ADVENT

Dear Parish Family,

On November 30, the Church begins its new year; and we begin it with the four-week season of Advent. In this four week season the liturgical color will change to purple; which represents penitence and expectation of Christ's coming again. The hymns and service music will be more somber in tone. And no longer will we hear the parables of Christ; rather the scripture readings will turn their focus to preparing for Christ's coming.



The name Advent is derived from the Latin word for "coming" and during these four weeks, which proceed Christmas, we are reminded that we are living in the "in-between times" of Christ. The time *after* Christ's first coming as a babe in a manger and *before* his Second Coming in power and great glory.

During the season of Advent, we are invited to examine our lives and examine how we are preparing ourselves for the Second Coming. The season of Advent invites us to take a spiritual journey in which we do a spiritual house cleaning and discard the things in our lives that get in the way of our relationship with Christ.

So for the four weeks before Christmas I invite you to find some time for silence, quiet reflection and prayer. Take some time to look inside your soul and do some spiritual house cleaning. Take some time in the stillness of your soul to listen to what God has to say to you and your life.

And then come with joy to celebrate the First Coming of Christ, and ready to live in preparedness for his Second Coming.

SAINT ANN'S 2ND ANNUAL BLOOD DRIVE

For the second year, Saint Ann's, in conjunction with the LI Blood Services, will be holding a blood drive on Wednesday, January 21, 2015, between 2:00 PM and 8:00 PM in the Parish Hall.

Any person, ages 16-75, weighing at least 110 pounds, who is in good health and who has not donated blood in the past six weeks, is eligible to give blood. Sixteen-year olds must have an official Blood Drive Permission slip signed by a parent. Adults over the age of 76 must have a note from their physician that they are able to donate blood.

All donors must provide photo ID.

Keep an eye out for further information to follow. We will be scheduling appointments in December.

After the meal there was a discussion of what we would like to see at future luncheons. Some of the suggestions were: local theater or movie, visit Long Island arboretums and gardens, guest speakers, talks on how to use new electronic gadgets, crowd friendly games such as Pictionary or Trivial Pursuit, and a suggestion of how we could get to know each other better by each of us sharing "our story" one luncheon at a time.

LINDA'S MINESTRONE SOUP

1 clove garlic, chopped
 ½ C. chopped onion
 2 carrots, diced
 ½ lb. potatoes, diced
 1 tsp. salt
 1 tsp. dried basil
 ½ C whole wheat pasta

1 T. Oil
 6 C. tomato or V8 juice
 1 stalk diced celery
 1 T. chopped parsley
 1 small zucchini, diced
 1 C. canned beans (navy)
 2 ½ C. greens (ie, spinach)

Sauté the garlic in oil. Add onion and cook until softened. Add juice, carrots, potatoes, celery, salt, parsley and basil. Bring to a boil. Cover and simmer 20 min. Add zucchini, macaroni, beans and greens. Cover and simmer 30 min. or until tender. Serve with grated cheese.

KAREN'S CHICKEN ORZO ARTICHOKE SOUP

1/3 box orzo
 1 large onion, diced
 1 clove garlic, minced
 4 tablespoons Olive oil
 1 9oz pkg frzn artichoke hearts, thawed
 2 quarts chicken stock

3 pints cherry tomatoes, halved
 Salt and Pepper to taste
 Boneless chicken strips (3 thigh's worth)
 1/2 cup pecorino Romano cheese
 6 basil leaves, finely cut

In large pot, sweat onion with garlic and olive oil until translucent, about five minutes. Add Artichokes and chicken; sauté for 3 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, stock and bring to boil. Stir in pasta; cook half of the recommended cooking time 5 mins); season with salt and pepper. Let rest 20 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese, basil and drizzle with olive oil when serving. *

*AND for those of us who count carbohydrates (for any reason), this recipe makes 5 large servings, and each serving contains 38 Carbs.


SAVE THE DATE!



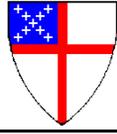

HENRY BEYER & WILLIAM J. BEYER


SECTION 48—LOTS 7 & 8

When **Henry Beyer** died in February of 1929, though originally from New York City, he had resided for 23 years in Sayville. Mr. Beyer died in the home of his daughter, Mrs. George King, at 23 Erwin Street. His death came as a shock as he had been in good health, but a massive heart attack took him in his sleep.

For 18 years, Henry Beyer was in the grocery business in Brooklyn. After coming to Sayville, he was in the florist business and conducted greenhouses on Lincoln Avenue, growing carnations, principally for the New York market; but he sold the business 15 years before his death and retired.

Mr. Beyer married Amelia Kroeck, also a native of New York, who passed away in 1913. At the time of his death, Mr. Beer was survived by three children: Mrs. Louise C. Cauley and Mrs. George King, and a son, William J. Beyer, all of Sayville. Another son, Henry, died in the influenza epidemic in November of 1918 while in the United States Army.

Mr. Henry Beyer was waked in the 23 Erwin Street home of his daughter—his last home. The funeral service was conducted by The Reverend Albert J. Beyer of St. John's Lutheran Church, Sayville. Burial was in the family plot in St. Ann's cemetery.



In late August of 1953, **William J. Beyer** died in his Kensington Avenue home, Bayport at the age of 57. He was born in Brooklyn and came to the area when he was a little boy. He had lived in Bayport for 35 years.

During World War I he served in the Army as a chauffeur, seeing service in France. He and Miss Lela Corey were married in 1917, after which they made their home in Bayport. Prior to World War II he was a custodian in the Bayport school for some ten years and during the war he was employed by Grumman as an electrician. After the war, he worked for the Aldrich Electrical Company in Patchogue as an electrician. . He was a member of the Suffolk County Electrical League.

Mrs. Beyer died in March of 1952, leaving Mr. Beyer who was then survived by one daughter, Miss Mary Louise Beyer, and a sister, Mrs. Lillian Beyer King of Sayville.

Funeral services were conducted in Raynor's Chapel by the Reverend Joseph H. Bond of St. Ann's Episcopal Church. Burial was in the family plot in St. Ann's cemetery.






