We are well and truly into fall. The leaves are turning rapidly, and more and more trees are showing their bark. I spend the crisp mornings sitting in my rocking chair, sipping my tea, wearing a sweatshirt, and watching the red and gold leaves blow away. Fall is a season of changes, as the old begins to pass away in the blowing wind to make room for what is new. And as you can imagine, my front porch thoughts have largely been occupied with the changes that have come upon us at St. Ann's.

Mother Diane's retirement was sort of bittersweet to me. On the one hand, I was happy to see her making the decision to move to the place where she always knew she'd retire: the mountains of North Carolina. On the other hand, I am now without someone who has been a mentor and a guiding compass in my life. She was also there for me pastorally, in my own times of need, and so I share that in common with many of the parishioners of St. Ann's. I will miss her, as will, I suspect, all of you. She was a guiding and stabilizing hand here at St. Ann's, and that is exactly what this church needed at the time of her arrival.

As Mother Diane highlighted in her farewell sermon, over the course of the past seven years we have seen a surge in our outreach ministries. Our Food Pantry serves more and more people, especially since it has taken over the kitchen of Littlejohn. Our Thrift Shop continues to serve the needs of many in the community, especially since its recent makeover. The PBJ Ministry, Operation Hope, the Senior Luncheons, and our other ministries are sharing Christ's love with the world in various ways. St. Ann's has always been a generous parish, and we are living into our charitable calling, more and more, as a community. So, with that as our background, we have to ask ourselves, as a community: "What are we called to do next?"

Times of change are also times of opportunity. We have a real opportunity here at St. Ann's to figure out how we are called to serve as the presence of Christ in Sayville, in the surrounding community, in the Diocese of Long Island, and in the world. Mother Diane helped solidify an infrastructure we can build on: both in the physical improvements she helped us make to our campus, and in the various ministries that exist here. As we bid her farewell, and prepare to welcome Father Hugh as our interim rector, it is the perfect time to ask ourselves what other changes we are called to welcome into our community, and who Jesus is calling us to be, as the Body of Christ in Sayville, in the years to come.

"God is Nigh"



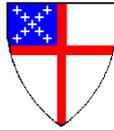



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Our Church History

❖ The Garden of the Unforgotten

CHARLES FRIEMAN
Section 29 – Lots 5-6-7-8

Charles Frieman, for many years a prominent resident of this section, passed away at his home on Bayport Avenue, Bayport, in mid-June of 1934 at 70 years of age. Mr. Frieman had been ill following an operation. His wife, the late Mary Patsak Frieman, died six years previously.

Mr. and Mrs. Frieman moved to West Sayville about 50 years ago from New York City, where he was born. Shortly afterward, they moved to their home in Bayport where they spent the remainder of their lives, taking a leading part in the civic and social affairs of the community.

Mr. Frieman was for many years an agent for Ruppert's Beer in this area, and he also had a large trucking business, dealing with the transportation of oysters.

In 1902 he and Mrs. Frieman leased "The Shoreham" at the foot of Candee Avenue in Sayville. They ran The Shoreham as a restaurant for 21 years, and it became one of Long Island's famous eating places. In 1923 Mr. Frieman sold The Shoreham to Spence and Foster and purchased Brightwaters Casino in Brightwaters. But that spring Mrs. Frieman fell ill, and he sold the casino to his son Alfred and retired from the business.

Mr. Frieman was a lifetime member of South Side Lodge, F. and A.M. No. 493 of Patchogue, and of the Patchogue Lodge of Elks, No. 1323 B.P.O.E. He was also a member of Metlakhatla Chapter O.E.S., Foresters of America, German Benevolent Society, the Bayport Fire Department, the Bayport Republican Club (of which he was a director), and St. Ann's Men's Club. He was Republican Committeeman from his district for many years, and also served as a member of the Board of Education. He also served as a clerk in the Assembly and State Senate on several different occasions.

Mr. Frieman was survived by four sons and three daughters—Mrs. Amy F. Willis of Islip; Dr. Charles W. Frieman of Bay Shore; Miss Ida M. Frieman of Bayport; Alfred E. Frieman of Sayville; Mrs. Doris F. Crampton of Bayport; Henry C. Frieman of Hartford; and Dr. John A. Frieman of Bayport. He also left nine grandchildren.

He was buried from his home, with the Rev. H. H. Mower of Bayport M. E. Church officiating. Masonic services also took place. Burial was in St. Ann's Cemetery.
