## THE RECTOR'S CORNER



### Advent 4 and Christmas Eve All in One Day—Oh No!



Every seven years or so, Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday and the liturgical seasons of Advent and Christmas meet head on. This is one such year, and it can be a little confusing. So, while the secular calendar says it's Christmas Eve, the liturgical calendar says it's also the fourth Sunday of Advent. What do we do on these occasions? How do we get the church decorated for Christmas?

On the morning of December 24<sup>th</sup>, we will celebrate the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Advent with **one service** at 10:00 (there will NOT be a 5:00 p.m. service on the 23rd or an 8:00 a.m. on the 24<sup>th</sup>). We will follow the Propers for Advent 4, and the church will be bare of any semblance of Christmas or decorations, as we are still liturgically in the season of Advent. However, immediately following the 10:00 service, Christmas will burst forth in the church with flowers, decorations and all the beautiful glory of the season we experience every year and we will have our standard compliment of four services of Christmas Eve and one on Christmas morning. All the Christmas services are listed on page 1 of *The Correspondent*.



It takes a village to put these liturgies together, especially in a year such as this one; so please make sure to thank the choir, the altar guild, the ushers, and those who serve at the altar for all the hard work they will put into these ministries so that the glory of God can be celebrated on this, the most glorious night of Christ's birth.

### The Great Date Debate

In *Lessons of Christmas* (Xulon Press), Daniel Armah notes that ancient scholars expressed more than 130 opinions about Jesus' actual birthdate, covering every month of the year. "Even with a debatable date," he concludes, "the blessing of Christmas is obvious."

Likewise, our Christmas celebrations aren't diminished by the possible timing of Jesus' birthday with secular festivals. "If December 25th was chosen to rival other pagan worship activities ... for want of a real date," Armah writes, "then that decision has been successful. Indeed, those ancient pagan festivals have all been swallowed up, and Christianity has been growing since."

## The Giver

Christian families struggle with what role — if any — Santa Claus should play in their Christmas celebrations. No matter what you decide, it's fascinating to know the history of the real-life St. Nicholas.

Born about 270 A.D., Nicholas was a bishop in Myra, or modern-day Turkey. In the year 325, he was part of the Council of Nicaea, which produced the Nicene Creed.

Nicholas, known for his generosity, often gave away his money anonymously. According to tradition, he secretly provided dowries for the three daughters of a bankrupt merchant. Nicholas threw two bags of gold through open windows and placed the third in a stocking hanging by the fireplace to dry. Thus, began the Christmas tradition of placing gifts in stockings.



St. Nicholas is quoted as saying, "The giver of every good and perfect gift has called upon us to mimic God's giving, by grace, through faith, and this is not of ourselves."

## Everlasting Joy

In a *Chicken Soup for the Soul* sampler, Karen Asire tells of a particularly difficult Christmas after her husband left and began divorce proceedings. As Karen and her three young children set up their tree, she fought tears and secretly tucked aside certain ornaments, such as one announcing "Our First Christmas Together."

Several days later, a neighbor stopped by with a gold decoration proclaiming JOY. "We've hung this ornament on our tree for several years," she explained, "but this year we wanted you to have it." When Asire hung it on the tree and stepped back, "all the other ornaments seemed to fade into the background, and all [she] saw was the shimmering gold of the JOY ornament." She allowed herself to cry then, grateful for the reminder that amid grief and heartache, God's love shines.

Pain fades in time, while God's Christmas gift — Jesus — brings joy that lasts forever.

The Daughters have been busy this past month cutting and stringing the plastic bags for the sleeping mats. We have two new volunteers helping us with this project.

We have donated the following items to Mary's Peanut butter and jelly ministry:

- 2 cases of toothpaste
- 2 cases of Woman's deodorant
- 2 cases of men's deodorant
- 1 case of tampons
- 2 cases of tooth brushes

These items were ordered through Dollar Tree. Some of the ladies from Gospel Community Church found out we were ordering large quantities of these items and gave us a catalog for the distributor that supplies a lot of the Dollar Tree stores. They are much cheaper and are brand name items. We placed an order that will be distributed in December to Mary (for the PBJ Ministry), the Eastern Farm workers, and Hope House.

1,500 prayer squares have been distributed to various organizations that have requested them.

30 pounds of fabric, to be used in quilts, has been sent to the South Dakota Indian Reservation.

On Friday, November 17, Marge set up the Prayer Chapel at the Long Island Episcopal Convention in Melville. Although Marge was the lone representative from St. Ann's, a Daughter from another chapter helped her.

Right after Thanksgiving we will be bring various knitted and crocheted items to the Eastern Farm workers and to Hope House.

We will be meeting with people from St. Paul's in Patchogue and Christ Church, Bellport, to discuss ways to help the Eastern Farm Workers after the holidays. —**Carol Ann St. Lawrence**

# PEANUT BUTTER AND JELLY MINISTRY

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Merry Christmas to all! I am very happy to report to you that October and November brought a lot of joy and much needed clothes, hygiene, coats, food, and more, because of your love and generosity! November was very busy in Riverhead, Quogue, Patchogue, Bellport, Central Islip, and Brentwood. Many of the families and individuals that we have helped are working, but they are struggling to make ends meet. There are not many full-time jobs with benefits available, so many folks must resort to holding down up to three part-time jobs at once, juggling work and kids.

Social Services has once again changed its requirements, and in most cases, a recipient must pay back any Food Stamp funds, rent assistance, or fuel assistance. While this may sound logical to some, it is very difficult for low income families to get ahead. Handing out simple index cards, with English words on one side, and Spanish on the other, has been very helpful. Several immigrant families, who have received these simple gifts, have used them to organize their own pop-up English Language classes. One family in Brentwood, expanded on the set I gave them, using the library computer to make more. This same family, is hosting their first Christmas party this year, and have made all their friends sets of language cards for Christmas! Learning more English, in a comfortable setting, is helping this family settle into the USA. This lovely group of people is now working on their documentation, dreaming to become citizens here, after running from extreme violence in their home country. Classes in some libraries are offered, but they fill up quickly, so these index cards are quite helpful. If anyone is interested in making a set, please feel free to contact me.



This December, we are joyously travelling to NYC, to spread some Christmas Cheer! My goal is to fill 300--yes, 300--Christmas Stockings, with oranges, candy, toothbrushes and toothpaste, soap, and wash cloths. We will also need to bring coats, shoes, socks, warm clothes, peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, water, and more. I am also working on a new info sheet, with tips for warming centers, hot meals, and counseling, along with emergency shelters. If you can contribute to this act of love, please contact me. We will leave early on the last Saturday of December.

Speaking of Christmas Cheer, today was an amazing kick-off to the Christmas season. Our Gingerbread House Decorating was lots of fun, and Several people who do not have a church family came! It was so wonderful, to see our St Ann's Family interact with new friends, making them feel included, wanted, and loved. I think that Jesus was smiling today! Those wonderful freshly baked gingerbread houses, were held together by frosting, but what made them oh so special, was God's all-inclusive Love, demonstrated by all of



you. We even had a special visit from Santa, who kindly took pictures with the families! I don't know for sure, but Santa sort of looked a lot like our own Mr. Don Hester! I wonder if Santa realized that he brought joy today to some kids who are having tough stuff go on, and was able to forget it all for a few loving moments. Our own Jackie Gandolfo, was definitely Santa's elf, picking up special snacks, arranging for the orders, and she did all that with joy and grace. I would like to thank Mother Diane, and Father Brian, for encouraging our special brand of fellowship. And I would like to once again thank all of you, making me feel safe, strong, loved and important, for this gives me strength to work with the needy. I don't need to win the lottery. I'm already wealthy!

The couple lives in Patchogue.






### EMPLOYEE OF THE MONTH

## Our Church History

### ❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten

**WARRINGTON BATES STARK  
MILDRED STOLL STARK  
Section 46 / Lot 4**

**Warrington Bates Stark** was 78 years of age when he died on October 16, 1974, after suffering through a long illness. Mr. Stark was born in Dorchester, MA, but made his home in Bayport for most of his life, where he worked for the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company. Once he retired, he was able to devote time to his many interests, including the Bayport Fire Department and the Bayport Fire Police; the Islip Town Exempt Firemen, Connetquot Lodge 838 F&AM, and the Connetquot Square Club. He also served on the Bayport Board of Education and the Selective Service Board.

Mr. Stark is survived by his wife Mildred and one son, Warrington, of Berlin, CT; a grandson; and a great-grandson. After Fire Department and Masonic services were held on October 18, at the Bayport Funeral Home, religious services were conducted on October 19 at St. Ann's Episcopal Church by the Rev. Mr. Joseph Bond, Rector Emeritus. He was laid to rest in St. Ann's Cemetery.

**Mildred Stoll Stark** died on March 5, 1977, at the age of 74, following a long illness. A lifelong resident of Bayport, she lost her husband Warrington in 1974. Mrs. Stark was the daughter of Michael and Nettie Stryker Stoll, making her a member of two well-known local families. Mildred's life was celebrated on March 7 in St. Ann's Episcopal Church, with the Rev. Mr. Joseph Bond officiating. She was interred next to her husband in St. Ann's Cemetery.

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## +Christian Symbol+



### Branch (Tree) of Jesse

Isaiah used the image of a new tree growing from what appears dead to foretell God's redemption of Israel: "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit" (Isaiah 11:1, NIV).

During Advent, this prophecy assures us of the coming of the Messiah, descended from King David, and thus his father, Jesse.

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
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
