winner and later admitted his experience came from having to participate in Pi Day (March 14) at his school. As reported by **Sue Schultz**.

St. Ann's Cemetery News

For those that don't know me, my name is Tim Laffin. I'm St. Ann's Cemetery manager. This article is a bit overdue, so please let me share some important information about our parish cemetery.

- 1) We have nearly 1,200 graves available. The majority are double-depth graves which can accommodate up to two caskets, or up to three cremains.
- 2) We also have ash plots which are half the size of a full grave and can accommodate up to two cremains.
- 3) We are currently out of niches but are in the early planning stages of constructing several new columbariums.
- 4) If you have loved ones in our cemetery but have not purchased a headstone or some other type of monument, **please consider doing so**. Monuments improve the looks of the cemetery, and they also make locating graves much easier. Please contact me for a list of local monument companies.
- 5) A partial list of the rules and regulations for the cemetery can be found on signs at both entrances to the cemetery. I'd like to highlight some here:
 - a. We allow artificial flowers in the cemetery, year-round now. If you plant live flowers, please be sure they are **deer resistant**.
 - b. Bouquets of cut flowers are also allowed, but once wilted, they will be removed.
 - c. The only flags we allow in the cemetery are American flags and fire department flags. Garden flags and personalized custom flags are not allowed. Please remove them.
 - d. Solar lights on the graves are not allowed. Please remove them.
 - e. Please, no pets in the cemetery.
- 6) For a complete list of cemetery rules and regulations, please contact me.

My office hours are Monday through Wednesday, from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM. For times other than my office hours, please call or email me for an appointment.

Saint Ann's Episcopal Church's Community and Food Pantry Garden

On May 2, 2026, a team of over twenty Boy Scouts from Troup 130 of Bayport/Blue Point, along with their fathers, helped **John Finn MacInnes**, of Boy Scout Troop 130, create a Community Garden in Bayport for his **Eagle Scout project**. Completing an Eagle Scout project is a requirement toward becoming an Eagle Scout, assuring that the Scout has demonstrated leadership, organization, and commitment by planning and implementing a specific project enhancing quality of life towards his community at large. Such projects can involve structures such as useful benches, wildlife houses, memorials, including the 9/11 memorial and labyrinth both on Saint Ann's parish grounds. In this newest case, the project is the construction of the Community and Food Pantry Garden, located behind the Bayport House. This project, besides the necessary fund raising, includes donation of 6 metal raised beds, land clearing of the overgrown lot just north of the Bayport House, planting, irrigation and mulching.



Rector Benjamin J. Brenkert conceived the idea of developing an accessible community garden where fresh produce would be grown and made available to anyone needing food at St. Ann's Parish. He reached out to the Boy Scout troop to see if any member was interested in making the garden vision a doable reality. John Finn MacInnes who is a sophomore at Bayport Blue Point High School, began the work of constructing a plan to develop this garden. St. Ann's was the site of a successful car wash generating more than \$2,000 toward the project on April 12, 2026. Over 30 cars were made clean at this wash!

Local landscape contractor, Tom Hakes, donated his services in clearing this lot that had been filled with vines and overgrown trees as well as supplying mulch later. To date, all 6 beds are fortified with irrigation hookups,

are filled with soil backfill, covered with fiber blanket mulch and planted. The beds are easily accessible with minimal “bend-over” requirements. They are neatly filled with vegetable plants including melon, cantaloupe, cucumber, sweet peppers, strawberry, zucchini, herbs as well as the always popular tomato plants.

Parishioners and members of the community are welcome to come down and help maintain as well as harvest the vegetables when ready! **Interested volunteers should contact Fr. Ben about getting involved in the cultivation.**

Through the Essential Plan Cooling Program, eligible Essential Plan members may receive a free air conditioner to help keep their homes cool and reduce health risks associated with rising temperatures. Applications are now open as of April 15, 2026, and will be accepted through August 31, 2026, or until funding is exhausted.

This important initiative aims to protect vulnerable communities from increasingly frequent and severe heat waves, with a focus on those whose health conditions are disproportionately impacted by extreme heat.
