Please join us the weekend of November 23, 2019, to hear The Rev. George Ronkowitz speak at all the services about a ministry providing direct relief to the poor throughout Latin America and the Caribbean.

Fr. Ronkowitz will share personal witness about Food for the Poor's mission to care for the destitute as a means of living out the Gospel mandate to love one another.

Ordained since 1971, Fr. Ronkowitz, has served parishes in the Dioceses of Connecticut and Southeast Florida, most recently as Rector of St. John's Episcopal Church in Homestead, Florida. In addition to parish ministry, Fr. Ronkowitz's passion for serving the poor was also manifested in his years as the Executive Director of the Naugatuck, Connecticut Housing Authority, a position from which he retired in 2002. In addition to preaching on behalf of Food for the Poor, Fr. Ronkowitz also serves as the part-time Associate Rector at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Palmetto Bay, Fl.

# A Word from the Interim Rector Father Hugh James



## Dream Big

Dear Friends,

November is the month when, in America, we traditionally give thanks. It's also the time that churches think about their budgets, and appeal to their members to pledge their giving for the next year. I would like you to know how much I, and the rest of the church's leadership, appreciate the way our members contribute to St. Ann's. I am constantly surprised by how many people support us in many different ways: through giving of time, talents and money. Without those contributions, we could not function as a church. We don't say "thank you" often enough, and so I want to say it now, loudly and clearly.

It is important that people pledge. Doing so enables us to set a realistic budget, and to plan for 2020. Some people think of St. Ann's as a wealthy church. There is some truth in that, as we have sizable endowments, but they are mostly limited to specific purposes. We need to support what we do with actual giving, if we are to continue successfully into the future. It is well known that we have been operating on a deficit budget for some time now. That means that our income is less than our expenditure. The vestry is committed to addressing this, which means we need to increase our overall giving. We have done well over the last year. When you see our accounts at the end of the year, it will be clear that we have achieved a very considerable reduction in our deficit during 2019. We cannot, though, be complacent, as we still have a way to go. We are in a time of transition as we search for a new Rector. To say that we have turned things around and no longer have a deficit budget would be a wonderful way to welcome our next rector. Is that a pipe dream? I don't think so, but to achieve it we as a congregation need to dig more deeply into our pockets.

Whilst we always hope that people will increase their giving, we recognize that circumstances change. For some that means they can give more. For others it means they need to reduce their giving. Only you can decide, after prayer, what is appropriate in your circumstances. Pledging is not only about the amount you pledge, but about the fact that you do pledge. It is one of the ways in which we identify ourselves as part of the church and show our participation in Christ.

I would also like you to consider the time and talents you give to the church. We are always in need of more volunteers. At present we are desperately short of teachers and chaperones for our Sunday ministry with children. Our youth club needs chaperones. The PBJ mission trips, both to New York and locally, need more help. Would you be able to pledge some time to one of those? Are there former ministries, Barnabas Buddies for example, that you wish could be given a new lease of life? Is there something you wish St. Ann's did, that you could help start? When Christians dream dreams, big things can happen. I would love to hear from anyone that would like to respond to these questions. Please call me or e-mail me, and I will be glad to have a conversation.

- If you are going to purchase a turkey, **please leave your name & phone # on sign-up sheet and return the turkey tagged with your name.**



## Where We Are



The earliest official reference to using "Taps" at a military funeral is described in an 1891 manual. During the Civil War, a Union soldier "was buried at a time when the battery occupied an advanced position concealed in the woods." Because it wasn't safe to fire the customary three volleys over the grave, Captain John Tidball decided the sounding of "Taps" would be an appropriate substitute ceremony. Previously, "Taps" signaled the end of a soldier's work day, but it has since come to honor the end of his or her earthly life. Horace Trim's lyrics remind us of God's constant presence:

Day is done, gone the sun  
From the lakes, from the hills, from the sky  
All is well, safely rest  
God is nigh.

Going home was much easier with our wagons almost empty. We were even able to carry them down the stairs to the train (which, again, was non-stop and on time!)

The hour is early, the work of getting there is tiring, and we keep busy non-stop for several hours, but we also have a good time. There are Krispy Kreme donuts, and we have some awesome discussions on the train. And there’s this great feeling that with all the sadness and anger going on in the world, you’re doing your little bit to help. I’d recommend it to anyone who wants to try it!



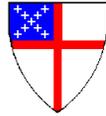
Next month because of Thanksgiving weekend, the trees, and all kinds of holiday activity going on, we’ll be going in on the **third** Saturday, November 23rd.

### ❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten

**Charles Hibbard**, eldest son of Mrs. Charles H. Ressler, died suddenly at the country residence of his mother in this village at the age of 36 years, on the first Monday evening of April 2903. He had been in seemingly good health and was about the village the day of his death. After returning home in the early evening, he sat down in a chair and, while in that position, was seized with heart failure. Dr. Van Deirse was hastily summoned, but it was too late, as death had been almost instantaneous. The deceased left his mother, two brothers, William and Clarence, and three sisters, Mrs. I. H. Green, Jr., of Sayville, Miss Camille M. Hibbard of Bayport; and Mrs. Elbert Terry of Port Washington. The Reverend J. H. Prescott conducted the services at the house on Thursday afternoon. Interment was in St. Ann's Cemetery.

## Lifelong Saints

Rather than limit the celebration of saints to one Sunday, some churches now observe a Season of Saints from World Communion Sunday (the first Sunday in October) to All Saints' Sunday (the first Sunday in November).

Saints aren't merely exceptional Christians, writes worship director Taylor Burton-Edwards. Instead, they're simply believers, all of whom are undergoing a lifetime of transformation into Christ's own people.

Pointing to a saint-themed hymn by Charles Wesley, Burton-Edwards notes that the lyrics are intended to be an "anthem for a lifetime," not a once-yearly occasion.
