
## North Star People

In *Scribbling in the Sand* (InterVarsity Press), Christian musician Michael Card notes that the north sky is relatively dark at night. Polaris, or the North Star, is a great frame of reference, but when most people see the North Star for the first time, they're surprised it isn't brighter.

Card recommends that we strive to become North Star people, rather than attention-seeking stars that burn out quickly.

"Seldom will people point their telescopes at us. And when they do, they will no doubt respond, 'Oh, I thought she was brighter than that.' But as North Star people, we can serve a deeper purpose. When people need us, we can be there for them, pointing [to] the Way. While the world is spinning at a dizzying pace, we can remain grounded to the same spot, less dazzling but unmovable.

"After all, Jesus was a North Star person. There was nothing in his appearance that seemed especially brilliant, according to Isaiah. In his time there were far more dazzling messianic stars who came and went with a flash. But Jesus has always remained there, rooted to the same place in the universe, unmovable. He constantly calls out to us to turn around and behold the dazzling dimness of his light, as it shines in this present world — to find our way to it, and then to find our way by it."



## FROM THE EDITOR

So often today we are forced to defend our faith because of the bad press Christianity gets from folks who love to hate—or if not exactly “hate”, at least push their rigid views of Christianity on those who don’t care to share them. I was reading an article on this subject by the Rev. Dr. Douglass M. Bailey, an Episcopal priest and contributor to the website *explorefaith.org*. He suggests that this phenomenon can be explained by reading a book which became popular in the 1950’s called *Your God Is Too Small* by J. B. Phillips. The book contends that many Christians seem to have a very small God—one who has a lot of rules and wants everyone to follow them all the same. They are bent on punishing the non-believers in the name of God. They forget that God made the world—the whole world—and in the words of a poster I once saw, “God Don’t Make No Junk.”

The Rev. Dr. Bailey contends that one of the greatest contributions of the Episcopal Church is the balance of grace over guilt. We are meant to love one another—not oppress one another. The only way we can overcome the too-small God is to work harder to be the voice of grace and acceptance. So in the spirit of the Easter Season, let us all reach out into the world and be the loving hands of Jesus. —**Rodney Dudley**

# THE RECTOR'S CORNER



## THE LONG SEASON OF PENTECOST (ORDINARY TIME)

At the end of this month, we will enter the last and longest season of the church year, the season of Pentecost. The length of this season depends upon the date of Easter, and it can be as long as twenty eight weeks; but the season always begins on Trinity Sunday and ends the Sunday before Advent. So, this year the season of Pentecost will run from May 31 – November 22.

In the Roman Church, this season is referred to as Ordinary Time – and you sometimes hear that term used in the Episcopal Church as well, because this period of the church year is not dedicated to a particular observance of the church such as we do in the seasons of Christmas, Lent and Easter. Pentecost is also referred to as the “green season” because the hangings and vestments are green.

So, if we don't have any particular dedicated observance, what are we doing for the feeding of our spirit and soul during the season of Pentecost? We are being reflective. Pentecost is a season of reflection. It is a season when we reflect on how we live out our lives in the Christian faith and how we understand Christ's resurrection in our ordinary time and life. For example, during this season we don't hear stories of Jesus' life; rather we hear parables and miracle stories that allow us to reflect on how we relate to Christ and the impact and importance his teachings have on our lives.

So, during this long and ordinary season of green, give yourself the gift of reflection. How are Christ's teachings and parables touching your soul, engaging your spirit, inviting you into a closer relationship with Christ and the work he is calling you to do? This Pentecost I invite you to spend some time listening for what Jesus is saying to you and to your life, and then having the courage to do it!

# Vestry Visions

The signs of spring are finally here. Now is the time to get out in our yards and get them cleaned and in order. In the coming months you will be seeing a lot of activity around St. Ann's. The cemetery will be getting a big clean-up and a much needed sprucing up. The Labyrinth, after many years of neglect, will be redone in pavers and surrounded by botanical gardens. The bushes around the Stations of the Cross will be removed, and used elsewhere, and new smaller bushes planted. The focal point will be the Stations, not the bushes. This will also open up the Labyrinth and the gardens. The large overgrown bushes by our beautiful High Cross will be removed, and smaller low growing evergreens and some perennial flowers will be planted. Again the main focal point is the Cross—not the bushes. The vines that have taken over the trees and the stream area will be removed and the area cleaned up, but not really changed. The area behind the mausoleum will have the back of the stores screened from view with various trees and evergreens. This will give that area of the cemetery a calm, country feel. The gardens by the Lytch gate will be spruced up with additional perennial flowers and bulbs.

Our cemetery is a wonderful place to just get out of your car and take a tranquil walk. It abounds with all types of wild life, and has benches throughout for resting and just to meditate and take a few minutes to reflect on life.

Our cemetery has so much history. There are five past priests of St. Ann's buried there. The families of the people who gave us our beautiful church and the cemetery are there. We even have a Civil War General and a United States diplomat. The people who are buried there are both rich and poor alike. They are who made St. Ann's and the surrounding communities what they are today.

The parking lot behind the church will be getting paved and much needed drains will be added. This should alleviate the large puddles that appear after a heavy rain and the icy conditions that we have had for the past couple of winters.

The much needed handicap ramp at the entrance to the church will hopefully be started in the coming months.

## Reality

It is always difficult to see our reality when it is not pretty. However, the real change always begins when we admit it. Heroin is skyrocketing in Suffolk especially among teenagers. Parents will never admit that their kids use drugs. As a parent of a victim once said to a reporter, "It's difficult to admit that your child took heroin. It was difficult for us to admit it to ourselves. She was beautiful. She was smart. She did not look like a heroin addict."

Last year, we invited to St. Ann's a panel of four teenagers who are in the recovery program at Outreach House. All of them also said that their parents never noticed their drug issues until the fatal problems came up. Just as the one parent said, they are smart, and they look the same as other teenagers.



On May 4<sup>th</sup>, we will invite four teenagers from Outreach House to visit St. Ann's again. It will be a great opportunity for kids, parents and all parishioners to learn about the reality of drugs and to learn how to protect our kids and our community from this evil epidemic on Long Island.

Those amazing teenagers will allow us to hear how their addiction began, their perspectives on what could have been done differently, and how they reached a point of readiness to accept help.

It is highly recommended that parents, children, Sunday school teachers and the Vestry attend this workshop on Monday, May 4, at 7:00 PM in the Parish Hall.

On April 14<sup>th</sup> at 12:00 Noon in the Parish Hall a maritime-themed luncheon was held for approximately 45 guests. Paige Sato, Manager of the Seamen's Church Institute's Christmas at Sea Program, was the guest speaker. She gave an interesting talk on the history of the work of being a seaman and on the churches and institutes that care for them in various ports. They are away from home for long stretches of time, and a place to gather on land with their fellow mariners goes a long way to making them feel more at home. Since 1834, the Seamen's Church Institute (SCI) has been providing for the needs of individual mariners both spiritually and physically.



The Christmas at Sea Program has for many years provided handmade hats and scarves for thousands of these transport workers. Even more than the gift of a hat or scarf, it indicates that someone put in a lot of time and care to provide these items. They are sent out with personal tags, and the mariners take great pride in knowing that "Eloise" or "Martha" or "The Ladies of St. Swithuns" made their particular item. They have patterns for various types of hats and scarves and encourage anyone who is interested to join with them. If you would like to learn how to knit, contact Linda Munkelwitz. 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


Is it enough to think today

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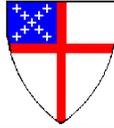

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## Our Church History

### ❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten ❖

**WILLIAM EDWARD HALSEY**  
**MRS. WILLIAM E. HALSEY**  
Section 28 – Lots 5-8

**William Edward Halsey**, a well known Brooklyn dentist, died at his home at 203 Jefferson Avenue, in late November of 1922 after a 10-day illness. He was 54 years old. Dr. Halsey was the father of Mrs. George A. Robinson, Jr., of Brooklyn and Sayville. He was well known in Brooklyn as a hunter of big game and a fisherman. Dr. Halsey was born in Keenan, Columbia County, a son of Ellen Elizabeth Halsey. Having graduated from the Pennsylvania Dental College in Philadelphia, Dr. Halsey had practiced in Brooklyn since 1892.

At the time of his death, Dr. Halsey left his wife Ella P., two daughters, Mrs. George A. Robinson, Jr., and Mrs. William Edward Brown; a brother, Franklin Clark Halsey of Cleveland, Ohio; four sisters; and two granddaughters, Betty Brown and Lillian Halsey Robinson. Funeral services took place at the doctor's late home. Burial was in St. Ann's Cemetery.



**Ella P. Halsey**, widow of Dr. William E. Halsey, died on July 16, 1931, in Southside Hospital, where she had spent the past three months. Mrs. Halsey, formerly a Brooklyn resident, had made her home in Sayville for the last several years. She was survived by her son, W. Bertran Remy of Ridgewood, NJ, and two daughters, Mrs. William E. Brown of New York and Sayville, and Mrs. George A. Robinson, Jr., of Sayville. Funeral services were conducted by the Reverend Joseph H. Bond in St. Ann's Episcopal Church. Burial was next to her husband in St. Ann's Cemetery.

## Glimpsing God?

A December 2014 *New York Times* article profiled Alberto Cairo, an Italian man who for 25 years has run orthopedic centers in Afghanistan. Woven throughout was the story of a chrysanthemum bouquet in Cairo's office. He told the reporter that his dearest friend, Sergio, had recently died. "His birthday was a few days ago," Cairo shared. Had he been in Italy, he would've placed yellow mums, his friend's favorite, at the grave. Instead, that very day, an Afghan staff member had brought yellow flowers to Cairo, saying, "I thought you might need these."

Cairo said, "[He] had never come to my office before, knew nothing about Sergio, and ... I have never seen these flowers in Afghanistan before." He concluded, "I believe that when the dead are dead, they're dead. But what am I supposed to think about this?"

I'll never know whether Cairo comes to believe in life beyond death, but coincidence is said to be God remaining anonymous. Maybe he's at work — through yellow mums. —**Heidi Mann**

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
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## +Christian Symbol+

- (1) Prepare a meal for someone recovering from a recent illness or fall.
- (2) Drive someone to a doctor's appointment and bring them home.
- (3) Bring someone to church (perhaps once a month) if they are unable to drive.
- (4) Make a phone call to someone homebound just to let them know they are not forgotten.
