Companions-in-Christ: A Word from the Priest in Charge



Dear Saint Ann's Family and Friends,

P.C. As I celebrate my one-year anniversary with you, I take a moment to express my deep love and affection for the entire Saint Ann's community. The past12-months have grown my vocation, challenged me to be a priest for others and to respond to Jesus' enigmatic question: *Do you love me?* from the Gospel of John (Chapter 21). Yes, I love you; and I pray for the grace to continue to feed the sheep of Saint Ann's and beyond, such is the call of a missionary priest, one who is eager to build programming and help others draw closer to the sacred heart of Jesus.

One of the most important qualities of a person who enters into the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius Loyola is "openness, generosity, and courage" (Sp. Ex. 5). The one hope and desire of the same retreatant "is that God will place us with his Son so that in all ways we seek only to respond to that love which fist created us and now wraps us round with total care and concern" (*Ibid.*). Such has been the disposition from which I have entered into the unfolding narrative of my nascent priesthood. Such is the grace that I have prayed for oft and on through these recent 365 days.

Of memory: listening to Bishop Geralyn Wolf's homily at the 2024 Confirmation, the sounds of the choir, the cheer of the Thrift Store Volunteers, the humility of the Altar Guild, awarding Linda and Tom Munkelwitz the Bishop's Medal for Distinguished Service, helping to augment The Correspondent, developing the new Saint Ann's Website and signage for the South Campus, restoring the Great Lawn and the lighting on our North Campus, the sounds of children at our Family Services, the smells of Fire Island, the saying hello and goodbye to Fr. Jeff and Noah, my work with all our volunteers, the Vestry and the Priest-in-Charge's Committee Members, the Lay Preaching Program, the Saturday Night Pizza Fellowship, Baptisms, Eucharists, the Littlejohn and Burgess Parking Lot Construction Project, funerals, starting the grief group and weekday service, moving the Parish Administration Offices to the Rectory, framing the original Church blueprints, the Christmas Tree Lot Sale and Fair, the visits of my family, hosting the Vestry at the Bayport House and my work with Saint Ann's Trustees and Conservators. I have loved pastoral visits, one-to-one conversations with Lynne, Kathy, Tim, Lou and Deacon Susan; I have loved being challenged by the flock at Saint Ann's to adapt more and to become an even more engaged Priest-in-Charge, as I say often, Saint Ann's Strong. Sayville Stronger. Together Strongest.

During Pope Francis I's papacy he often encouraged his fellow priests to smell like the sheep, specifically saying, "I wish you to be shepherds with 'the smell of the sheep'" (the Pope said in 2021), repeating once again the analogy he used in his homily at the Chrism Mass on March 28, 2013, just a fortnight after his election.

This month Saint Ann's draws deeper into the Summer Program, including Confirmations and Receptions at Saint Mark's, Islip (June 7th) Saint Barnabas Day (June 8th) and the Saint Ann's Days of Service (June 14th and 28th). These are service opportunities to get to know people that we are not familiar with, while also building up and celebrating our community, enkindling our fellowship, and emphasizing our tradition of being Episcopalians. The Episcopalian Bishop, Barbara Harris is often acknowledged as reminding *the people in the pews* that others recognize that we are Christian by what we do and do not do on Monday. How prescient!

In the middle of May, old, new and in the middle members of Saint Ann's engaged their Wardens and Vestry members in a Forum in the Parish Hall. We looked at that trifold Ignatian inquiry: What have I done for Jesus Christ? What am I doing for Jesus Christ? What will I do for Jesus Christ? (Sp. Ex. 53) and hoped towards a discernment of ministries and passions to come. *How the People's Arc and our bi-vocational ministry has already fed us! Nourished us! and informed us about who Saint Ann's is in 2025.*

As you head into the Summer with prayer, the sacraments, vacations, travel, time with family and friends and self-care, I pray that you each receive the graces that you desire. I encourage you to think of ways that you might engage ministries at Saint Ann's, like helping to grow our Food Insecurity and Food Pantry ministry, by engaging in programming for Young Adults, joining the Counters, Altar Guild or becoming a Lay Preacher or Lay Eucharistic Minister. In September, our Religious Education Classes will resume, our Capital Campaign will be in full swing and Saint Ann's will be led in song by our Minister of Music, Kathy. In three years, Saint Ann's will celebrate 140-years.

Charles G. Stevenson emphasized the words of The Reverend Dr. Ralph W. Stockman, Minister Emeritus of Christ Church, Methodist who reinforced that history preserves for posterity the "personalities whose achievements and character" gave religious direction to Saint Ann's, Saville; he did so on Saint Barnabas Day 1967 in *But as Yesterday: A History of Saint Ann's Church*. May Saint Ann's continue to offer our world and society something that feeds their souls, leaving them truly fed by the body and blood of Jesus Christ, satiated for work and play in a world hungry for peace, thirsty for common sense, yearning for human flourishing.

All for the greater glory of God. With gratitude and joy, in love and through prayer,

Some thoughts from your Deacon...

When I was younger, the green season that we are entering was known as Ordinary Time. Today, each Sunday is unique and is more appropriately referred to by the number of Sundays removed from Pentecost ...I know this for sure because I did a year-long project on the Liturgical Calendar for one of my courses...but, as always, I digress.

Part of me is a bit sorry that we no longer use "Ordinary Time", for it was anything other than ordinary. The late spring and summer are a wonderful time of rebirth, of color, of nature offering itself to us simply for our enjoyment! Think of the ordinary things we savor- sea and sand, ice cold lemonade, fresh cut grass, walking around in bare feet, flip-flops, waves gently lapping on the shore, and the smell of suntan lotion...you get the picture! Enjoy this time, celebrate the ordinary, and always be thankful to God for giving it to us!

I know there have been some questions about where I am when I am not in my usual place on Sunday mornings. Though I am assigned to St. Ann's, and fiercely proud to be here, the fact is that Deacons are responsible to the Bishop and as such, when the Bishop needs us, we are there. We are hoping to incorporate a fifth luncheon next year and it seems everyone is hoping for an Italian Pot-Luck!

Our young people are enjoying the crafts and storytime with Miss Kaitlyn on Family Sundays! I hope you've noticed the area we've set up for the youngsters on the east end of the Upper Parish Hall. That white children's altar was dedicated to The Reverend Mr. Bond's wife! Next fall our children will be able to learn more about the Eucharist using their own little altar!

I'm always sorry to see one program year end, but I look forward to what the new program year will bring!



VESTRY VISIONS

Good Day!

I grew up in Sayville and attended St. Lawrence Church, where my mother sang in the choir. Like many, I drifted away from the church after confirmation, thinking, "I'm done!" When it came time to marry, I faced an unexpected obstacle—St. Lawrence would not perform the ceremony because my husband-to-be had been raised Jewish, despite his conversion to Christianity. That led me to St. Ann's, where I was warmly welcomed by Father Bob, who simply said, "ALL are welcome!" In 2002, we were married at St. Ann's, and I felt such a deep connection to the church that I spent several years teaching Sunday School.

Unfortunately, the marriage did not last, and in its aftermath, I walked away from the church, feeling deflated and unworthy—thinking I was no longer a good example. I convinced myself I could navigate my faith on my own, believing personal prayer would be enough. Yet, over time, I came to realize something was missing. My journey back to St. Ann's would eventually reveal just how much I needed the support, community, and spiritual grounding that church life offers.

Returning to church—especially to St. Ann's—filled that void, bringing a renewed sense of belonging, purpose, and spiritual fulfillment. Being part of both the Vestry and the Lay Preacher program at St. Ann's is an incredibly rewarding journey—one that intertwines faith, leadership, and personal spiritual growth. These roles provide a unique opportunity to serve the church, deepen my connection with God, and contribute meaningfully to the community.

As a Vestry member, I embrace the responsibility of stewardship, ensuring that St. Ann's remains a thriving place of worship and fellowship for generations to come. This role allows me to engage in governance and decision-making, overseeing resources and initiatives that strengthen our congregation. More than just a leadership position, serving on the Vestry is a profound act of faith—an opportunity to foster unity, inclusion, and care within our church family. I share these experiences not to elevate myself or seek recognition, but in the hope that my journey resonates with you and inspires deeper reflection on your own path in faith. Each of us has unique gifts and callings, and perhaps something in my story will ignite a desire within you to serve, lead, or engage more fully in the life of the church. If sharing my experiences encourages even one person to step forward—whether in the Vestry, the Lay Preacher program, or another ministry—then it has been truly worthwhile.

I feel incredibly blessed to have married my best friend and soul mate, Jim, in this remarkable church in November of 2024. With the unwavering support of this loving congregation, we look forward to growing in faith and continuing our journey of stewardship together.

CREATION CARE CORNER By Joe Castelli

Thinking About:

Itching For a Better Way!

The signs of summer are around us! I know this by the advisory card we received in our mailbox the other day, and by all those little yellow flags my pal Nya (Arf, Arf!) and I observe when we take our walks through the neighborhood. Yep, you guessed it! It's those mosquito control companies (which will remain nameless here) who spray your property with the goal of eliminating those pesty mosquitoes, and unfortunately in the process do a lot more consequential damage.

How times have changed in dealing with this problem! When I was young, our method of keeping mosquitoes at bay was to use the 'Wack and Slap' method, along with that pink calamine lotion for all those attackers who got us before we got them. But as time progressed, the desire for a better mouse trap (eh, make that mosquito trap!) would take us through numerous iterations. You remember them: trucks that would spray neighborhood streets, bug lights (that seemed to kill every critter except mosquitoes!), and lotions like Avon Skin so Soft and tiki torches, to name a few. So how has technology in recent years helped in our quixotic quest to rid ourselves of these annoying pests? A quick check of the internet helps provide some answers: lotions and oils for your skin, small portable units that use heat activated repellent pads, wearable ultrasonic gear, improved zappers and traps, and larger units that can pass for a small outboard boat engine. Another option: a system that allows the homeowner to mist selected areas of their property (deck, porch, patio) on demand with a mosquito repellent (ugh!).

It seems like more and more people now days are turning to commercial spraying companies to do the work. From the information I found on the various websites I visited, to the websites of the mosquito abatement companies themselves, all mention that they offer a standard property spraying option or an eco-friendly one. The eco-friendly application process uses chemicals found in chrysanthemum flowers (called pyrethrins) which are highly toxic to insects. The standard application process on the other hand, uses synthetically manufactured chemicals (called pyrethroids) which possess the same properties as the pyrethrins chemicals. When sprayed, both families of these chemicals (synthetic and natural) kill anything that wiggles, crawls, flies, buzzes, scampers, or shuffles on contact – and then for about thirty days after the application, continues to kill mosquitoes and also pollinators (like butterflies, bees, moths, etc.) which pollinate many of our agricultural crops, and in the case of honey bees, produce our honey. Another problem created by all this spraying is the eventual runoff of these chemicals into our bay and streams.

There's Got to be a Better Way!

Maybe, before going with the property spraying option, it would be better to first try a more pollinator / environmentally friendly option first. Over the last several years, we've used a product which includes a heating element and a repellent pad. When the pad is heated, it releases a chemical repellent which does a good job in clearing our patio of mosquitoes. I understand that maybe in areas awash in mosquitoes (like properties near a marsh or the bay) spraying (and hopefully using sprays that are the eco-friendly option) may be the only way to go. But hopefully for the rest of us, trying and using one of the less impactful ways to control our mosquito problem will go a long way to help our pollinators and reduce the amount of chemicals that reach our bay.

In the month of June there will be two events that will celebrate the unique history of Islip Town and its residents. We would like to invite you to attend these events.

On June 7th, Living History Day will be held at Islip Grange Park in Sayville at the corner of Broadway Avenue and Montauk Highway starting at10 AM. As this year marks the beginning of the celebration of 250 years since the start of the American Revolution and for Islip Precinct a seven-year occupation by Crown forces it is a great time to celebrate Islip history. Several new groups will be displaying this year as well as the Farmer's Market. There will be two walking tours of the Grange buildings with the story of the founding of the Town of Islip and the experience of its residents during the Revolution.

June 19th (Juneteenth holiday) at 4:00 PM a ceremony of rededication and remembrance will be held at Oakwood Cemetery in Bay Shore. This ceremony will honor the service of three Civil War veterans at rest there - Private William Treadwell, Private Lewis Jackson both veterans of the 11th United States Colored Heavy Artillery and Private William Carpenter veteran of the 31st United States Colored Infantry. Private Carpenter was stationed in Texas at the time of the reading of the Juneteenth order. He was also present at the Battle of the Crater, several other battles in and around Petersburg and was present at the surrender of the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia at Appomattox. Privates Treadwell and Jackson served as occupation forces in Louisiana and Texas and were some of the first men of color to volunteer for service during the Civil War Also resting nearby is another Civil War veteran Charles Alfred Dearborn, a veteran of the 27th Maine Infantry who died indigent and was to be buried in potter's field when residents of the Town of Islip claimed his remains and had him buried here in Oakwood.

The effort to research the lives of these veterans has been ongoing over the last six months by the Town Historian's Office that has involved records from the National Archives, the State of Rhode Island, local experts on Native and African American History and our own Town records. Investigative and cleaning work was carried out by Oakwood Cemetery and the Society of the Grand Army of the Republic in preparation for this day. All have worked to make the day one of honor and recognition of the sacrifice these veterans made on our behalf.

Did you know that Congratulations are due to **Rup Christensen**? He just received the Suffolk County Legislature EMS Award for 2025.

As quoted from the slideshow presentation: "Rup Christensen has been a proud resident of Bayport for 74 years and is deeply dedicated to public service. He first started with the Bayport Fire Department in 1969. However, plans changed in March 1971 when he was drafted to the United States Army and assigned as a Military Police Officer in Bangkok, Thailand. There he earned the Vietnam Campaign Ribbon. Upon his return, he continued his fire service where he served as Chief of Department from 1982-1984 and achieved Fireman of the Year.

Still striving from more, Rup joined Community Ambulance Company in

2007. In his time there, he has proven to be a dependable and driven member to both his brothers and sisters in service, and the community. His hard work and willingness to help has earned him numerous awards such as Member of the Year, Chiefs Award, and several Top Responder awards. Lately when he is not assisting with EMS runs, he is leading Bayport Fire Department's project to restore their 1924 Mack Fire Truck. 


