Companions-in-Christ: A Word from the Priest in Charge



Dear Saint Ann's and Fire Island Ministries Family and Friends,

P.C. My beloved Family and Friends, this November includes our 2026 commitment to Stewardship and Pledging, a time when the members of our active and vibrant faith and bi-vocational community discern the giving of their time, talents and treasures. In concert with an ongoing Capital Campaign to preserve and restore our Historic Tower and relocate our Baptismal Font, (e.g., no longer a will there be a Baptismal font on wheels/castors), led by Vestry members Rich Maddox and Laurin Clemens, we are all being asked to donate more than is customary to ensure the stability of our Church and to cement our legacy as a

spiritual home for the greater Sayville community. We are being invited to freely offer more than is customary in a world fraught with social and political tensions, a world that spins onward with much uncertainty and complexity, and some tangible and unforeseen economic insecurity.

We are all being called to respond to this moment in history, to solidify our spiritual home, to augment and buttress our outreach efforts, to move beyond our aging grounds and buildings, to provide corporal and spiritual works of mercy for countless others, an Episcopalian faith-community with unstoppable reach. Our Stewardship and Pledging, promises fit seamlessly into our program year goals of letting mutual love and mutual respect continue, to dialogue with all our neighbors. These are not just our goals, but the goals Jesus set forth by His Gospel of good news.

The success of Saint Ann's and Fire Island Ministries depends on the following sources of funding, which directly and indirectly impact our 2026 Budget.

2026 Stewardship and Pledging

- What it is: The practice of raising funds for Saint Ann's and Fire Island Ministries ongoing, day-to-day operations.
- Purpose: To cover immediate and unrestricted costs like salaries, rent, utilities, and program expenses.
- **Timeframe:** Ongoing, with funds used in the same year they are raised.
- Analogy: A nonprofit's checking account for immediate needs.

Capital Campaign for the Historic Tower Preservation and Restoration and Relocation of the Baptismal Font into the Chancel

- What it is: A concentrated and intensive fundraising effort led by Rich Maddox and Laurin Clemens, with the assistance of our liaisons at Carter Global, over a defined period to raise a large sum of money for a specific project.
- **Purpose:** To fund major, long-term needs such as a new building, renovations, or the establishment of an endowment.
- **Timeframe:** A specific, limited period, often lasting one to five years.
- Analogy: A special, temporary fundraising drive for a specific, large purchase.

Saint Ann's and Fire Island Ministries Endowments

- What it is: Permanent restricted and unrestricted monies where the principal is invested and not spent, with the investment income used to support Saint Ann's and Fire Island Ministries.
- **Purpose:** To provide a stable, ongoing source of long-term funding for the organization's stability and future generations.
- **Timeframe:** Permanent restricted and unrestricted funds, with the principal remaining intact.
- Analogy: A long-term investment account.

Finally, I would also like to address a more a personal matter that pertains to our identities as Christians. For little over a month, Willy and I were separated while he completed some major steps in his citizenship process.

While we had the opportunity to work with a lawyer, and our former congresswoman from Queens, so many others seeking legal citizenship in the United States do not have access to these types of resources. In El Salvador, Willy was able to reconnect with his mother and sister, and other family and friends for the first time in 10+ years. It is truly mesmerizing that in 2025 so many like Willy and me need to feel and encounter the pain of a forced family separation. For us, the story ended with Willy's return, for too many others, the separation never ends.

Let us pray from the Episcopal Church's Litany for Social Justice, found at the official website of the Episcopal Church (www.episcopalchurch.org).

Let us pray: God commands us through Jesus Christ to love one another. In baptism, we promise to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves and to strive for justice and peace, and respect the dignity of every human being. Let us now honor those vows and pray for our nation in this election season, for wise and just leaders, and for the needs of others throughout our country and the world.

We pray for continued blessings on all peacemakers, on leaders who value peace, and on everyone who promotes nonviolent solutions to conflict. We pray for a speedy end to all violence and warfare around the world.

God of peace and gentleness,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for the strength of heart and mind to look beyond ourselves and address the needs of our siblings throughout the world; for the rural and urban poor; for the rebuilding of our communities; and for an end to the cycles of violence that threaten our future.

God of generosity and compassion,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for all nations, that they may live in unity, peace, and concord; and that all people may know justice and enjoy the perfect freedom that only God can give.

God of liberty and freedom,

Hear our prayer.

We pray that the Holy Spirit may embrace the most vulnerable members of our society; we pray also for an end to the growing disparity between the rich and poor; and for the grace and courage to strive for economic justice. God of all gifts and blessings,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for an end to prejudice throughout our country and the world; that we will respect all people as precious children of God; and that racism, sexism, and all other forms of discrimination will be forever banished from our hearts, our society, and our laws.

God of fellowship and equality,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for a reverence of creation; that we will have the tools and the will to conserve it; that we will use its bountiful resources in the service of others; and that we will become better stewards of all that has been entrusted to us.

God of nature and the universe.

Hear our prayer.

We pray for all immigrants, refugees, and pilgrims from around the world, that they may be welcomed in our midst and be treated with fairness, dignity, and respect.

God of outcasts and wanderers,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for the sick, the aged and the infirm; for those with physical or mental disabilities; that all may have access to proper health care; and that God's loving embrace may be felt by all who suffer.

God of comfort and healing,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for all prisoners and captives; that a spirit of forgiveness may replace vengeance and retribution; and that we, with all the destitute, lonely, and oppressed, may be restored to the fullness of God's grace.

God of absolution and mercy,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for all children and families, and particularly for the orphaned, neglected, abused, and those who live in fear of violence or disease; that they may be relieved and protected.

God of children and families,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for the reconciliation of all people, and for the Church throughout the world, that it may be an instrument of your healing love.

God of outreach and restoration,

Hear our prayer.

We pray for all who have died as a result of violence, war, disease or famine, especially those who died because of human blindness, neglect, or hardness of heart.

God of eternal life and resurrecting love,

Hear our prayer.

Almighty God, you have promised to hear what we ask in the name of your Son. Watch over our country now and in the days ahead, guide our leaders and all who will vote, guide them in all knowledge and truth and make your ways known among all people. In the passion of debate give them a quiet spirit; in the complexities of the issues give them courageous hearts. Accept and fulfill our petitions, we pray, not as we ask in our ignorance, nor as we deserve in our sinfulness, but as you know and love us in your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. **AMEN.** Thanks be to God. Alleluia. Alleluia. Let us pray for all the departed, those we lost recently, this year or in years past. As we prepare for Advent, let us contemplate the arrival of the infant Jesus, and consider just what the anticipation of the birth of our redeemer and savior means for us at Saint Ann's and Fire Island Ministries.

Stewardship - Giving Thanks for God's Blessings- In Multiple Ways!

THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU!!!

As individuals, and as a Parish, we have so much to be thankful for in this past year. I pray that we all have been spiritually moved by the refreshing changes that have transformed our Body of Christ to more appropriately reflect God's beauty, mercy, presence and Love.

For starters, we embraced modern, uniform lighting and enhanced sound system in our historic Church with updated livestreaming capability. Our grounds are welcoming, with new signage and outdoor lighting to provide safety and security on both sides of Middle Road.

This year, we welcomed The People's ARC as an outreach ministry partner, for whom we are grateful for their work in equipping folks with disabilities for the workforce so they may reach their full potential, and for their assistance in supporting our expanding Food Pantry ministry which is now open both Mondays and Wednesdays 10-12. Our recently refloored Thrift Shop nurtured by the enthusiasm of Linda Maddox and Cindy Reinsert provides a shopping experience that rivals Macy's (at a fraction of the price) and welcomes both our growing population of customers in need and new volunteers (you!) willing to help out.

Who can forget the spirituality and fellowship offered by our Lenten Soup Suppers, St. Barnabas Day, "St. Ann's at Cherry Grove", the top notch Fall Festival Weekend (with CM's "Journey of the Cross and Crucifixion"), and our superb Fish Fry, all which offered opportunities for the Community to experience the joy and love which we share with each other! The Art Show last month deserves honorable mention, too!

And, it is only November- next weekend, we do it again—our umptieth annual Christmas Fair with a "Parishioners Only" Wine and Cheese Friday Night, November 7 and the festive Fair Day experience on November 8...We welcome the Community again for Christmas Tree Lighting on the Great Lawn November 28 with seven hundred sixteen Christmas Trees arriving November 29.... In December, Creative Ministries returns with a new production, "Behold the Moment!" Throw in those wonderful Senior Luncheons, Movie Nights, Coffee Hours and weekly Men's Group meetings on Tuesdays, and we certainly offer opportunities to live it up!

At worship, we have been honored to welcome so many new young Christians throughout the year at baptisms, the Wednesday Mass and Healing Service became a reality in May, our nascent Sunday School ministry nurtured by Kaitlyn Crevoiserat and Deacon Susan became regularized this Fall, and we adults have enjoyed presentations at the May Vestry Forum, in September by Deacon Frederico on Food for the Poor, Christine Schiebler on Elder law, and Officer Vincent Maio on Senior Safety. Our homebound have received communion and pastoral care visitations following Sunday services with Deacon Susan and others.

In this season of gratitude, I thank you for having returned your Stewardship Intent card for 2026 on or before Commitment Sunday, November 2. If you haven't returned the card which was mailed in late October, I pray that the many opportunities we have shared recently in worship, fellowship, outreach, and spirituality have moved all of us in our faith journey to experience God's reconciling love so that our Thanks Giving Love offering mirrors our journey in Faith.

As we prepare our pledge, may we also consider an amount above and beyond for the **Bell Tower Restoration Capital Campaign** which is launching this month. You may know that the Tower has experienced extensive

porosity during severe rainstorms, with rainwater pooling and collecting inside the beautifully restored Sacristy. A team of tradesmen experienced in historic Church stonework guided by a scope of work prepared by our architect and nurtured by our Buildings and Grounds Committee will be scheduling work in the Spring to address deterioration in the stonework, roof flashing, louvers and drainage system. As part of the process, the craftsmen may remove existing mortar and repoint with new lime-based mortar that is breathable. Once completed, the stone tower surfaces would be sealed, again with a breathable penetrating sealer that creates a water barrier from within the stone. Where necessary, the window frames will be sealed to prevent moisture infiltration.

Consider that the bell tower symbolizes the spiritual presence and message of our Body of Christ, its elevated structure calling the faithful to worship, announcing services, and serving as a visible landmark for navigation. Beyond gathering people, the ringing bell serves to purify spaces, ward off negativity, and help focus the mind on spiritual matters by marking times of prayer or signifying moments of transition. I pray that we will be enthused as this project commences and take spiritual and financial ownership as the campaign launches...

As a separate project to be completed at the same time for cost savings, the baptismal font will be permanently positioned near the pipe organ, with structural reinforcement in the undercroft to support the weight. This project of spiritual significance would be funded separately.

Again, Thank you! I trust that as we reflect fondly on the past, we can envision a future together whereby each of us can be Christ's Light in this World, offering hope, mercy, forgiveness, joy, and most of all, His Love to so many who need it.

CREATION CARE CORNER By Joe Castelli

Play it Again, Sam

I imagine myself sitting, glass in hand, at Rick's Place. You know, that smoke filled joint in Casablanca, feeling depressed because I see that dame who just walked back into my life after all these years. But in reality, I'm actually at my kitchen table sipping some lukewarm tea and munching on a pie shaped wedge from yesterday's quiche. I'm staring aimlessly at the cardboard box in front of me from Chewy – feeling depressed because I know what's in store for Nya (my K9 pal) and I as we walk the streets of Sayville this pre-holiday season. So, in response to this I say: Play my February Correspondent Cardboard article again, Sam! (or should that be, Joe?). If they can stand it, so can I!

Let's face it: Around this time of year many of us do our Christmas shopping online, which means the number of boxes we collect increases substantially. And although it's important to put these boxes out with the paper recycled trash year-round, it's especially important around the Christmas holidays because of the volume of cardboard we collect. Cardboard, when put out on our paper recycling days, is processed differently than our regular trash. No, paper and regular trash don't end up in the same place. Once again, they're processed differently.

So, what happens to the boxes when we throw them into the regular trash? They end up getting burnt with our regular garbage in a Waste to Energy Plant. These plants use the heat generated by the garbage to turn water into steam. This steam is then used to turn a turbine, which rotates a generator to produce electricity. On the other hand, when we combine our corrugated boxes with our recycled paper trash, it all gets baled and sent to a papermill. Here the papermill uses a process which reconstitutes the paper trash into huge rolls of new paper, which can then be used to make all kinds of paper products - including corrugated boxes!

There's a great resource from the town of Islip (Google: Town of Islip Waste and Disposal Guide PDF). It's a downloadable twenty-page document which explains how to dispose of 157 (and I counted them!) common and not so common items. Basically, everything from the kitchen sink (literally!) to various types of batteries, and even horse manure (Ugh!). It also states that you can put out un-corrugated clean cardboard boxes (shoe boxes, gift boxes, cereal boxes, and pasta boxes, etc.) with your recycled paper trash (but please, no pizza boxes stained with oil!). And you can also recycle plastic coated cardboard and boxes with attached cellophane. That gets removed at the papermill during the process that turns the recycled paper into those giant, new paper rolls. So, what are you waiting for?

In closing, ("As Time Goes By") if we can all do a better job recycling our cardboard, I think I would say (in the spirit of "Bogie"): "Nya, I think this will be the beginning of some beautiful walks together."
