I meditated on the busyness of our Thrift Store Shop, a new plaque in our Cemetery, our new Saint Ann's car decals, our first Saturday Pizza Fellowship Crafting event, campus tree trimming, and that the People's Arc at Saint Ann's will celebrate



VESTRY VISIONS

September is here! There is a touch of autumn in the air as we look forward to beginning our program year at St. Ann's. I think that we would agree that this time of year brings thoughts of the harvest of the bounty of our earth. To many of our brothers and sisters the reality of food insecurity is a year-round challenge. We are very fortunate to have a very dedicated group of volunteers led by Lynette Schulz helping those in need. Our Daily Bread Food Pantry is available on Mondays from 10 am until 12 noon to help bridge the need for food in our community. Currently there is a team of 8 volunteers that rotate manning the pantry, two at a time. Several volunteers come in monthly to help set up the pantry. Recently we have joined with ARC to help with the weekly shopping. The food that is distributed is donated by our parish family and the community. In addition, funds are donated and the foodstuffs are purchased to maintain a healthy and varied inventory.

You might be interested to know how the pantry came about. It all began with a Thanksgiving food basket collection in response to the growing need in our community in 2008. At that time, it was a single shelf of canned goods. With the renovation of the Little John building the pantry moved to the kitchen there and this allowed the addition of perishable foods. Our guests are very grateful for this. The pantry is now back to the parish hall serving an average of ten people and feeding approximately 25 people.

Look for the red wagon in the parish hall should you care to donate. The following items are always needed:

The Thanksgiving and Easter Basket ministries continue to this day. There are many folks who would not be able to celebrate these occasions without the generosity of others.

A very heartfelt thank you to Lynette and the volunteers of the pantry. This is a major outreach and essential service to our community.

Stewardship 101

We hear a lot about "Stewardship", and have a generally good idea about what it means. But sometimes it is helpful to go back to "basics" to be sure we're all on the same page. For this purpose, I have consulted the all-knowing Great God of "Artificial Intelligence" (AI) for its "wisdom", and what I found and share with you is "not bad", (maybe worth a B+). So here goes:

In religious contexts, stewardship generally refers to the concept of responsibly managing and caring for something entrusted to one's care, often with a sense of accountability to a higher power. It emphasizes that all resources, including time, talents, and possessions, ultimately belong to God, and we are called to be faithful caretakers.

Core Principles of Stewardship:

God's Ownership:

Stewardship recognizes that God is the ultimate owner of everything, and humans are entrusted with its management.

Responsibility:

This involves taking ownership and acting with care and diligence in managing what has been entrusted.

Accountability:

Stewards are ultimately accountable to God for how they manage these resources.

Generosity:

A core aspect of stewardship is sharing generously with others, particularly those in need.

Gratitude:

Stewardship is rooted in recognizing and appreciating God's gifts and expressing gratitude through responsible management.

• Eternal Perspective:

Stewardship encourages a focus on eternal rewards and investing in things that are pleasing to God. Examples of Stewardship:

• Financial Resources:

Managing money wisely, giving generously to charitable causes, and avoiding excessive materialism.

Time:

Using time purposefully, prioritizing activities that align with God's will, and avoiding time-wasting activities.

Talents:

Developing and using one's gifts and abilities to serve others and glorify God.

Creation:

Caring for the environment and all of God's creation.

Relationships:

Nurturing relationships with others, practicing forgiveness, and showing love and compassion.

All of this is good. However, I believe that the measure of our personal stewardship lies in our faith and relationship with the Lord. As we grow in faith and prioritize Him in our daily lives, we will want to give joyfully and generously in thanksgiving for the blessings He has bestowed on us.

But how much to give? This question inevitably leads to an answer that includes the "T-word", which turns folks off... We recall that Jesus said "to give unto Caesar what is Caesar's and unto God what is God's". (Luke 20 v. 25). Therefore, I believe it is most reasonable to form a basis of giving by considering annual income after paying all those federal, state, and property taxes and the mandatory mortgage, car and student loan payments. What you have left is what you are asked to steward. A percentage of this "discretionary" income given to the Glory of God is the best yardstick for measuring personal faith growth from one year to the next, as no two years' incomes are identical, in many cases.

September 28 during Coffee Hour for Estate Attorney Christine Schiebler's presentation introducing Wills and Estates, offering opportunities to provide meaningful stewardship of our resources for our loved ones during our lifetime and beyond.

Guest Speaker – Lauris P. Wren Report by Sue Schultz



On August 10, 2025, St Ann's Parish hosted guest speaker, Lauris P. Wren, director of Hofstra Law School's Immigration Rights Clinic, in the Parish Hall following conclusion of 9:00 AM Sunday Worship. She came at the invitation of Rev. Ben Brenkert to give a talk on current immigration policies and how these affect people living on Long Island. Approximately 30 people were in attendance, mostly parishioners.

She directs Immigration Rights Clinic in Hempstead, NY and oversees the University's law students who assist clients concerned about what might happen to themselves, their families, including their children born either in their native countries or in the United States.

According to Professor Wren, there are increasingly much information, non-information, concerns about President Donald Trump's executive orders. One of Professor Wren's primary concerns is about how fast the Administration and local governments are moving to carry out executive orders. According to her, the current administration is moving quickly to carry out executive orders, and that the speed of carrying out President Trump's campaign promises is creating much fear in immigrants who have been here two or more years, especially through the use of expedited removals. She explained that expedited removal means the use of lower-level immigration offices to deport those non-citizens if these individuals cannot provide the documentation that they've lived in the United States for two+ years. She discussed the speed at which this is being done. Expedited removals may not allow those individuals time to prove that they do not meet the criteria for expedited removal.

She stressed that it appears that, far more often, ICE (Immigration Customs Enforcement) officials tended to question more non-white individuals than those who are more obviously white, aka racial profiling.

Prof. Wren answered many questions from those in attendance. Some questions included what-ifs: such as what to say if asked where one was born (her answer: don't say anything, that any individual has the right not to answer). Another was whether if ICE had any right to come onto St Ann's property and follow patrons of the Food Pantry into the church hall (her answer: the parish hall is a public space rather than a private home and ICE can enter).

A similar question was if a homeowner had hired landscape maintenance workers to service her property and if ICE agents had the right to enter her property or should she invite only the workers inside her house so that ICE cannot enter her home.

Another question included the qualifications for ICE agents and if these employees have any training for the work they are hired to do. The answer was that only a minimum of a high school diploma was needed to be hired as ICE employee, that training in police work or criminal justice was not needed. She said that some agents are former police who were enticed to become ICE agents because the starting salaries are higher than those for police trainees.

Prof. Wren indicated that part of her beliefs in protection for all individuals living in United States come from the New Testament, reminding the audience that Jesus and his parents became immigrants in the country of Egypt in order to escape Herod, the king of Judea, when he ordered that all baby boys under the age of one year to be killed. That Jesus and his parents were trying to escape government-sanctioned persecution that put their lives in extreme danger, and she reminded the audience that many immigrants had faced forms of severe persecution. That even in the New Testament, there is mention of what people had tried to do to protect their families and lives.

Thinking About: Our Dreaded Visitors

And who can these dreaded visitors possibly be, you ask? Well to start with, they are probably not as feared as the Dreaded Pirate Roberts (of course you remember him from that great classic *The Princess Bride*) but in my mind they should be dreaded, because they're much more destructive. These visitors we unfortunately have are those sap sucking, energy stealing, honey dew excreting, color changing, wing growing, invasive insect. Yep, you guessed it: The Spotted Lantern Fly.

If you're not familiar with these critters, they look different during the various stages of their life cycle. In mid spring (late March to early April) they emerge from their egg sacks as nymphs and resemble beetles with shells that are black with white spots. As they grow, they become slightly larger with their shells turning from black with white spots to red with white spots. Their final stage is the adult stage where they grow upper and lower wings and look more like moths, measuring roughly an inch in length. It's during this adult stage of life, around mid-September, where the females lay their eggs that will hatch the following spring. These eggs are laid on trunks and branches of trees and bushes in clutches of 30 to 50 eggs which are covered with grey looking cement or mud.

The spotted lantern fly doesn't present a health issue to people through bites, stings or disease transfer, but can be devastating to over one hundred and seventy types of plants and crops. In the nymph stage they feed on a wider variety of these plants, and as they mature into adults they feed mainly on crops, one type being grapevines. They damage these plants and crops by feeding on their nutrient rich sap, and then leave excrements of honey dew on the plant's leaves. These honey dew deposits reduce the plant's ability to photosynthesize and attract insects like ants and wasps to the plant.

It seems in our Sayville – Bayport community there are areas that have been hit hard by these lantern flies and others that have not spotted any. At our house in Sayville, we've had quite a few of these visitors. I would estimate at a high point in the summer, Lisa and I (each of us) would kill about fifteen to twenty of these nymphs per day – and that's on a property that measures fifty by a hundred feet in size! We haven't used any commercial companies to rid ourselves of these pests, because they tend to use chemicals that also kill friendly pollinator insects. Our weapons of choice have been dish detergent cut with water, and a standard fly swatter. That combination seems to be doing the trick. As of this writing we kill only about one or two per day, if that!

It's so important that we all try to minimize the population of these lantern flies so we can help reduce the likelihood that they will impact the vineyards out east, but most importantly Sayville's gem of a vineyard, and "Best Kept Secret," the Loughlin Vineyard at Meadowcroft Estate.
