### A PENGUIN PARABLE

During storms, emperor penguins huddle for warmth, taking turns at the center and on the perimeter of the group. While incubating eggs, up to 6,000 male penguins have been observed clustering for shelter against the harsh Antarctic winter. Partially grown chicks gather in protective "crèches" (French for "cribs"); often surrounded by a colony of adults, these groupings ward off predators and cold.

## Thoughts from the Front Porch Father Brian Barry



I love Christmas. It is the yearly festival where we remember Emmanuel- God who is among us. The Incarnation--the point in time which God chose to become human to live with us, walk among us, teach us, care for us, and ultimately die for us, is the greatest thing that has ever happened in human history. Further, as God did for us, in deciding to take the humble form of a baby in a manger, so we are called to do for others- humbling ourselves to care for those in the world who are in need of some good news. My front porch thoughts through Christmas have turned to humility, and, in specific, how can we humbly incarnate Christ in our own lives.

Humility is a funny thing. It's been said that once you think you've got it, you have to start all over again. The very sentence "I am humble" is a paradox unless it is uttered by Jesus Christ himself, for to acknowledge one's own humility is to be boasting about it. Truly humble people don't think of themselves as such- they know that the path of humility is a journey that lacks a finite destination in this world. The odd thing about humility is that it is like pride, in that most often we can only see it in others and very rarely do we notice it in ourselves.

The early Christians considered humility to be one of the great spiritual virtues--particularly because it was as rare during their times as it is today. Paul tells us in his epistles not to think more highly of ourselves than we ought to. St. Augustine viewed pride as the greatest of sins, and found humility to be a rare gem, even (sometimes he would say especially) among religious people and clergy. We live in a world that values self-aggrandizement- from reality TV stars who become famous for no particular reason, to everyday people who fancy themselves internet celebrities and feel the need to share their every thought, inclination, or meal on Facebook, Twitter, or a blog. I have been guilty of such in my life--it's the reason I avoid social media entirely. I am entirely too opinionated to be given an unlimited public platform that doesn't require me to exercise an ounce of thought or judgment before speaking my mind. When I forget this, I find myself in needless conflicts with people I care about, as we butt heads very publicly over differences of belief that can normally be tolerated, if not accepted.

Maybe that is a small way that we can consider our own growth in humility as we move from Christmas and into Epiphany. On or off the Internet, if we don't think too highly of ourselves, we will think before we speak. If we think before we speak, we might remember that Paul tells us to only use words to build each other up, not tear each other down. And if we begin to build each other up and avoid needless confrontation, we might remember that we are called to be like our humble savior, who said "Blessed are the Peacemakers."

### Prayer for a New Beginning

Dear Lord,  
Touch me with your Spirit of truth so I may be honest about my sins and failures. Forgive me for treating your covenant lightly and at times ignoring it completely. Help me truly seek and know forgiveness for all the hurts I've caused, for harboring ill will and for any hardness of heart I may have. Please renew a right spirit within me that I may become more Christ-like and that my life may daily reveal your love and light. In your name. Amen.

## PEANUT BUTTER AND JELLY MINISTRY

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On Saturday, December 30, we made our last mission trip of 2017 into the city. While the cold temperatures were not pleasant, we were reminded that our discomfort was only temporary, and the homeless needed our wares more than ever. There were seven of us from St. Ann's pulling five wagons and a rolling suitcase on the LIRR. We recalled last year at this time, when we had no wagons and were lugging large plastic bags of assorted items. This year we were organized! Jackets in small, medium, and large. Scarves, gloves, and hats. Toiletries prepacked. Lunch size bags for sandwiches and other food items—including candy canes. We even had a stash of backpacks, which are always popular.



We were joined in the city by a crew of five from Zion Church in Douglaston. Their presence has been growing, and we have enjoyed getting to know them and forming an inter-parish bond while serving the city's homeless.

Once we were set up on our street corner in front of Madison Square Garden, we had a slow trickle of familiar faces who wait for our visits each month. The crowd grew during the morning, and actually, we found that we served quite a few towards the end when we re-entered Penn Station where it was warmer.

One of the saddest things we saw was a homeless mother and her 2-year-old baby. They stay in a shelter at night, but have to leave in the morning. She has a stroller, but no place to take her child home to. The child seemed happy enough and was enjoying the attention from us friendly strangers, but they need so much more that we can't offer.



While we did bring some things back on the train with us, they were loaded into Mary's car, and she later did a distribution of winter supplies to people on Long Island who are in need.

Thanks to all who donated and who continue to help with our supplies—the Daughters of the King, Zion Church Douglaston, and the many kindnesses of St. Ann's parishioners.

Our next venture into the city will be the last Saturday of January—January 27<sup>th</sup>.

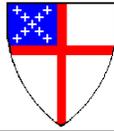
## The Freedom of Forgiveness



Martin Luther King Jr. called forgiveness "a permanent attitude," as opposed to "an occasional act." Maintaining a forgiveness mind-set leads to peace and freedom.

Author and pastor Max Anders experienced that freedom in seminary. After cheating on a Hebrew final, he was distraught and confessed his sin to God and the professor. "I felt deeply cleaned. Pure. Holy," Anders writes in *21 Unbreakable Laws of Life*. "I wanted to laugh and cry at the same time. I wanted to run and jump and dance. The burden was lifted. ... I was free!"

By contrast, he writes, "If we don't ask for forgiveness when we wrong someone, we lose our moral authority; the debris of sin begins to accumulate in our hearts, choking our conscience .... Others know when we sin against them, and if we don't make it right, it hurts our reputation as well as God's."

## *Our Church History*

### ❖ **The Garden of the Unforgotten**

**MRS. MARY SCHMIDT  
BRUNO SCHMIDT  
Section 41 / Lot 3**

**Mrs. Mary Schmidt**, wife of Bruno Schmidt, was 80 years old when she passed away at her home at 154 Handsome Avenue, Sayville, on May 15, 1956. She had been born in Elizabeth, NJ, but lived in Brooklyn for many years. While in Brooklyn, she was active in the work of the Bushwick Hospital Auxiliary.

For 35 years prior to her death, Mary and Bruno lived in Sayville, where she became a dedicated member of the Sayville Garden Club. In July the Schmidts would have celebrated their 59<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary.

Mary was survived by her husband Bruno, two daughters—Mrs. Irene S. Fangan and Mrs. Lilian S. MacQueen—both of Sayville; two sisters—Mrs. Frieda Windecker of Brooklyn and Mrs. William Ramm of Jamaica; and five grandchildren.

Her burial was conducted from her home by the Rev. Mr. Joseph Bond, Rector of St. Ann's Episcopal Church. She was buried in the Garden of the Unforgotten.

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**Bruno Schmidt** followed his wife in death just three months later. Bruno suffered a short illness and died in Southside Hospital at the age of 84. Born in Berlin, Germany, he was brought to this country as an infant. As a young man in his teens, he already knew what he wanted to do in life and began the study of textiles, becoming a specialist in printing and converting cotton textiles. He invented a new process for printing textiles, working for many years with S. M. Schwab, Jr. & Co. Bruno was later affiliated with the Arnold Print Works from which he retired in 1929.

The Schmidts, along with their two daughters, moved to Sayville around 1916, after having summered here for many years. They attended Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Great River where Bruno served on the Vestry. He was also a member of Connetquot Lodge, F&AM.

Funeral services were held from his home on Handsome Avenue, with the rev. Mr. Joseph Bond, Rector of St. Ann's Episcopal Church, officiating. He was buried next to his wife in St. Ann's Garden of the Unforgotten.

### CHRISTOS

This set of letters spells "Christ" in Greek. It may be written using the Roman alphabet (from which the English alphabet descended), but is also often presented in Greek characters, as shown here.


